Official Torch Signed in Ink by Mohammad Ali.** Aluminum and Georgia pecan wood. 80cm (31.5"), designed by Peter Mastrogiannis. 22 reeds represent the cities where Olympic Games had been held since 1896. Gathered by 2 goldplated brass bands, the top band displays the Atlanta torch logo and the quilt of leaves design, the bottom band lists all Olympic cities since 1896. The pecan wooden handle represents the connection of the flame between heaven and earth. *The flame was lit in Olympia on March 30 at the Temple of Hera. It reached Los Angeles on April 27 and ended 84 days later in Atlanta, carried by 10,000 relay runners, horses, bicycles, trains, ships, and hydroplanes throughout the United States.* EF. **(\$3,000)**

348. **NAGANO, 18th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 1998. Nagano 1998 Winter. Official Torch.** Aluminum, partially gilt, 55cm (21.7") long. Designed after ancient Japanese torches called Taimatsu. It shows the Nagano emblem and sports pictograms, and a brightly colored orange cord wrapped around the lower part forms the grip. Fueled with clean burning propane, it burnt for about 20 minutes. *The torch relay in Japan took place from January 6 until February 7, when the Olympic fire was lit during the opening ceremony.* Choice EF, in original cardboard box. **(\$6,000)**

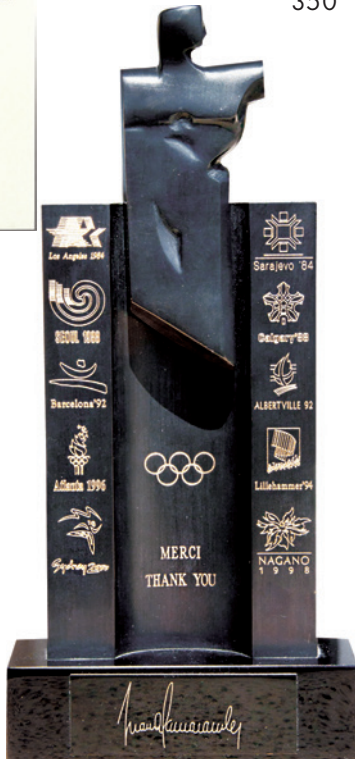

355. **Salt Lake City 2002 Winter. Bronze Medal Winner's Pin Awarded by the IOC for Ice Hockey to the Soviet Union.** Bronze, 13x15mm. *The Soviet Union won third place.* Numbered, in black plastic wallet. EF. (\$80)
356. **Salt Lake City Winter 2002. President Juan Antonio Samaranch's Farewell Present to IOC Members at the End of His Presidency in 2002.** Bronze and blackened steel sculpture, 23.2cm (9.1") high, by Rosa Serra, Catalonia/Spain. Two columns with the Summer (l.) and Winter Olympic Games (r.) in gold when Samaranch was President of the IOC: from Sarajevo 1984 to Sydney 2000. In the center are the Olympic rings above "Merci. Thank you." An 11cm high, goldplated on sides, 3-dimensional bronze torso is attached at the top, a favorite subject of Serra. The stone base, 10.9x3.9x3cm, displays a gold facsimile signature of Juan A. Samaranch. The reverse is inscribed with the sculptor's name in gold "rosa.serra." *Rosa Serra, the famous Spanish sculptor; was a friend of President Samaranch, and he asked her years ago to create sculptures representing the different Olympic sports, an area she had not explored previously. She became renowned for her sport sculptures, being praised for having force and motion. President Samaranch commissioned her to create this rare farewell gift.* EF. Rare. (\$3,000)

ATHENS, 28th OLYMPIC GAMES, 2004

349. **Nagano 1998 Winter. Swiss Team Pin.** Silvered, multicolor, 28x35mm. Logo flanked by Japanese and Swiss emblems. EF. (\$60)
350. **Nagano 1998 Winter. Bid Book.** 4 volumes bound in stiff paper, illustrated, 30x30cm (11.8"). The set carries the name of "S.A.S. le prince héréditaire Albert de MONACO". Cover abt. EF, contents EF. (\$140)
351. **Nagano 1998 Winter. Official Report in French.** 4 volumes bound in linen, illustrated, 22.5x29.5cm (8.9"x11.6"). EF. (\$120)

357. **Athens 2004. Official Torch.** Silver colored metal and olive wood, 68cm (26.8") long. The torch resembles an olive leaf, and the design wants to express "Pan Metron Ariston" (All things in moderation, translated from Greek). A simple and beautiful design. EF. (\$2,200)

SYDNEY, 27th OLYMPIC GAMES, 2000

352. **Sydney 2000. Official Torch.** Three layers consisting of polished stainless steel, anodized aluminum and coated aluminum, 77cm (30.5"), designed by Blue Sky Design, Sydney, manufactured by G.A. & L. Harrington. The three layers represent earth, fire and water. EF. (\$3,000)
353. **Official Games Basketball of the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games, Made by Molten, "JB 2020".** Approved by Molten 1999-2002. EF. (\$260)

358. **16th IOC Session in Athens 2004. Badge with Purple Ribbon.** Gilt thin metal, 32x50mm. Session legend above logo. With purple ribbon, black center stripe. EF. (\$120)

TORINO, 20th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2006

354. **Salt Lake City 2002 Winter. Official Torch.** Silver colored metal and glass, 83.8cm (33"). Shaped like a fiery icicle in motion, the polished silver colored bottom bears the motto "Light the fire within"; center metal, and glass top section in "frozen flame" texture with logo on metal part. EF. (\$3,250)

359. **Torino 2006 Winter. Official Torch.** Blue techno-polymer-coated aluminum, 77cm (30.3") long, made by PiniFarina. *The fire was lit in Olympia on November 27, 2005 and arrived in Rome on December 8. Until February 10 the torch traveled over 11,300 km across Italy, also France, Switzerland and Slovenia.* Unused. EF. (\$1,200)

360. **Torino 2006 Winter. Cased Silver Participation Medal for Athletes.** Silvered bronze, 39mm. Logo. Rev. Olympic rings over motto. With circular cardboard, within clear round plastic case. EF. **(\$200)**
361. **Torino 2006 Winter. Cased Bronze Participation Medal for Officials.** Bronze, 39mm. Logo. Rev. Olympic rings over motto. With circular cardboard, within clear round plastic case. EF. **(\$120)**
362. **Torino 2006. Pair of Official Hockey Pucks.** Both 7.6cm (about 3"). "Torino 2006" between Torino logo and color Olympic rings. Both new, EF. **(\$100)**

BEIJING, 29th OLYMPIC GAMES, 2008

363. **Beijing 2008. Official Torch.** Red and anodized aluminum, 72cm (18.4"). Curved form in the shape of a paper scroll, with lucky clouds graphic expressing harmony. *The torch relay started in Olympia, Greece, on March 24, traveled to over 100 cities on five continents and all of China, a distance of 137,000km.* EF. **(\$1,500)**
364. **Beijing 2008. Participation Medal.** Copper, 55mm. Logo over Bird's Nest Olympic Stadium. Rev. Five Fuwa mascots over Chinese and English "One World One Dream" motto, waves below. EF, in red presentation box. **(\$200)**
365. **Beijing 2008. Micronesia Delegation Badge.** Gold and red, 4.7x7.2cm. White shell attached on center, "Beijing 2008" on top, "Micronesia Delegation" below. With red ribbon. Very unusual team badge! EF. **(\$100)**

VANCOUVER, 21st OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2010

366. **Vancouver 2010 Winter Official Torch.** Stainless steel, aluminum and sheet molding compound, 94.5cm (37.1"), made by Bombardier. The lines of the torch reflect the lines made by snow and ice winter sports. It shows the engraved motto "With Glowing Hearts / Des plus brilliants exploits" and the logo. *The torch relay ended after its 45,000km journey through Canada with the lighting of the Olympic flame cauldron at the opening ceremony on February 12, 2010.* EF, in original cloth bag and cardboard box. **(\$1,200)**



367. **Vancouver 2010 Winter. Group of Eleven Full Tickets from February 13 to February 16.** All blue and green, 8x20cm. February 13, Biathlon (2); February 14, Freestyle Skiing (2) and Ice Hockey; February 15, Snowboard, Figure Skating (2) and Ice Hockey (2). All EF. (11 pcs.) **(\$160)**

LONDON, 30th OLYMPIC GAMES, 2012

368. **London 2012. Official Torch.** Gold-colored aluminum alloy, 80cm (31.5"), designed by Edward Barber and Jay Osgerby, made by The Premier Group, Coventry. Triangular form made out of an inner and outer sheet with 8000 holes representing the 8000 torch bearers in Great Britain. EF. **(\$3,500)**

SOCHI, 22nd OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2014

369. **Sochi 2014 Winter. Official Torch.** Aluminum and polymer, partially red, 95cm (37.4") high, 14.5cm (5.7") wide, designed by Vladimir Pirozhkov and Andrei Vodyanik. The design of the torch reminds of the feather of the Firebird, a magical bird in Russian folklore. *The fire was lit on September 29, 2013 in Olympia; the torch relay started in Russia on October 7, reached the North Pole on October 20, was flown into space by a Soyuz rocket, reached Europe's highest mountain (Mount Elbrus) and the world's deepest lake (Lake Baikal). It ended at the opening ceremony on February 7, 2014, in Sochi.* EF. **(\$2,000)**

RIO de JANEIRO, 31st OLYMPIC GAMES, 2016

370. **Rio De Janeiro 2016. Official Torch.** Recycled aluminum and resin, 69 cm (27”) high. The colorful layers reflect the Ground (like the Copacabana Promenade), the Sea (blue ocean ripples), the Mountains (green natural beauty surrounding Rio), and the Sky at the top with the yellow sun (the flame). A beautiful torch reflecting the beautiful location of Rio. EF. **(\$2,400)**

PYEONGCHANG, 23rd OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2018

371. **PyeongChang 2018 Winter Official Torch with Black Case.** White, 70cm (27.6”), the length matching the altitude of 700 Meter of PyeongChang. The five parts at top are simulating a flame, being also based on the Korean name of PyeongChang. This symbol is shown also over the lower part in gold. The flame was lit in Olympia, Greece, on October 24, 2017. *After an 8-day relay in Greece the torch relay in Korea started on November 9. It ended at the Opening Ceremony on February 9, 2018 with the lighting of the cauldron.* In carrying case. Used in the torch relay. Torch lightly discolored at top, o.w. EF. **(\$2,000)**

372. **PyeongChang 2018 Winter. Olympiad Silver Medal Pin Awarded by the IOC.** Silvered, rings goldplated, 13x15mm. Numbered, in plastic case. EF. **(\$120)**

373. **(Brochure) Lighting and Handover of the Olympic Flame, Ancient Olympia, October 24, 2017.** 34pp., illustrated in color, 17.2x24cm (6.8”x9.5”). Torch lighting and its history of torches shown from 1964 to 2018 etc. EF. **(\$100)**

TOKYO, 32nd OLYMPIC GAMES, 2020 (2021)

374. **Tokyo 2020/21. Official Torch.** Cherry blossom pink colored aluminum, 71cm (28”) long, designed by Tokujin Yoshioka Inc. The design on the top is in the form of a 5-petal cherry blossom that each holds a flame that comes together as one flame in the center. It has been made from a single sheet of aluminum, 30% of it made from recycled aluminum from temporary prefabricated housing construction after the 2011 earthquake, as a symbol of peace. *The torch relay had originally been planned to last over 121 days but worldwide Covid-19 ended these plans.* A beautiful torch, rarely seen, whose color might change over time from cherry blossom pink to gold. Housed in its pink container. EF. **(\$6,000)**

BEIJING, 24TH OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2022

375. **Beijing 2022 Winter. Official Torch.** Red and silver colored, (fire and ice), 82cm (32.3”), designed by the Lenovo Team. The torch is named “Flying”, and the spiral design makes it look like a ribbon fluttering in the wind. The red and silver colors stand for fire and ice, and the red line represents the Great Wall and the skiing courses. The torch is fueled by emission-free hydrogen. Because of the Corona virus the relay was held only for 3 days with about 1,200 torch runners, in and around Beijing and in Zhangjiakou, Hebei Province. A beautiful torch. Unused, housed in its original container, EF. **(\$5,000)**

376. **Beijing 2022 Winter. Official Paralympic Torch.** Silver and gold colored, 82cm (32.3”), designed by a Lenovo team. The torch is named “Flying” too, symbolizing “glory and dreams”. *Due to the Corona virus, only about 600 Paralympic torches were made for the 600 Paralympic torch runners in Beijing.* EF. **(\$4,000)**

377. **Commemorative Beijing 2022 Porcelain Tea Pot.** 16cm (6.3”) wide, 9cm high. Winter landscapes on side, color logo on top. Housed in beautiful box. EF. **(\$100)**

PARIS, 33rd OLYMPIC GAMES, 2024

378. **Paris 2024. The Official Torch.** It is made of steel, 70cm (27.6”) tall, and weighs around 1.5kg (1,500 grams/3.3 pounds), one of 2,000 torches manufactured by Arcelor Mittal in France. The torch was designed by Mathieu Lehanneur who drew inspiration from the 3 themes of the Paris Games: Equality, Water and Peacefulness. The torch relay started in Olympia on April 16, and ended on July 26, after the opening ceremony of the Paris Games on the Seine, with the lighting of the cauldron, a balloon, in the Tuileries. Housed in its sturdy case, EF. **(\$18,000)**
