**The auction will be conducted in accordance with the terms set forth below. Bidding in the sale constitutes acceptance of all terms stated herein.**

**(1) BIDDING.** The auction will be online at our website [www.ioneil.com](http://www.ioneil.com). It will close at 11 pm Pacific Standard Time on Saturday August 26, 2017. Bidding will continue after 11 pm for lots with active bidding until 10 minutes pass without a new bid. We also accept bids by email, phone, mail and fax (by fax: please follow up by phone or email to confirm that bids were received). All bids by email will be acknowledged. E-mail bids which have not been acknowledged have not been received. Phone bids must be confirmed in writing upon request. The estimates listed in the catalog are starting prices. Bids will be increased per the increment table on our website. If you enter a maximum bid (your highest), the bidding will be incremented as needed to win the lot, up to your maximum bid. Bids must be for an entire lot. Auctioneer reserves the right to extend bidding.

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**(9) CLAIMS.** The sole basis for a claim against auctioneer is the lack of authenticity of a purchased item. Buyer is solely responsible for determining authenticity without reliance on statements or acts of auctioneer. Authenticity claims must be made in writing and submitted to auctioneer no later than 5 days after delivery of such item. Authenticity claims are not permitted outside of warranty period except as may be permitted by auctioneer. Acceptance of a claim does not constitute an admission. If auctioneer disputes a claim, the final determination of authenticity shall be made by a qualified authenticator selected by buyer and auctioneer. Costs of authentication will be borne by buyer. If a claim is accepted or an item determined to be not authentic, buyer's exclusive remedy is a refund of the successful bid price and Buyer's Fee, payable upon delivery of the item to auctioneer in accordance with the conditions of return set forth below, except as may otherwise be agreed by auctioneer and buyer in writing.

**(10) RETURNS.** Auctioneer shall not be liable for any item returned without auctioneer's prior written approval. Items must be returned in their original container and in the same condition as sold to buyer in the manner and at the time specified by auctioneer in writing. Auctioneer may, at auctioneer's option, offer a remedy to buyer but in no event shall buyer have any entitlement or right to any remedy from auctioneer unless stated in a writing signed by auctioneer and buyer.

**(13) GOVERNING LAW; MISCELLANEOUS.** Actions to enforce or interpret or relating to these Terms of Sale shall be construed in accordance with California law, without regard to conflicts of law rules. 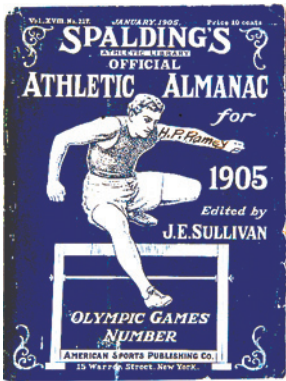
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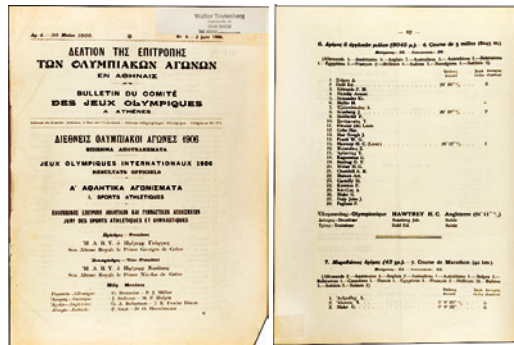
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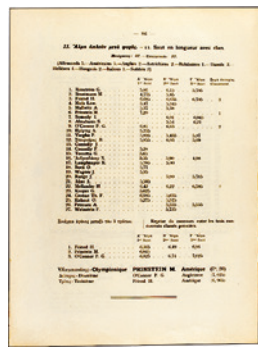
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1. **St. Louis 1904. Chief Inspector's Badge of the A.A.U. Athletic Meet, June 2, 3, 4, 1904.** Goldplated, 30x35mm, by Dieges & Clust, New York. Pax with rising sun, "Universal Exposition/St. Louis, USA, 1904". With Chief Inspector's Bar and red-white-blue ribbon inscribed in gold. Many of the contestants competed successfully in the Olympic Games Athletic Week and won medals: Meyer Prinstein, John Flanagan, Martin J. Sheridan, etc. All sport events during the Fair were considered Olympic events. EF. (\$2,250)
2. **St. Louis 1904. Large 880 Yards Winner's Wall Plaque Presented by the New York Pastime Athletic Club.** Wood with silver(ed?) attachments, 47x57cm (18.5"x22.5"), made by Dieges & Clust, New York. Panel with "OLYMPIAD" in center over large olive branch, victorious nude athlete at top left, panel at lower right surrounded by scroll with Athletic Club legend, Club's logo dividing "19-04" above "880 Yds. Run". EF. Unique. (\$3,500)

3. **St. Louis 1904. Program of Olympic Games and World's Championship Contests.** 80pp., one photographic plate of the Physical Culture Gymnasium, 15x22.7cm (5.9"x8.9"). Complete schedule May - November, Regulations for all events, all events by date with list of awards, full page illustrations of Marathon and 100 Yards trophies. Stiff covers soiled, lower r. corner detached, spine taped, ex-library. Contents disbound, abt. EF. Extremely rare. (\$1,200)

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4. **St. Louis 1904. (Official Report) Spalding’s Official Athletic Almanac for 1905, Edited by J.E. Sullivan. Olympic Games Number Containing the Official Report of the Olympic Games of 1904.** New York, 1905. 290pp. profusely illustrated, with photos of all Olympic events, 13x17cm (5.1”x6.7”), plus 26pp. of advertisements for athletic equipment. Includes all Olympic events May to November 1904, summary of Olympic events, IOC Session in London 1904 and Rome awarded the 1908 Olympic Games. Original blue and white cover, large tear on back cover, spine chipped, contents EF. Very rare. **(\$3,750)**
5. **Athens 1906. Gold American Olympic Committee Member’s Badge.** Unmarked gold, 32x44mm, by Dieges & Clust, New York. Greek and U.S. shield over “MEMBER” and A.A.U. logo. “Olympic Games/Held at Athens Greece/1906” legend. Two prongs on rev. Earliest U.S. American Committee badge. EF. **(\$2,200)**
6. **Athens 1906. The Official Results/Report. Bulletin of the Committee of the Olympic Games in Athens, No. 4, June 2, 1906. International Olympic Games 1906 Results.** 106pp., 21.5x28.5cm (8.5”x11.2”), in Greek and French. **This is the actual report of the 1906 Games** with list of all participants; list of each participant with result for each event, list of jury members, etc. Bound in linen and marbled boards, contents browning, disbound. First four pages lower right corner chipped, vertical center crease, otherwise mostly abt. EF. Extremely rare official report. **(\$8,000)**
7. **Stockholm 1912. Cased Bronze Third Place Winner’s Medal.** Bronze, 33mm, by Erik Lindberg and Bertram MacKenna, struck by Sporrang & Co. Herald proclaiming Olympic Games, bust of Ling on pedestal at r. Rev. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Housed in green leather presentation case, goldstamped logo and legend on top, lined in green velvet and cream silk. EF. **(\$6,500)**
8. **Antwerp 1920. (Ticket) Season Pass, August 1920, Olympic Stadium, Loge “O”, “II”.** Stiff green (faded) stock paper, 10.8x9.1cm (4.3”x3.6”). With facsimile signature. Athletic events were held in the stadium in August. Lt. corner creases, faded color, especially on obverse, VF. Extremely rare, first one we ever offered. *Photo on previous page.* **(\$2,000)**
9. **Paris 1924. The Johnny Weissmuller Sèvres Porcelain Award Vase – To the Winner of Five Gold Swimming Medals, Future Tarzan Movie Star.** Sèvres porcelain 33.3cm (13.1”), designed by talented artist M.O. Guillonet and executed by Bracquemond at the world-famous porcelain factory of Sèvres. Golden laurel branches are handpainted on French blue background, the medallions depicting Swimming, Football, Rowing and Rugby on gray background with green border. *Johnny Weissmuller won in Paris 1924 gold medals in 100m freestyle (Duke Kahanamoku second), 400m freestyle, and 4x200m freestyle, additionally a bronze Water Polo team medal. In Amsterdam 1928 he again won gold in 100m freestyle and 4x200m freestyle. In 1922 he broke Duke Kahanamoku’s world record in the 100m freestyle. All together, in addition to his Olympic gold medals, he won 52 national U.S. Championships, and set a total of 67 world records in swimming. The Associated Press declared him in 1950 to be the greatest swimmer of the first half of the 20th century. In 1932, he played, for the first time, Tarzan in the movie “Tarzan the Ape Man”, and he played that role for a total of 12 Tarzan movies. The vase is accompanied by a Johnny Weissmuller Enterprises certificate of authenticity, signed by his last wife, Maria Weissmuller. EF. A rare opportunity to add the trophy of a famous Olympian to ones’ collection.* **(\$25,000)**

10. **(Brochure/Report of the Games) Swiss Olympic Committee. Results of the Competitions of the 2nd Olympic Winter Games Organized in St. Moritz. 1928.** 24pp. illustrated, 24.5x32cm (9.7"x12.6"), in French. Detailed results for each participant in each event in St. Moritz. Included are sketches of the skating rink, the course of 50km skiing event, the ski jump, the Skeleton Cresta Run, the bobsleigh run, and the military ski patrol. Furthermore, the hockey finals on closing day and the closing ceremony in the stadium, the participation and winners medal etc. This is the information missing in the official report, and that is why we consider this to be the actual official report. Tear in center fold, corner creases, browning. Fine to VF. Extremely rare. **(\$17,000)**
11. **Lake Placid 1932 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal in Presentation Case.** Bronze, 54mm with scalloped edge, by Julio Kilenyi, struck by Robbins Co. Winged goddess of victory in clouds holding laurel wreath over Lake Placid site with venues. Rev. Olympic rings over Games legend, crossed laurel branches below. Housed in blue cardboard box by the Robbins Company, lightly scuffed around edges, inside EF, and extremely rare. Medal EF. **(\$35,000)**

12. **Helsinki 1940. Large Bronze Presentation Plaque of the Norwegian Olympic Committee.** Bronze, 26x49cm (10.2x19.3"), by T. Dammen. Medieval soldier and modern athlete facing left, large Olympic rings over 2-line legend "Johan Johnson/Fra Norges Olympia Komite 1939". In the upper right is attached a smaller size plaque of the same design in aluminum which was sold in 1939 to help fund the Norwegian team for the Helsinki 1940 Olympic Games. The large bronze plaque might be unique. EF. Very impressive. **(\$4,000)**
13. **40th IOC Session in Stockholm 1947. IOC Member Pin.** Goldplated, enamelled, 21mm. Circular legend "Comité International Olympique Stockholm 1947", Olympic rings in center. Only 28 IOC members attended the session, soon after the end of World War II. Oslo was selected to hold the 1952 Olympic Winter Games. EF. Very rare. **(\$1,250)**
14. **London 1948. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal.** Silver, 50mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Toned EF. **(\$9,000)**
15. **Helsinki 1952. Olympic Torch Relay Commission Presentation Tankard for Famous Finnish Runner Paavo Nurmi, Last Torch Runner and Lighter of the Olympic Cauldron at the Opening Ceremony, July 19, 1952.** Carved wood, 23cm (9.1") high, made by Kalevala Koru (KK). Two silver panels are attached on front and back, both engraved with writing in Finnish: "Helsinki XV Olympic Games / The Lighter of the Olympic Fire / Paavo Nurmi" (translated), and Olympic rings. The back panel reads "Torch Relay Committee/19.7.1952". Paavo Nurmi, "The Flying Finn", was a

dominant runner in the 1920's winning 3 gold medals and 1 silver medal in Antwerp 1920; 5 gold medals in Paris 1924 and 1 gold and 2 silver medals in Amsterdam 1928. He was honored to light the Olympic flame at the opening of the Helsinki 1952 Games. He is pictured on the 1940 and 1952 official posters. Panels with inscriptions toned, EF. (\$3,000)

- 16. **Cortina 1956 Winter. Cased Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 60mm, by Costantino Affer. Facing female head with flowing hair, Olympic rings on top. Rev. Ice crystal over Mount Pomagagnon. In white (!) original leather presentation case lined with white velvet, sm. hole on top, in original cardboard box (soiled). Medal original patina, EF. (\$6,000)
- 17. **Cortina 1956 Winter. Official Specimen Set of Gold, Silver and Bronze Winners Medals, and the Participation Medal by Lorioli Fratelli, Milano.** Goldplated, silver and bronze winner's medals, 60mm each, plus both sides of the participation medal. Mounted by the mint on blue velvet, with panel of mint's name below. One of only three sets made. EF. Very rare. (\$3,600)
- 18. **Squaw Valley 1960 Winter. Cased Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Speed Skating.** 55mm, made by the Herff Jones Co. Joint heads left of male and female athletes. Rev. Large Olympic rings encircled by legend, name of winning event, Patinage (Skating), below. *Squaw Valley was the first Olympiad where the name of the event was shown on the winners' medals.* Housed in its wooden presentation case with "VIII/Olympic Winter Games" over Olympic rings in gold on top. Very rare, especially with case which has a few sm. chips. Medal EF. (\$20,000)



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19. **Grenoble 1968 Winter. Giant Slalom Bronze Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 60mm, by Roger Excoffon, struck at the Paris Mint. Logo within French legend. Rev. Depiction of giant slalom, "Slalom Geant" below. Housed in black leather presentation case, gold embossed logo on top, lined in white velvet and silk. Unc. (\$12,500)
20. **Sapporo 1972 Winter. Cased Organizing Committee Badge.** Silvered, 37x59mm, blue bar. White ribbon, yellow center stripe. In white leatherette case. EF. (\$2,400)
21. **Munich 1972. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal and Winner's Pin Awarded for Rowing.** Silver, 66m, by G. Marcks. Victory seated over stadium. Rev. Castor and Pollux, patrons of competitive sport and friendship. Loop at top, with chain. Edge inscribed with sport and name. Plus winner's lapel pin, 12x12mm, depicting Munich logo. Buyer will receive the full sport and name of the winner. Both EF. (2 pcs.) (\$11,000)

22. **Munich 1972. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Women's Gymnastics Floor Exercises.** Bronze, 66mm, by G. Marcks. Victory seated over stadium. Rev. Castor and Pollux, patrons of competitive sport and friendship. Loop at top, with chain. Edge inscribed with sport and name of winner. Buyer will receive the name of the winner. Olga Korbut won gold in this event. Toned EF. (\$9,000)

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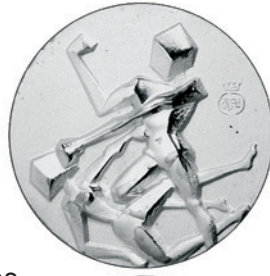
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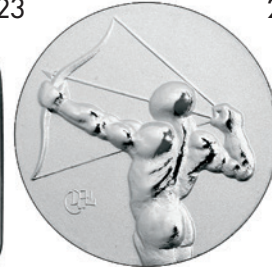
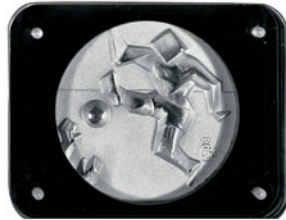
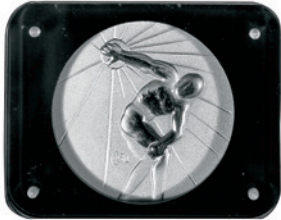

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23. **Los Angeles 1984. The Salvador Dali Collection of 11 Large Sport Silver Medals on the Occasion of the XXIII Olympiad Los Angeles 1984.** Silver, 45mm, "999", 46.2 grams each. Total weight 508 grams (12.65oz). made by Intercoin. Archer, soccer player, discus thrower, boxers, equestrian, gymnast, etc. Rev. Official emblem of the U.S Olympic Committee. *Dali wanted to show the artistic expression in the best way. According to the included 12-page brochure, each silver medal winner in Los Angeles was to receive a set of these silver medals.* Housed in black leather case (cover VF), with 12-page descriptive brochure for each medal, and certificate. Seldom seen artistic medals Salvador Dali set. **(\$1,250)**

24. **Los Angeles 1984. Mother Flame Safety Lamp of the 1984 New York to Los Angeles Torch Relay.** Goldplated brass, with glass window, 23.5cm (9.3") tall, made by Koehler Company. "FLAME SAFETY LAMP" on top. Used to safe-keep the Olympic fire during the torch relay from New York to Los Angeles. EF. Rare. **(\$7,000)**
25. **Atlanta 1996. Official Torch Signed by Muhammad Ali.** Aluminum and Georgia pecan wood, 80cm (31.5"), designed by Peter Mastrogiannis. 22 reeds represent the cities where Olympic Games were held since 1896. Gathered by 2 goldplated brass bands, the top band displays the Atlanta torch logo and the quilt of leaves design, the bottom band lists all Olympic cities since 1896. The wooden pecan handle represents the connection of the flame between heaven and earth. *The flame was lit in Olympia. It reached Los Angeles on April 27 and ended 84 days later in Atlanta, carried by 10,000 relay runners, horses, bicycles, trains, ships, and hydroplanes. The torch was signed by Muhammad Ali, and it is accompanied by a PSA letter of authenticity, and a second certificate of authenticity by SVS.* EF. **(\$4,000)**
26. **Nagano 1998 Winter. Safety Lamp for the Nagano Olympic Flame.** Brass and glass, 34.5cm (13.6") high, 26cm (10.2") wide. A small glass dome is guarding the flame inside the big glass dome. Goldplated Olympic rings affixed on base, on top is a multicolor Nagano logo on a brass plate. EF. Very rare safety lamp. **(\$9,000)**
27. **Sydney 2000. Australia Thirty Dollars One Kilogram Silver Coin, 2000.** 10cm (3.9"), Head of Queen Elizabeth II of England. Rev. Color logo of the Sydney Games surrounded by illustrations of Olympic sports in Sydney. Housed in wooden case with logo on top. Proof, Unc. **(\$460)**

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28. **Beijing 2008. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Rowing.** Silver, 70mm, with circle of inlaid light green jade. Winged goddess of Victory above Panathenian Stadium in Athens. Rev. Logo in center surrounded by jade, event engraved at top and bottom. Ornate loop, with red and orange ribbon with "Beijing 2008" and Olympic rings. *The buyer will receive the name of the winner.* Housed in red lacquer box within silver silk case. Rim bump on obv., o.w. EF. **(\$16,000)**

29. **Beijing 2008. Official Safety Lamp for Safekeeping of the Olympic Fire During the Torch Relay.** Silvered, partially red color, 31cm (12.2") high, 9x9cm (3.5"x3.5") wide. Lucky red clouds on all four sides of the mother flame safety lamp, surrounding the logo on the front, and lucky silver clouds adorn the lower part. The design was inspired by the lanterns used in ancient Chinese palaces. With igniter and key. Housed in a large original wooden box. EF. Rare. **(\$8,500)**

30. **Rio 2016. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal in Presentation Case.** Sterling silver, 8.5cm (3.3"), obverse by Elena Votsi and Kostas Kazakos. Winged Nike, Goddess of Victory, over the Panathinaiko Stadium in Athens, the Acropolis in background. Rev. The Rio 2016 Olympic logo. With green and multicolor ribbon. Unawarded. *The 85mm medal weighs approximately 500 grams according to the enclosed certificate of authenticity.* Housed in its unround wooden case with the logo impressed on top and in a cardboard box. With certificate of authenticity of the Brazil Mint in Rio, and a congratulatory small brochure of the IOC. EF. **(\$30,000)**

# Torches of the Olympic Games



## Summer Torches

31. **Berlin 1936. Official Torch.** Steel, 27cm high (10.5"), made by Krupp Factory, designed by Carl Diem. Route of torch run from Olympia to Berlin on shaft, legend on top. Carried during the first Olympic torch relay from Olympia, Greece to Berlin, a distance of 307 km in 12 days. EF. (\$6,500)
32. **London 1948. Official Torch.** Aluminum alloy, 47cm (18.5"). Cut-out Olympic rings over "XIVth Olympiad 1948. Olympia to London With Thanks to the Bearer". EF. (\$9,750)
33. **Helsinki 1952. Official IOC-Sanctioned Helsinki 1952 Torch Replica.** Hallmarked sterling silver and birchwood, 59.4cm (23.4") tall, made by the maker of the original 23 torches for the 1952 Games. Olympic rings and an open olive wreath are attached in the top center, engraved circular legend below: "XV Olympia Helsinki 1952". It is almost impossible to find an original 1952 Helsinki torch nowadays as most are in museums or collections, and the last Helsinki torch sold for around \$800,000. While IOC President J. Rogge's gave permission to have five 1952 Helsinki torches remade by the original manufacturer. Permission was also granted by the Finnish IOC member. The torch, made of hallmarked sterling silver and birchwood, is exactly the same as the original 1952 torch; 60cm (23.6") high. This is the last of the five torches not already firmly in collectors/museums hands. With certificate of authenticity. EF. (\$75,000)
34. **Tokyo 1964. Official Torch.** The bowl is made of blackened aluminum alloy, 16.8cm (6.6") wide. The cylinder is clad with stainless steel, length 64.8cm (25.5"). Bowl is inscribed "XVII Olympiad Tokyo 1964" and Olympic rings. The bottom of the cylinder features the Tokyo official logo. In original cardboard box. Unused, EF. Rare. (\$18,500)
35. **Mexico City 1968. Official Black Torch.** Black painted aluminum, part of shaft made of wood, 52.8cm (20.9"). Silver colored doves around top. The black torch was used in the torch relay from Olympia to Athens, Greece. EF. (\$2,750)
36. **Munich 1972. Official Torch.** Steel, 73cm (28.8"), made by Krupp. The fire was lit in Olympia, Greece on July 28 and carried 5539km in 29 days to Munich by 5976 runners. EF. (\$2,500)
37. **Montreal 1976. Official Red and Black Torch.** Aluminum, 66cm (30") tall. Stem painted red, with Montreal logo, top painted black. Designed by George Huel and Michael Dall. The flame was carried from Olympia, Greece to Athens where it was transferred by satellite to Ottawa; 245 runners carried it to Montreal. EF. Scarce in this condition. (\$5,000)
38. **Moscow 1980. Official Torch.** Aluminum alloy, gray and gold, Moscow logo and legend in red, 56cm (22.5") high, designed by Boris Tuchin. Runners carried the torch during the 30-day torch relay from Olympia, Greece through Bulgaria and Romania to Moscow, a distance of 4976 km. Small bump, o.w. EF. (\$3,250)
39. **Los Angeles 1984. Official Torch.** Brass-finished aluminum with tan leather handle, length 56.5cm (22.4"). Bowl portrays Olympic rings, motto and L.A. Memorial Coliseum Stadium. Flame lit in Olympia, Greece on May 7, 1984, and it arrived in New York the following day. It took 82 days to carry the flame through 33 states, 9,375 miles, to Los Angeles. EF, in original black leather pouch. (\$3,500)
40. **Seoul 1988. Official Torch.** Brass 50cm (20"), with tan leather handle, designed by Lee Woo-Sing. Bowl depicts dragons, Seoul Olympic logo enameled in color below. EF. Scarce in this condition. (\$7,000)
41. **Barcelona 1992. Official Torch.** Chrome-plated aluminum, 65cm (23.6"), designed by André Rich. "XXV Olympiad Barcelona 1992" legend and goldplated Barcelona emblem. Rubbing on leather part as usual, o.w. EF. (\$5,750)



42. **Official 1996 Centennial of the Olympic Games Torch.** Silvered aluminum and wood, 55cm (21.65"). Names of all 23 Olympic cities from 1896 to 1996 inscribed on torch. *The Hellenic Olympic Committee celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the 1896 Olympic Games in the Panathenian Stadium in Athens on April 6, 1996. Part of this celebration was the re-enactment of the 1896 Games. Olympic medalists and representatives of all cities who had hosted the Olympic Games since 1896 took part in the torch run within the stadium. Afterwards, they took the torches back to their Olympic cities for a ceremony.* EF. **(\$4,000)**
43. **Atlanta 1996. Official Torch.** Aluminum and Georgia pecan wood, 80cm (31.5"), designed by Peter Mastrogiannis. 22 reeds represent the cities where Olympic Games were held since 1896. Gathered by 2 goldplated brass bands, the top band displays the Atlanta torch logo and the quilt of leaves design, the bottom band lists all Olympic cities since 1896. The wooden pecan handle represents the connection of the flame between heaven and earth. *The flame was lit in Olympia. It reached Los Angeles on April 27 and ended 84 days later in Atlanta, carried by 10,000 relay runners, horses, bicycles, trains, ships, and hydroplanes.* EF. **(\$2,500)**
44. **Sydney 2000. Official Torch.** Three layers consisting of polished stainless steel, anodized aluminum and coated aluminum, 77cm (30.5"), designed by Blue Sky Design, Sydney, manufactured by G.A. & L. Harrington. The three layers represent earth, fire and water. Silver part at top litly. blackened from being carried in torch relay, o.w. EF. **(\$4,000)**
45. **Athens 2004. Official Torch.** Silver colored metal and olive wood, 68cm (26.8") long. The torch resembles an olive leaf, and the design wants to express "Pan Metron Ariston" (All things in moderation, translated from Greek). A simple and beautiful design. EF. **(\$2,750)**
46. **Beijing 2008. Official Torch.** Red and anodized aluminum, 72cm (18.4") long. Curved form in the shape of a paper scroll, with lucky clouds graphic expressing harmony. *The torch relay started in Olympia, Greece, on March 24, traveled to over 100 cities on five continents and all of China, a distance of 137,000km.* EF. **(\$5,500)**

47. **London 2012. Official Torch.** Gold-colored aluminum alloy, 80cm (31.5"), designed by Edward Barber and Jay Osgerby, made by The Premier Group, Coventry. Triangular form made out of an inner and outer sheet with 8000 holes representing the 8000 torch bearers in Great Britain. EF. **(\$6,500)**
48. **Rio 2016. Official Torch.** Recycled aluminum and resin, 69 cm (27") high. The colorful layers reflect the Ground (like the Copacabana Promenade), the Sea (blue ocean ripples), the Mountains (green natural beauty surrounding Rio), and the Sky at the top with the yellow sun (the flame). Used in the torch relay, light discoloration inside the top, torch EF. In original tube. A beautiful torch reflecting the beautiful location of Rio. **(\$4,000)**

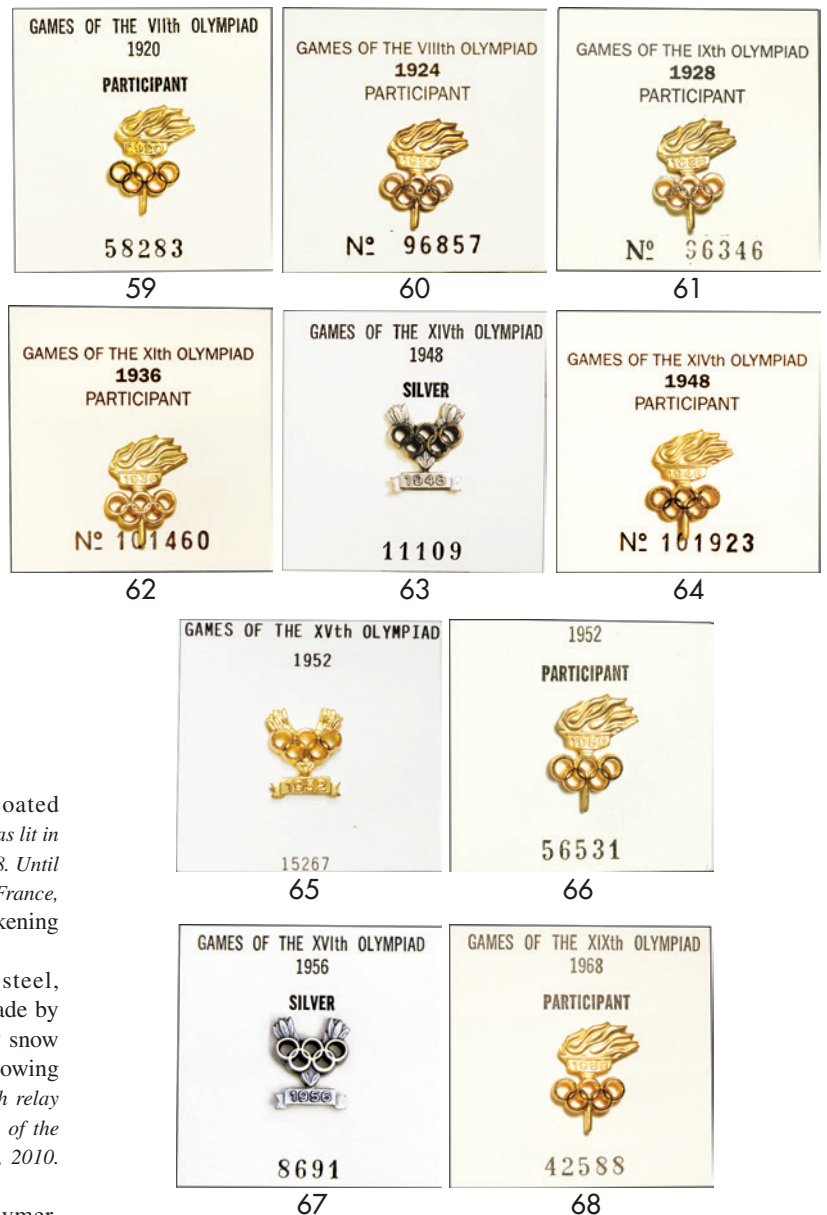
49. **Official Torch of the First Winter Olympic Relay.** Silver colored alloy of brass and steel, 22cm (8.7") high, 32x15.5cm (12.6"x6.1") wide, designed by Geir Grung and Adolf Thoresen. On the oval top are the Olympic rings and "1952", also "Morgedal" pointing with an arrow to "Oslo". Name of Ragnar Navelsaker and Date, February 13, 1952, engraved on bowl when he carried the torch. *Cauldrons were burning already in Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 and St. Moritz 1948 but Oslo staged the first torch relay of the Olympic Winter Games. A fire was lit on February 13 in the birthplace of 19th century legend Sondre Norheim (1825-1897), considered the father of skiing in Norway, in Morgedal, Telemark. 94 skiers carried the flame for 225km through Kongsberg, Drammen, the Huseby Hill at Oraker where skiing competitions had been held since 1879, to Oslo where it arrived on February 15 for the Opening Ceremony in Bislett Stadium. The last torchbearer was Eigil Nansen, grandson of the Norwegian Polar explorer Fridtjof Nansen.* EF, lt. discoloration around top opening from the flame, o.w. EF. Rare and important torch of about 100 of the First Winter Olympic Torch Relay. **(\$65,000)**

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- 49a. **Sapporo 1972 Winter. Official Torch Used in the Torch Relay.** Bowl cast blackened aluminum alloy, 13x21cm (5.1"x8.3"), with stainless steel flame tube, total 56cm (22") long, designed by Munemichi Yanagi, made by Nippon Kokki Co. The bowl and the tube display the Sapporo Olympic emblem. Used in the torch relay. Lt. wear to bowl, tube discolored from flame, o.w. abt. EF. Rare. (\$29,500)
50. **Calgary 1988 Winter. Official Torch Used in the Torch Relay.** 60cm (23.6"), Maplewood handle with pictograms of 10 Olympic winter sports, steel torch bowl at top with Calgary Olympic legend in English and French. Inside top of bowl blackened from the flame. *The flame was flown from Athens, Greece to St. John, Newfoundland. In 88 days, it was carried about 18,000 km across Canada by 6,520 torchbearers sharing torches. Only about 100 torches were made. With black carrying pouch. EF. Very rare. (\$39,500)*

51. **Albertville 1992 Winter. Official Torch.** Steel, 42cm (16.5"), up to 8cm (3.2") wide, designed by famous French designer Philippe Starck. The torch, when turned over, has the shape of a flame. *The flame was lit in Olympia on November 27, 1991, when the relay through Greece started. It left Greece on December 8 on the Concorde to visit about 70 countries and islands worldwide, to arrive in Paris on December 14. 5,500 torchbearers carried the flame 5,536 km (3,440 miles) around France to Albertville where the cauldron was lit at the opening ceremony on February 8, 1992, by Michel Platini and Francoise-Cyrille Grange, a Savoyard girl. One of only 100 torches, numbered, and very difficult to find. EF. (\$65,000)*
52. **Lillehammer 1994 Winter. Official Torch.** Birchwood handle, 153cm (60") long, designed by A. Marandon and P.J. Kahrs. The upper part is cast aluminum with 5 wicks for lighting the torch with paraffin. This torch was used in the torch relay. One of only 300 torches. Very scarce torch. Nick on top, o.w. VF-EF (\$32,500)
53. **Nagano 1998 Winter. Official Torch.** Aluminum, partially gilt, 55cm (21.7") long. Designed after ancient Japanese torches called Taimatsu. It shows the Nagano emblem and sports pictograms, and a brightly colored orange cord wrapped around the lower part forms the grip. Fueled with clean burning propane, it burnt for about 20 minutes. *The torch relay in Japan took place from January 6 until February 7, when the Olympic fire was lit during the opening ceremony. Choice EF, in original cardboard box. (\$6,000)*
54. **Salt Lake City 2002 Winter. Official Torch.** Silver colored metal and glass, 83.8cm (33") long. Shaped like a fiery icicle in motion, the polished silver colored bottom bears the motto "Light the fire within"; center metal and glass top section in "frozen flame" texture with logo on metal part. Used in the torch relay, glass blackened at top (may be wiped clean). EF. (\$3,250)



55. **Torino 2006. Official Torch.** Blue techno-polymer-coated aluminum, 77cm (30.3”) long, made by Pininfarina. *The fire was lit in Olympia on November 27, 2005, and arrived in Rome on December 8. Until February 10 the torch traveled over 11,300 km across Italy, also France, Switzerland and Slovenia. Used in the torch relay with light darkening around upper part (may be wiped off).* EF. **(\$2,200)**
56. **Vancouver 2010 Winter. Official Torch.** Stainless steel, aluminum and sheet molding compound, 94.5cm (37.1”) made by Bombardier. The lines of the torch reflect the lines made by snow and ice winter sports. It shows the engraved motto “With Glowing Hearts / Des plus brilliants exploits” and the logo. *The torch relay ended after its 45000km journey through Canada with the lighting of the Olympic flame cauldron at the opening ceremony on February 12, 2010.* EF, in its protective bag. **(\$2,200)**
57. **Sochi 2014 Winter. Official Torch.** Aluminum and polymer, partially red, 95cm (37.4”) high, 14.5cm (5.7”) wide, designed by Vladimir Pirozhkov and Andrei Vodyanik. The design of the torch reminds of the feather of the Firebird, a magical bird in Russian folklore. *The fire was lit on September 29, 2013 in Olympia; the torch relay started in Russia on October 7, reached the North Pole on October 20, was flown into space by a Soyuz rocket, reached Europe’s highest mountain (Mount Elbrus) and the world’s deepest lake (Lake Baikal). It ended at the opening ceremony on February 7, 2014, in Sochi.* EF. **(\$4,000)**
58. **Sochi 2014 Winter. Official Paralympic Torch.** Aluminum and polymer, partially blue, 95cm (37.4”) high, 14.5cm (5.7”) wide, designed by Vladimir Pirozhkov and Andrei Vodyanik. The design of the torch reminds of the feather of the Firebird, a magical bird in Russian folklore. *The torch relay was held from February 26 to March 7, 2014, and passed through all eight Federal Districts of Russia.* EF. **(\$4,000)**

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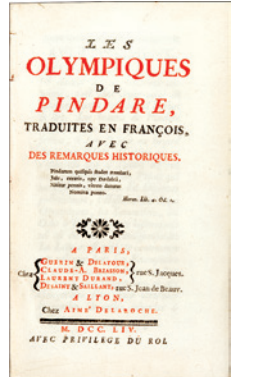

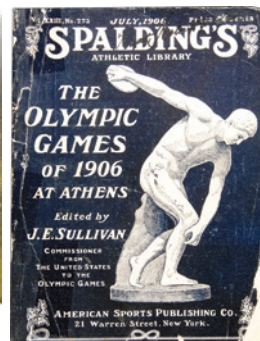
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### PARIS, 2nd OLYMPIC GAMES, 1900

The 1900 Paris Olympic Games were held in conjunction with the World's Exposition. They played only a minor role. There were athletes who didn't know that the events they participated in were Olympic Games events. Few items relate directly to the Games. For this reason, we are also offering items commemorating the World Exposition.

Victorious athlete on podium inscribed "Concours de Sapeurs-Pompiers". All events in Paris 1900 were considered Olympic events. EF. Very scarce. **(\$2,500)**
- 98. **Bronze Award Medal of the Paris 1900 World's Exposition, Awarded to the Property Management of Franz Joseph, Emperor of Austria.** 63mm, by Chaplain. Head of French Republic r. Rev. ### ST. LOUIS, 3rd OLYMPIC GAMES, 1904

The 1904 Olympic Games in St. Louis were also held in conjunction with a World's Fair. This, again, detracted a lot from the importance of the Games.
