197. Second Latvian Olympic Games in Riga Badge, 1921. Silvered, 30x40mm, by F. Mueller, Riga. Victorious athlete, city of Riga in back, 4-line legend and city coat of arms below. EF. (\$275)
198. Bronze Winner's Medal of the Second International Athletic Women's Games in Monte Carlo, 1922. Bronze, 63mm, by A.T. Szirmai. Demonstration of Hellenic Dance surrounded by "Jeux Athletiques Féminine" (Female Athletic Games, translated from French.) Rev. View of Monte Carlo Casino. *In the early years women were generally not allowed to participate in Olympic Games. In 1921 Camille Blanc, the Mayor of Beaulieu in Monaco, announced "Olympiades Féminine", (Women's Olympics), and 300 athletes from five European countries participated in athletics, basketball and exhibition of push-ball. After much success the next year staged "Jeux Athletiques Internationaux Féminine" (International Athletic Women's Games). And in 1923 a third set of Games was held. The IOC included women's track and field finally in Amsterdam 1928. Toned EF, in leatherette case lined in green velvet and silk. Very rare. (\$1,000)*

199. Silver Winner's Medal of the Third International Athletic Women's Games in Monte Carlo, 1923. Silver, 63mm, by A.T. Szirmai. Demonstration of Hellenic Dance. Rev. View of Monte Carlo Casino. *After the third Games, Alice Milliat from France, founder of the "Federation Féminine Sportive Internationale" became the leading person in women's sports. Her efforts led to the inclusion of women's track and field in Amsterdam 1928. Housed in red leatherette case, scuffed, lined in red velvet and silk. Toned EF. Very rare. (\$2,000)*
200. Silver Winner's Medal in the Third Latvian Olympic Games in Riga, 1923. Silver, "875" hallmark, 30mm, by Berg. Victory holding torch extending wreath to athlete leading quadriga. Looped. Toned EF. (\$400)

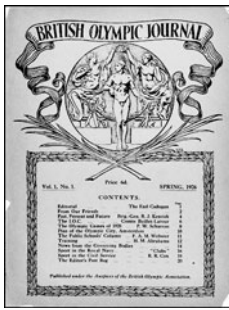

202. **Participation Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by R. Bénard. City view over French legend in three lines. Re v. Victory with laurel wreaths crowning victorious athletes. EF. (\$375)
203. **New York Mayor Hylan Presentation Medal to the American Olympic Team on Their Return from Paris, 1924.** Goldplated sterling silver, 30x52mm, by Dieges & Clust. Athlete holding palm branch between American and French shield, legend at sides. With loop and rings. Partially toned. EF. Rare in silver. (\$600)
204. **American Olympic Team 1924 Contributor Button.** Cream celluloid with blue and red design, 23mm. For the Chamonix Winter and Paris Summer Olympic Games. EF. (\$200)
205. **Commemorative VIIIth Olympiad Boxing Sculpture.** Multicolor painted plaster, 28cm (11") tall, by Coffin. Boxer standing in boxing pose, artist's name on base. Small plaque in front "VIIIme Olympiade Paris 1924 / La Boxe / Par Coffin". A few small paint chips, abt. EF. Very scarce. (\$900)

218. **Beauty in Sport Medal, 1928.** Bronze, 41mm, by Jaap Kaas. Muscular running athlete, stadium in background. Rev. Initials between "19-28". In original box. EF. (\$150)
219. **Uruguay 1924 and 1928 Olympic Soccer Champion Pin.** Silvered, 15mm. Color enameled flag and soccer ball surrounded by legend. Buttonhole closure. EF. (\$125)
220. **American Olympic Team Belt Buckle.** Silvered brass, 45x38mm, partially enameled in red and blue. American shield surrounded by "American Olympic Team Amsterdam 1928". Color chips, VF-EF. (\$150)

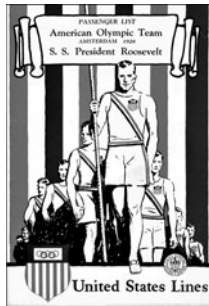

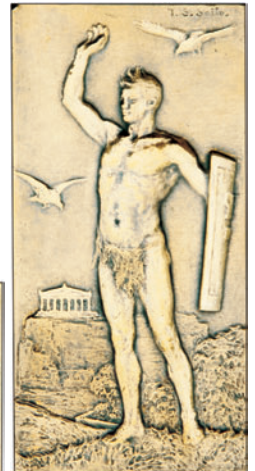

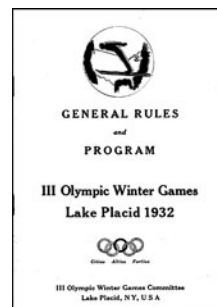

225. **Soccer Octagonal Embossed Brass Plate.** 28.5x28.5cm (11.1"x11.1"). Three soccer players in stadium between ribbons with "Olympic Games-1928" in Dutch, laurel branches at sides. Toned EF. (\$250)
