

- 15. Antwerp 1920. Gold Medal Winning Rowing Team Trophy. White metal, 39.5cm (15.6") high, signed by artist. Flying winged female (Nike?) upholding Olympic rings (first time shown at Olympic Games), and race between Eight-Oared Shell with Coxswain; raised lions heads on either side. Olive and oak branch at top, two scrolled handles at sides. Mounting opening at bottom. Abt. EF. Very rare. (\$6,500)
- 16. Paris 1924. First Place Gold Medal Winner Prize Vase. Sèvres porcelain, 33.3cm (13.1"), designed by talented artist M.O. Guillonet and executed by Bracquemond at the world-famous porcelain factory of Sèvres. Golden laurel branches are handpainted on French blue background, the medallions depicting Swimming, Football, Rowing and Rugby on gray background with green border. Johnny Weissmuller was awarded this vase in Paris 1924: he had won gold medals in 100m freestyle (Duke Kahanamoku second), 400m freestyle, and 4x200m freestyle, additionally a bronze Water Polo



team medal. In Amsterdam 1928 he again won gold in 100m freestyle and 4x200m freestyle. In 1922 he broke Duke Kahanamoku's world record in the 100m freestyle. All together, in addition to his Olympic gold medals, he won 52 national U.S. Championships, and set a total of 67 world records in swimming. The Associated Press declared him in 1950 to be the greatest swimmer of the first half of the 20th century. In 1932, he played Tarzan in the movie "Tarzan the Ape Man", and he played that role for a total of 12 Tarzan movies. The vase is accompanied by a Johnny Weissmuller Enterprises certificate of authenticity. EF. A rare opportunity to add the trophy of a famous Olympian to an Olympic collection. (\$20,000)

- 17. **St. Moritz 1928 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 50mm, by Arnold Hünerwadel. Female skater with outstretched arms surrounded by icicles. Rev. 5-line French legend between olive branches, Olympic rings above. Toned EF. (\$9,500)
- 18. Los Angeles 1932. Gold Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. "SAMPLE" on edge. Case VF-EF, medal EF. (\$4,000)

- Los Angeles 1932. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. Toned. EF. (\$6,500)
- 20. Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded to the British Ice Hockey Team's Goaltender Jimmy Foster. Goldplated silver, "990" hallmarked, 10cm (3.9"), 325.1 grams (almost 10.5 oz), by Richard Klein, struck by Deschler, Munich. Victory holding laurel wreath riding in triga to left, bobsled, ski, hockey stick and skate below. Rev. Large Olympic rings surrounded by "IV Olympic Winter Games 1936" (translated from German). The British ice hockey team won gold stopping the Canadian winning streak in ice hockey. The British team actually consisted of British-Canadians; Foster was born in Glasgow, Scotland (and till 2002 was the only Scot to win a gold medal), but immigrated early with his parents to Canada. In 1934 he returned to England and made the British ice hockey team for 1936. His gold medal stayed in his family until recently. Thin goldplating, a few small rim bumps, otherwise EF. A historic ice hockey winner's medal. (\$32,500)

- Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. International Olympic Committee Badge. Goldplated, partially enamelled in color, 33mm, designed by Fritz Uhlich. Elbel W-2. "I.O.K." and number engraved on back. EF. Rare. (\$3,000)
- 22. Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Birger Ruud's Participation Badge. Bronze and multicolor enamel, 33mm. View of Kreuzeck mountain surrounded by legend with fir wreath. "Teilnehmer" (participant, translated) and #555 on back. According to the official list of participants this number corresponds to Birger Ruud who won gold in Ski Jump, large hill. In 1948, he won silver in the same event. Norwegian Birger Ruud is one of the greatest Olympic athletes according to David Wallechinsky, Complete Book of the Winter Olympics. EF. (\$1,000)

- 23. Berlin 1936. Original Photo Book Presented to Members of the Japanese NOC and the Tokyo 1940 Bid Delegation. Large oblong folio, 38 cardboard pages with 113 original b&w photos pasted in, ranging in size from full-page 36x27.8cm (14.1"x10.9"), half-page to quarter-page, 17.8x12.8cm (7"x5"), by Reemtsma. Descriptive text in German and English on half pages between the photo pages. All photos document Japanese athletes in Garmisch and Berlin Competitions, also some dignitaries. Full-page photo of Hitler in front receiving a delegation of Japanese members of the Parliament and Tokyo municipal officials in Berlin for selection of 1940 Olympic city. Bound in textured linen, goldstamped legend, Japanese flag in white and red leather. Only a few copies of this book are known, and to our knowledge, this is the rarest book of the Berlin 1936 games. Unique photos and information. EF. (\$5,000)
- 24. Oslo 1952 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Won by a Member of the German Bobsled Team. Goldplated silver, 70mm, by V. Falireus/Knut Yren, struck by Th. Marthinsen C/S. Raised torch with Olympic rings within legend. Rev. Oslo City Hall outlines between snowflakes, 3-line legend below. The German bobsled team comprised very heavy athletes; this gave them an advantage on the track, and they won both the Two-Man and Four-Man Event. The International Federation passed a rule prior to the Oslo Olympics limiting the weight of the athletes valid from 1956 on. The buyer will receive the name of the athlete who participated in both events. EF. (\$40,000)
- 25. Cortina 1956 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated silver, 59mm, by C. Affer. Female head facing, crowned by Olympic rings, flame in lower r. Rev. Snowflake over Mount Pomagagnon. Winners medals pre 1960 were not identified for sport or athlete, apart from 1904 and 1908. Beautiful medal, EF. (\$8,000)



- 26. Innsbruck 1964 Winter Torch. The torch is made of brass, bronze colored, 61cm (24") long, designed by Ludwig Haselwanter and Anton Fritz. Olympic rings and "IX Olympische Winterspiele 1964" are shown around the edges of the bowl at the top. The Innsbruck torch relay is the first winter relay that started in Olympia, Greece. The flame was lit on January 22nd, and taken by car to Athens. From there it was flown to Vienna, and then to Innsbruck where it was displayed at the Golden Dachl until the Opening Day when the cauldron was lit in the Bergisel Stadium. The exact number of torches is not known but certainly less than ten. All were partially made by hand and supposedly by the same worker. Extremely rare. VF+. (\$150,000)
- 27. **Tokyo 1964. Organizing Committee Official's Badge.** Goldplated, 37x60mm. "OOC OFFICIAL" on dark blue bar. With ribbon, one center stripe. Elbel S-18. Rubbing on sun, VF-EF. Very rare. (\$1,500)
- 28. **Tokyo 1964.** Set of the Four Official Tokyo 1964 Posters. The Official Logo Poster was designed by Yusaku Kamekura, printed by Toppan Printing Co., Ltd., 55x101cm (21.7"x39.8"). Japanese red sun over Olympic rings and "Tokyo 1964". Creased at bottom. The next three posters are lined on linen, each 72.5x104cm (28.5"x40.9"): **The Torch Relay Poster** was designed by Yusaku Kamekura and Osamu Hayasaki. Torch runner to left, logo and legend below. **The Five Runners Poster** was designed by Yusaku Kamekura, Jo Murakoshi and Osamu Hayasaki. Five runners at the start, "Tokyo 1964" and logo below. **The Swimmer Poster** was designed by Yusaku Kamekura, Jo Murakoshi and Osamu Hayasaki. Swimmer in pool, "Tokyo 1964" and logo below. Olympism through Posters (IOC, 1983), pages 78 81. Very rare as a set. All about EF. (4 posters) (\$2,000)
