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Highlights of the Auction



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- Athens 1896. Gold First Place Winner's Diploma Awarded to German Gymnast Alfred Flatow. 60.2x38.5cm (23.7"x15.2'), designed by Nikolaos Gyzis, a Greek professor at the Academy of Fine Arts in Munich, and part of the "Munich School". A phoenix at the top is rising from the flames behind the Parthenon, where the Athenian owl sits above an illustration of the Olympic Games. On the left a seated Hellas, and on the right a winged Nike, goddess of Victory, is holding an olive branch towards the lower center's Olympic winner's award inscription. The ink has faded but the names of Flatow and the gymnastics team captain Hoffman together with most of the Greek inscription are still visible. Alfred Flatow (1869-1942, Theresienstadt) was a German Jewish gymnast who won in 1896 gold in the Parallel Bars, Team Parallel Bars and
- Team Horizontal Bars, and silver in Horizontal Bars. The diploma is pasted on cardboard. It has a stain on the left side, mainly on the blank edge, a small dent on Nike's shoulder and a tiny corner loss on the upper right. A few small tears on the edges of the original diploma are visible. Extremely rare diploma. VF-EF. (\$50,000)
- 2. Athens 1896. Second Place Winner's Medal in Bronze. 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. First place winners of the 43 events received a silver medal, second place winners a bronze medal. No gold medals were awarded in the first Olympic Games. Toned EF, in original red velvet-lined presentation case. Very rare. (\$45,000)





















3. The Most Important Photographic Record of the First Modern Olympic Games in Athens, 1896. Group of 33 Platinotype Original Photos from the family of the Royal Court Photographer Albert Meyer, Berlin and Misdroy, Germany.

The photos in cabinet card size are pasted on stiff cardboard with silver blind stamp of Meyer, and silver edges, identification of photos written by Meyer in ink on back. 28 photos are 13x21.2cm or 21.2x13cm (5.1"x8.4" and 8.4"x5.1") and 5 photos are 10.7x16.5cm (4.2"x6.5"). Meyer was one of only seven photographers accredited in Athens 1896, and only about 100 photos taken by all seven accredited photographers are known today. Platinotypes were the most expensive photographic technique of the day. Meyer's firm closed in the early 20th century, and the archives were destroyed during World War II. Volker Kluge published "The Pictures of the First Olympiad" in Berlin, Germany in 1996, and all 33 photos are included in his book, with the page numbers shown in brackets below. All EF. 

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




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- 4. The German Gymnastics Team in Berlin Before their Departure to the Olympic Games in Athens 1896. Platinotype Photo by Albert Meyer and Signed by all the Team Members on the back. Cabinet format, 21.4x13.4cm (8.4"x5.3"). Shown are Fritz Hofmann, Richard Röstel, Conrad Böcker, Georg Hillmar, Alfred Flatow (middle row, fourth from left), Felix Flatow, Fritz Manteuffel, Carl Schuhmann, in front Hermann Weingärtner and Karl Neukirch. The team won team gold in parallel bars and horizontal bars; individual horizontal bars Weingärtner gold, and A. Flatow silver; parallel bars gold by A. Flatow, and 3rd 5th place by Germany, gold and bronze in Long Horse Vault by Schuhmann and H. Weingärtner who also won silver in Pommel Horse, and Rings. This is the only photo with all signatures kept by Albert Meyer and his family until recently. Upper right small corner crease, o.w. EF. (\$800)
- Court Photographer Albert Meyer's Collection of Correspondence Relating to the Sale of his Athens 1896 Olympic Photographs. The 63 letters are kept between two stiff red linen covers with "Olympische Spiele-Athen 1896" in gold and Art Nouveau style embossed corners decorations. Albert Meyer was also a smart businessman. He made luxurious photo albums and gifted a few of them to Royalty who in turn bestowed him with titles and medals. Some albums or photos were also sent "on approval" for later payment or return; but some were also only described for sale in a letter. The reaction was mostly enthusiastic about the quality of the albums and photos. Included in the collection are: 20 letters from Royalty Courts which include the Kings of Belgium, Sweden, Saxony, Serbia,



the Crown Prince of Greece, Empress Viktoria from Germany. 28 letters from IOC Members - 10 letters of Pierre de Coubertin; 3 letters from Balck of Sweden, Boutowsky of Russia and Kemeny of Hungary; additionally, 6 letters from Georg Streit (Organizing Committee) and 2 letters from IOC President Vikelas. 3 letters from Politicians include President Faure of France. And 12 letters from Germans in Athens: the German Embassy, three book dealers, Giet, gymnastic teacher of the Royal Princes, Director Wolters of the German Archeological Institute. All letters are written in ink by hand, many with their envelopes, stamps and seals. Wolfgang Decker and Bernd Wirkus published a 170-page book in German in 2019. "Der Hofphotograph Albert Meyer" (translated: The Court Photographer Albert Meyer and the Olympic Games 1896 in Athens). It includes 63 letters with comments relating to the early history of the Olympic Movement. They transcribed every German or French handwritten letter into print - a monumental task! A few of the letters were also photographed, all have comments and explanations. Some of their information is in the description. The book is included in the lot. Front cover water stained, faded, letters and envelopes inside EF. A unique and amazing collection. (\$8,000)

Embossed leather, partially gilt, about 32.5x41cm (12.8"x16.1"), 6cm (2.5")

high, with attached small gold crown. Included are four Athens 1896 photos, 22.8x16.5cm (9"x6.5"), one photo 17x23.2cm, and another photo 12.8x18.3cm. **April 4, 1896:** The Royal family in the stadium; The bands play the first few bars of Samara's Hymn; **April 8:** The Pan-Hellenic Gymnastics Association at the parallel bars: **April 9:** Hermann Weingärtner, Germany, Olympic champion on the horizontal bar. **April 14:** A bleak empty stadium – the closing event had to be postponed because of bad weather. **April 15:** The Olympic marathon champion Spiridon Louis and other Greek athletes with their prizes. Furthermore a photo of Albert Mayer, a large photo of his wife as equestrian (she assisted him with the photography in Athens), many family photos including Meyer's daughter Herbertine's husband Gebbing, Zoo director in Leipzig. Impressive case has stains on front, 1896 photos with blank reverse EF, other documents VF-EF. (**\$2,000+**)

- 7. **St. Louis 1904. Participation Medal.** Bronze, 40x40mm, made by Dieges & Clust, New York. Nude athlete striding r., laurel branch in hand. Rev. Legend in eleven lines, shields of St. Louis, France and U.S.A. between ivy leaves. Lightly toned EF. Rare. (\$17,000)
- 8. St. Louis 1904. Third Place Winner's Medal in the (Olympic) Western Handicap Meeting Awarded for Two Miles Run Won by Milton A. Hellman on July 29, 1904. Bronze, 30mm, by Mermod & Jaccard, St. Louis. Olive branch dividing meeting information, running shoe at right. Rev. Engraved "Two Miles Run". Suspended from mural crown bar with legend "1904/ Universal Exposition / Olympic Games / St. Louis". All events in St. Louis were considered Olympic events. Toned EF. (\$3,000)
- 9. Athens 1906. American Olympic Committee Member's Badge. Gold, 32x44mm, by Dieges & Clust, New York. Greek and U.S. shield over "MEMBER", female on medallion between green olive branches below. "Olympic Games/Held at Athens Greece/1906" legend on sides. Two prongs on rev. *Earliest U.S. American Committee badge*. EF. (\$2,200)



- 10. Athens 1906. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. Similar to 1896 winner's medal only the date on the reverse was changed to 1906. Housed in round presentation case. Nick on obv., small spots, EF. (\$7,000)
- 11. Athens 1906. The Official Results / Report. Bulletin of the Committee of the Olympic Games in Athens, No. 4, June 2, 1906. International Olympic Games 1906 Results. 106pp., 21.5x28.5cm (8.5"x11.2"), in Greek and French. This is the actual report of the 1906 Games with list of all participants; list of each participant with result for each event, list of jury members, etc. Bound in linen and marbled boards, contents browning, disbound. First four pages lower right corner chipped, vertical center crease. VF. Extremely rare official report. (\$6,000)
- 12. **London 1908. Comité d' Honeur Badge.** Goldplated, partial red enamel, 48x56mm, made by Vaughton. Helmeted head left of Pallas Athene, laurel branch at left. *The recipients of the Honor Committee included a few IOC members.* Elbel S-5. Very rare in gold, a beautiful badge! EF. (\$8,000)
- 13. First Russian Olympiad in Kiev, 1913. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 53mm, by Joseph Marshak. Nude discus thrower, view of Kiev in background. Rev. City shield, crossed oak and olive branch below. Russia participated the first time in Olympic Games in Stockholm 1912. The Russian team came in second to last of 18 participating nations. Grand Duke Dmitrii Pavlovich oversaw the Russian Olympic Games in order to train athletes for better results in the next Olympic Games in Berlin 1916. The Sports Ground for the Games was the first permanent stadium in Russia. The "Cartier of Kiev", Joseph Marshak, main competitor of Karl Fabergé, created the winner's medal for the First Russian Olympic Games. See Bubka, Sergey and Bulatova, M.M. "Kiev The First Russian Olympiad 1913", with much information and many photos. EF, spot obv. Very rare. (\$2,600)





14. Modern Pentathlon Challenge Prize Presented to Pierre de Coubertin by the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco, 1915. Silverplated bronze, 8.5x10.4cm (3.4"x4.1"), by E. Lindberg. Zeus seated on throne being presented the modern Olympic Pentathlon winner by ancient Greek female holding olive wreath above the winner's head. Rev. 13-line inscription in French between 5 olive wreaths symbolizing the 5 Olympic rings, and two mermaids holding each other symbolizing the Meeting of the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. Coubertin created and introduced the Modern Pentathlon in Stockholm 1912. This prize in gold was to be awarded to the winner who could keep it to the next Olympiad. It did not happen; the

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only gold plaque was presented to Coubertin, about 5 silverplated plaques were presented to Olympic officials. The Fair officials had planned to have "International Olympic Games" with a Modern Pentathlon event but instead only a Marathon was held on "Olympic Day". Extremely rare, and a beautiful plaque. EF. (\$6,000)

- 15. Antwerp 1920. Gold Medal Winning Rowing Team Trophy. White metal, 39.5cm (15.6") high, signed by artist. Flying winged female (Nike?) upholding Olympic rings (first time shown at Olympic Games), and race between Eight-Oared Shell with Coxswain; raised lions heads on either side. Olive and oak branch at top, two scrolled handles at sides. Mounting opening at bottom. Abt. EF. Very rare. (\$6,500)
- 16. Paris 1924. First Place Gold Medal Winner Prize Vase. Sèvres porcelain, 33.3cm (13.1"), designed by talented artist M.O. Guillonet and executed by Bracquemond at the world-famous porcelain factory of Sèvres. Golden laurel branches are handpainted on French blue background, the medallions depicting Swimming, Football, Rowing and Rugby on gray background with green border. Johnny Weissmuller was awarded this vase in Paris 1924: he had won gold medals in 100m freestyle (Duke Kahanamoku second), 400m freestyle, and 4x200m freestyle, additionally a bronze Water Polo



team medal. In Amsterdam 1928 he again won gold in 100m freestyle and 4x200m freestyle. In 1922 he broke Duke Kahanamoku's world record in the 100m freestyle. All together, in addition to his Olympic gold medals, he won 52 national U.S. Championships, and set a total of 67 world records in swimming. The Associated Press declared him in 1950 to be the greatest swimmer of the first half of the 20th century. In 1932, he played Tarzan in the movie "Tarzan the Ape Man", and he played that role for a total of 12 Tarzan movies. The vase is accompanied by a Johnny Weissmuller Enterprises certificate of authenticity. EF. A rare opportunity to add the trophy of a famous Olympian to an Olympic collection. (\$20,000)

- 17. **St. Moritz 1928 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 50mm, by Arnold Hünerwadel. Female skater with outstretched arms surrounded by icicles. Rev. 5-line French legend between olive branches, Olympic rings above. Toned EF. (\$9,500)
- 18. Los Angeles 1932. Gold Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. "SAMPLE" on edge. Case VF-EF, medal EF. (\$4,000)

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- Los Angeles 1932. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. Toned. EF. (\$6,500)
- 20. Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded to the British Ice Hockey Team's Goaltender Jimmy Foster. Goldplated silver, "990" hallmarked, 10cm (3.9"), 325.1 grams (almost 10.5 oz), by Richard Klein, struck by Deschler, Munich. Victory holding laurel wreath riding in triga to left, bobsled, ski, hockey stick and skate below. Rev. Large Olympic rings surrounded by "IV Olympic Winter Games 1936" (translated from German). The British ice hockey team won gold stopping the Canadian winning streak in ice hockey. The British team actually consisted of British-Canadians; Foster was born in Glasgow, Scotland (and till 2002 was the only Scot to win a gold medal), but immigrated early with his parents to Canada. In 1934 he returned to England and made the British ice hockey team for 1936. His gold medal stayed in his family until recently. Thin goldplating, a few small rim bumps, otherwise EF. A historic ice hockey winner's medal. (\$32,500)

- Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. International Olympic Committee Badge. Goldplated, partially enamelled in color, 33mm, designed by Fritz Uhlich. Elbel W-2. "I.O.K." and number engraved on back. EF. Rare. (\$3,000)
- 22. Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Birger Ruud's Participation Badge. Bronze and multicolor enamel, 33mm. View of Kreuzeck mountain surrounded by legend with fir wreath. "Teilnehmer" (participant, translated) and #555 on back. According to the official list of participants this number corresponds to Birger Ruud who won gold in Ski Jump, large hill. In 1948, he won silver in the same event. Norwegian Birger Ruud is one of the greatest Olympic athletes according to David Wallechinsky, Complete Book of the Winter Olympics. EF. (\$1,000)

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- 23. Berlin 1936. Original Photo Book Presented to Members of the Japanese NOC and the Tokyo 1940 Bid Delegation. Large oblong folio, 38 cardboard pages with 113 original b&w photos pasted in, ranging in size from full-page 36x27.8cm (14.1"x10.9"), half-page to quarter-page, 17.8x12.8cm (7"x5"), by Reemtsma. Descriptive text in German and English on half pages between the photo pages. All photos document Japanese athletes in Garmisch and Berlin Competitions, also some dignitaries. Full-page photo of Hitler in front receiving a delegation of Japanese members of the Parliament and Tokyo municipal officials in Berlin for selection of 1940 Olympic city. Bound in textured linen, goldstamped legend, Japanese flag in white and red leather. Only a few copies of this book are known, and to our knowledge, this is the rarest book of the Berlin 1936 games. Unique photos and information. EF. (\$5,000)
- 24. Oslo 1952 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Won by a Member of the German Bobsled Team. Goldplated silver, 70mm, by V. Falireus/Knut Yren, struck by Th. Marthinsen C/S. Raised torch with Olympic rings within legend. Rev. Oslo City Hall outlines between snowflakes, 3-line legend below. The German bobsled team comprised very heavy athletes; this gave them an advantage on the track, and they won both the Two-Man and Four-Man Event. The International Federation passed a rule prior to the Oslo Olympics limiting the weight of the athletes valid from 1956 on. The buyer will receive the name of the athlete who participated in both events. EF. (\$40,000)
- 25. Cortina 1956 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated silver, 59mm, by C. Affer. Female head facing, crowned by Olympic rings, flame in lower r. Rev. Snowflake over Mount Pomagagnon. Winners medals pre 1960 were not identified for sport or athlete, apart from 1904 and 1908. Beautiful medal, EF. (\$8,000)



- 26. Innsbruck 1964 Winter Torch. The torch is made of brass, bronze colored, 61cm (24") long, designed by Ludwig Haselwanter and Anton Fritz. Olympic rings and "IX Olympische Winterspiele 1964" are shown around the edges of the bowl at the top. The Innsbruck torch relay is the first winter relay that started in Olympia, Greece. The flame was lit on January 22nd, and taken by car to Athens. From there it was flown to Vienna, and then to Innsbruck where it was displayed at the Golden Dachl until the Opening Day when the cauldron was lit in the Bergisel Stadium. The exact number of torches is not known but certainly less than ten. All were partially made by hand and supposedly by the same worker. Extremely rare. VF+. (\$150,000)
- 27. **Tokyo 1964. Organizing Committee Official's Badge.** Goldplated, 37x60mm. "OOC OFFICIAL" on dark blue bar. With ribbon, one center stripe. Elbel S-18. Rubbing on sun, VF-EF. Very rare. (\$1,500)
- 28. **Tokyo 1964.** Set of the Four Official Tokyo 1964 Posters. The Official Logo Poster was designed by Yusaku Kamekura, printed by Toppan Printing Co., Ltd., 55x101cm (21.7"x39.8"). Japanese red sun over Olympic rings and "Tokyo 1964". Creased at bottom. The next three posters are lined on linen, each 72.5x104cm (28.5"x40.9"): **The Torch Relay Poster** was designed by Yusaku Kamekura and Osamu Hayasaki. Torch runner to left, logo and legend below. **The Five Runners Poster** was designed by Yusaku Kamekura, Jo Murakoshi and Osamu Hayasaki. Five runners at the start, "Tokyo 1964" and logo below. **The Swimmer Poster** was designed by Yusaku Kamekura, Jo Murakoshi and Osamu Hayasaki. Swimmer in pool, "Tokyo 1964" and logo below. Olympism through Posters (IOC, 1983), pages 78 81. Very rare as a set. All about EF. (4 posters) (\$2,000)

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- 29. Grenoble 1968 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Cross Country Skiing, Housed in Presentation Case. Silver, 60mm, by Roger Excoffon. Logo within French legend. Rev. Depiction of a skier, "FOND" (Cross Country, translated) below. Winners medals show, for the first time, the sport on the reverse. With ribbon in Olympic colors. Housed in black leather case with gold logo on top, lined in blue velvet and silk. EF. (\$12,000)
- 30. Grenoble 1968 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Giant Slalom Skiing. Bronze, 60mm, by Roger Excoffon, struck at the Paris Mint. Logo within French legend. Rev. Depiction of giant slalom, "Slalom Geant" below. Housed in black leather presentation case, gold embossed logo on top, lined in white velvet and silk. Unc. (\$10,000)

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33. Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Cased Bronze Winner's Medal for Slalom. Bronze, 70mm, by M. Coufal. "SLALOM" over Bergisel ski jump, Olympic flame at r. Rev. Official logo and legend. With ribbon in Austrian colors. Housed in red leather case with gold logo on top, lined in green velvet. EF. (\$7,500)

in 1964, and in Mexico City, 1968 he won the gold medal in Marathon. In Munich he ran his fastest marathon ever at 40 years although behind F.
