Berlin had hoped to be chosen for the Olympic Games of 1912 during this 10th IOC Session. When v. Asseburg died on March 30, Berlin withdr ew its bid and Stoc kholm was selected for the 1912 Olympic Games. In original case made by Friedrich Schimmelpfennig, Berlin. Case VF, medal EF. (\$900)
173. Centennial of the Oktober F estival in Munich Medal, 1910. Bronze, 33 mm . Busts f acing of Prince Re gent Luitpold, and Ludwig I of Ba varia and Therese. Rev. Equestrian Races. The first "Oktoberfest" was held in 1810 for the wedding of Ludwig and Therese in München. According to Karl Lennartz, in "Olympic Victories" page 97, the equestrian races were soon after 1810 joined by shooting, gymnastics and other popular sports, and there were comparisons to the Olympic Games.
