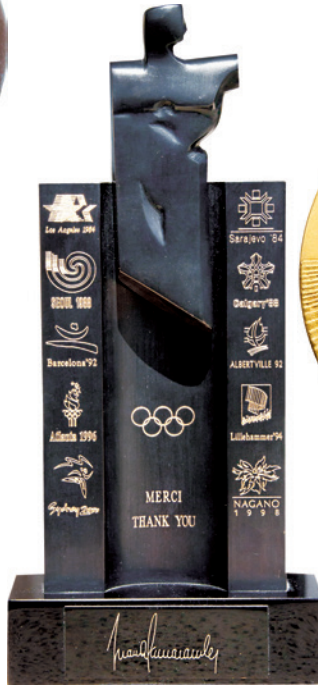

33. **Rosa Serra Sculpture. IOC Award for Sport and Universality, Presented in 2000 to Judge Rudolph Harper, President of the Guyana Olympic Association.** Bronze, 22.5cm (8.9”) by Rosa Serra, Catalonia, Spain. Extended arm holding turnable globe with all continents, engraved in French and English gold lettering and Olympic rings. Award plaque on base “Presented to Judge Rudolph Harper”. Sculptor’s name “rosaserra” engraved on back of base. *Harper was President of the Guyana NOC from 1998 to 2000.* EF. **(\$1,500)**
34. **Rosa Serra, Sculptor. Merci. Thank You. President Juan A. Samaranch’s Farewell Gift to IOC Members at the End of His Presidency in 2002.** Bronze sculpture, 23.2cm (9.1”), 11cm (4.3”) high, by Rosa Serra, Catalonia/Spain. Two columns with the Summer (l.) and Winter Olympic Games (r.) in gold when Samaranch was President of the IOC: from Sarajevo 1984 to Sydney 2000. In the center are the Olympic rings above “Merci. Thank You”, an 11cm high, 3-dimensional torso, a favorite subject of Serra, at the top. The base, 10.9x3.9x3cm, displays a gold facsimile signature of Juan A. Samaranch. The reverse is inscribed with the sculptor’s name in gold “rosaserra.” *Rosa Serra, the famous Spanish sculptor, was a friend of President Samaranch, and he asked her to create sculptures representing the different Olympic sports, an area she had not explored previously. She became renowned for her sport sculptures, being praised for having force and motion. President Samaranch asked her to create this rare farewell gift.* EF. **(\$3,000)**
35. **Athens 2004. Cased Gold First Place Winner’s Medal Awarded for Baseball.** Goldplated silver, 60mm, by Elena Votsi and Kostas Kazakos. Winged Nike over Panathinaikon Stadium, Acropolis in background. Rev. Athens 2004 logo and Olympic flame dividing 4-line Greek legend, sport in Greek language below. With multicolor ribbon. *For the first time since Amsterdam 1928, the design of the winner’s medals was changed. From now on the medals will reflect the fact that Greece was the country where the Olympic Games originated, and saw their revival.* Housed in presentation case. EF. **(\$18,000)**
36. **Athens 2004. Cased Silver Second Place Winner’s Medal Awarded for Women’s Soccer Won by Brazil.** Silver, 60mm, by Elena Votsi and Kostas Kazakos. Winged Nike over Panathinaikon Stadium, Acropolis in background. Rev. Athens 2004 logo and

Olympic flame dividing 4-line Greek legend, sport in Greek language below. With multicolor ribbon. *For the first time since Amsterdam 1928, the design of the winner’s medals was changed. From now on the medals will reflect the fact that Greece was the country where the Olympic Games originated, and saw their revival.* Housed in presentation case. With certificate signed by winner. EF. **(\$12,000)**

37. **Torino 2006 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal for Skiing Nordic Combined and Housed in its Presentation Case.** Bronze, 10.7cm (4.2"), designed by Dario Quatrini. Torino logo. Rev. Ski jumper and cross-country skier, engraved "Nordic Combined/LH Team". Edge inscribed "XX Olympic Winter Games" in Italian, French and English. The empty space in the center represents the Italian plaza. *The size of the medal makes it even larger than the Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 winner's medal.* With multicolored ribbon and housed in its presentation case and cardboard box. EF. (\$12,500)

38. **London 2012. Safety Lamp of the Olympic Torch Relay.** Brass with glass window, 23cm (9.1") high, made by Protective Lamp & Lighting Co. Ltd. The front has an oval plaque with the London 2012 logo, "Olympic Torch Relay" below. On the back is the maker's name. *The lamps guarded the original flame from Olympia throughout the torch relay, especially at night, and was ready to relight the flame if it was needed during the day.* EF. Very rare. (\$9,000)

39. **Sochi 2014 Winter. Bronze Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 10cm (3.9"), made by Adamas Co. The medal includes four inset polycarbonate crystals showing the Sochi 2014 "Patchwork Quilt", a mosaic of national designs from the various cultures and ethnicities of the Russian Federation (IOC). The obverse is inscribed with the logo "Sochi.ru 2014" and Olympic rings, the reverse shows large Olympic rings. The edge is inscribed "XXIII Olympic Winter Games" in Russian, French and English. Complete with blue ribbon. Unawarded. Housed in its large presentation case (small crack on back). Medal Unc. (\$25,500)

40. **8th Olympic Congress in Prague, 1925. Commemorative Badge with Ribbon in Czech Colors.** Bronze, 30x35mm uniface. View of Moldawa River with kajak and Prague Castle Hradshin. With loop, ring and ribbon. EF. Rare. (\$350)
 41. **8th Olympic Congress in Prague Badge, 1925.** Bronze, 30x35mm. View of Moldawa River with Hradshin Castle. EF. (\$300)
 42. **8th Olympic Congress and 23rd I Session in Prague, 1925.** Pair of Portuguese NOC Badges. Gilt, blue, and white enamel, 25x33mm each. Olympic rings over "COP", "1925" date above. *Henri de Baillet-Latour was elected IOC President, after Coubertin retired.* EF. (2 pcs.) (\$350)
 43. **24th IOC Session in Lisbon, Portugal, 1926. IOC Member Badge.** Silverplated, 28x34mm. Color rings above crowned city shield, "Lisboa 1926" below. *St. Moritz was selected for the 2nd Olympic Winter Games, and Chamonix was officially declared to be the first Olympic Winter Games.* EF. Rare. (\$500)
 - 43a. **Ninth IOC Congress in Berlin, 1930. IOC Member Pin.** Goldplated, 24x17 mm. Color rings affixed on globe with "Berlin 1930". EF. Rare. (\$800)
 44. **40th IOC Session in Stockholm, 1947. IOC Member Pin.** Goldplated, enamelled, 21mm. Circular legend "Comité International Olympique Stockholm 1947", Olympic rings in center. *Only 28 IOC members attended the session, soon after the end of World War II. Oslo was selected to hold the 1952 Olympic Winter Games.* EF. Very rare. (\$1,200)
 45. **45th IOC Session in Copenhagen, Denmark, 1950. IOC Member Badge.** Silver, 20x28mm. The Little Mermaid statue in Copenhagen's harbor over "IOC/Copenhagen/1950" and Olympic rings. *Only 32 IOC members attended.* EF. Very rare. (\$900)
 46. **45th IOC Session in Vienna, 1951. Swedish NOC (President's?) Badge.** 25x25mm. Gold and cream, 25x25mm, Swedish flag in color. EF. (\$400)
 47. **53rd IOC Session in Sofia, Bulgaria Badge, 1957.** Gilt, white enamel, 23mm. Only 36 IOC members attended. EF. Scarce. (\$450)
 48. **56th IOC Session in Munich, 1959. National Olympic Committee Badge.** Multicolor enamel, 24x21mm. Olympic rings above Munich child, symbol of Munich. With blue ribbon inscribed "CON". Ribbon chipped on right side, badge EF. Rare. (\$300)
 49. **56th IOC Session in Munich, 1959. Official Session Logo Pin.** Goldplated, silver, multi-color enamel, 25x23mm. Olympic rings above stylized Munich child logo. Scarce. EF. (\$80)
 50. **59th IOC Session in Athens, 1961. IOC Staff (?) Badge.** Silvered, 25mm. Copy of an ancient Greek coin with head of Athena on obv. Rev. Owl of Athens. With white ribbon, red stripe in center, attachment for name at bottom. EF. Rare. (\$500)
 51. **60th IOC Session in Moscow, 1962. International Federation Badge.** Multicolor enamel, 41x37mm. With blue ribbon. EF. (\$350)
 52. **61st IOC Session in Baden-Baden, 1963. International Federation Badge.** Gilt, 60x20mm. Silver and red session logo at left, color rings at r. Clasp closure. EF. (\$300)
 53. **61st IOC Session in Baden-Baden, 1963. Swiss NOC Badge.** Gilt, 60x20mm. Silver and black session logo at left, color rings above "Suisse". Clasp closure. EF. (\$300)
 54. **62nd IOC Session in Innsbruck, 1964. Future Olympic City Organizing Committee Badge.** Multicolor enamel, 28x34mm. View of Innsbruck, Alpine mountains in background. With red ribbon. *Grenoble was selected to host the 1968 Olympic Winter Games.* EF. Rare. (\$400)



55. **64th IOC Session in Madrid 1965. "France" Badge.** Silvered, dark blue enamel, 31x50mm. With dark blue ribbon. Tiny chips in white enamel, o.w. EF. Rare. (\$400)
56. **64th IOC Session in Madrid, 1965. Press Badge.** Gilt, red and white enamel, "PRENSA" inscription. With red ribbon. Partial toning, EF. (\$300)
57. **64th IOC Session in Madrid, 1965. Hostess Badge.** Silvered, 31x56mm. With light blue ribbon (faded). Badge EF. (\$250)
58. **65th IOC Session in Rome, 1966. F.S.I. Badge (International Ski Federation).** Silvered, multicolor enamel, 31x48mm. *Sapporo and Munich were selected to host the 1972 Olympic Games.* EF. (\$500)
59. **66th IOC Session in Tehran, 1967. National Olympic Committee Badge.** Silvered, partially gilt, rings in color, 48x40mm. Blue enameled bar attached at bottom "N.O.C.". EF. Rare. (\$2,500)
60. **68th IOC Session in Warsaw Badge, 1969.** Silvered, 50mm. Mermaid with sword and shield, symbol of Warsaw behind legend and Olympic rings. EF. (\$200)
61. **70th IOC Session in Amsterdam, 1970.** Silvered, 17mm with red rosette and two ribbons. *Denver was selected for the 1976 Olympic Winter Games, and Montreal for the Olympic Summer Games.* EF. Scarce. (\$200)
62. **71st IOC Session in Luxembourg, 1971. IOC Badge.** Goldplated, multicolor enamel, 35x45 mm. With white ribbon. EF. (\$400)
63. **72nd IOC Session in Sapporo Badge, 1972.** Black with gold legend and silver snowflake, 37x37mm. With two ribbons, stripes in Olympic colors in center. EF. Rare. (\$3,000)

64. **73rd IOC Session in Munich, 1972. IOC Badge.** Silvered, multicolor enamel, 27x27mm. With gold ribbon inscribed "CIO". Abt. EF. (\$700)
65. **73rd IOC Session in Munich, 1972. Television Network Badge.** Silvered, multicolor enamel, 27x27mm. With orange ribbon. Light handling, VF-EF. (\$200)
66. **10th Olympic Congress in Varna, 1973. Portuguese NOC Badge.** Silvered, 26x26mm. Color enameled Portuguese shield. EF. (\$120)
67. **10th Olympic Congress in Varna, 1973. Pair of Badges.** Gilt, and silvered, each 27x32mm, rings in color. Both EF. (2 pcs.) (\$120)
68. **74th IOC Session in Varna, 1973. Pair of Session Badges.** Goldplated and silvered, red enameled logo, 20x45mm. EF. (2 pcs.) (\$120)
69. **75th IOC Session in Vienna, 1974. Named IOC Commission Member Badge.** Goldplated, red and yellow enamel, 30x50mm. With red ribbon, white center stripe. *Lake Placid and Moscow were selected to host the 1980 Olympic Games.* EF. (\$350)
