

- 278. **Small Size Presentation Torch on Pedestal.** Torch is like the larger relay torch, only smaller. 41cm (16.1") high, on black wooden pedestal, total height 52cm (20.5"). EF. (**\$1,200**)
- 279. '88 Nagoya Olympic Games Bid Medal (1981). Silvered bronze, 65mm. Red and white enameled bid logo. Rev. Nagoya temple over flowers. Seoul and Nagoya, Japan, were the only cities bidding for the 1988 Olympic Games. Seoul was awarded the 1988 Games at the Baden-Baden 1981 IOC Session. EF, cased. (\$160)
- 280. Set of Five U.S. Team Silver Medals Housed in Velvet Presentation Case. Silver, 39mm, by Deak International. Featured are Tennis, Equestrian, Swimming and Hurdles, plus Skiing for Calgary Winter Games. Rev. USOC logo. Proof, Unc. (5 pcs.) (\$120)
- IOC Presentation Seoul 1988 Logo Box. Multicolor, handenamelled copper, 58mm, by Crummles, England. EF. (\$120)
- 282. The Seoul Olympic Villager, September 3 October 5, 1988. Official Newspaper of the Seoul Olympic Games. Illustrated in b&w and color. 33 issues, 27.2x39.4cm (10.7"x15.5"), in English and French. Bound in gilt boards. Complete. EF. (\$150)

ALBERTVILLE, 16th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 1992

283. Official Torch. Steel, 42cm (16.5"), up to 8cm (3.2") wide, designed by famous French designer Philippe Starck. The torch, when turned over, has the shape of a flame. The flame was lit in Olympia on November 27, 1991, when the relay through Greece started. It left Greece on December 8 on the Concorde to visit about 70 countries and islands worldwide, to arrive in Paris on December 14. 5,500 torchbearers carried the flame 5,536 km (3,440 miles) around France to Albertville where the cauldron was lit at the opening ceremony on February 8, 1992, by Michel Platini and Francoise-Cyrille Grange, a Savoyard girl. One of only 100 torches, numbered, and very difficult to find. EF. (\$65,000)

BARCELONA, 25th OLYMPIC GAMES, 1992

284. Paralympic Games Second Place Silver Winner's Medal. Silver, 66mm, by Xavier Corbero. Logo. Rev. "Paralympics/Barcelona "92" over Braille legend. With ribbon in Olympic colors. EF. (\$2,400)



- Official Torch of the U.S. Olympic Committee. Nickelplated, blue leather handle, 54cm (21.3"). USOC logo on top, wick inside top. Unused. EF. (\$900)
- Very Tall Plush Cobi the Sheepdog Mascot. Light yellow, 71cm (28"). Abt. EF. Scarce size. (\$200)
- 287. Pair of Official U.S. Team Mascot Dolls Two Sought-After Cabbage Patch Dolls. Each about 33cm (13") tall, wearing a shirt with "USA" over Olympic rings and "1992 Official Team Mascot" legend. Both EF. (2 pcs.) (\$120)
- 288. Large Portfolio of 15 Sports Color Prints by Jordi Aluma, Spain. 42x56cm (16.5"x22). 15 imposing sports prints are included in this set, all numbered in pencil, with a forward by IOC President Samaranch in four languages: J. Aluma presents a collection "composed of a selection of his vision of modern man, viewed through the prism of sports". Included are also biographical notes, and J. Aluma signed and numbered this set in pencil on the inside cover of the portfolio. Impressive set. EF. (\$950)
- 100th IOC Centennial Session in Lausanne, June 23/24, 1993 Badge. Goldplated, 32x67mm. With purple and white ribbon. EF. (\$100)
- 290. Twelfth Mediterranean Games in Agde Languedoc-Rouissillon, France, 1993. Gold Winner's Medal. Goldplated, 63mm. Abstract sports design. Rev. Legend and logo. With blue ribbon, in presentation case. Medal Unc. (\$200)

LILLEHAMMER, 17th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 1994

- 291. Official Torch. Birchwood handle, 153cm (60") long, designed by A. Marandon and P.J. Kahrs. The upper part is cast aluminum with 5 wicks for lighting the torch with paraffin. This torch was used in the torch relay. One of only 300 torches, and the largest of all torches. Abt. EF. (\$30,000)
- 292. **Participation Medal.** Copper, 66x76mm, by M. Kleppan. Pictograms of sporting events, ice crystals and Lillehammer Olympic emblem over Olympic rings. Rev. Modernistic ice crystal design with sports pictograms. EF. (**\$350**)
- 293. Trio of Hungarian Team Pins: Lillehammer 1994, Sydney 2000 and Sochi 2014. Each bronze, 31x43mm, with ribbon in Hungarian colors. All EF. (3 pcs.) (\$60)
- 294. **Group of 21 Russian NOC and Team Pins.** Included are Lillehammer 1994, Atlanta 1996 (3), Nagano 1998, Sydney 2000, Salt Lake City 2002 (2), Athens 2004 (4), Torino 2006 (2), Beijing 2008 (2), Vancouver 2010, London 2012, Sochi 2014, Rio 2016, plus an undated NOC pin. Scarce set. All Unc. (21 pcs.) (\$300)



295. **104th IOC Session in Budapest, 1995. Trio of Badges: IOC Badge, Organizing Committee Badge and Press Badge.** All goldplated, partially enameled, 35x65mm. With matching ribbons and cord. *Salt Lake City was selected to host the 2002 Winter Games.* All EF. (3 pcs.) (**\$280**)

ATLANTA, 26th OLYMPIC GAMES, 1996

- 296. Official IOC Atlanta Logo Presentation Box. Green side and white top, 60mm, 30mm high, hand enamelled by Crummles, England. *IOC present for IOC members and other distinguished persons*. Boxed with brochure. EF. (\$120)
- 297. Gold First Place Winner's Diploma Awarded for Fencing, Men's Team Foil. Multicolor, 21.6x30.5cm (8.5"x12"). The Russian Team won gold. EF, in slipcover. (\$500)
- 298. The IOC Pierre de Coubertin Award Medal for Education, Created in 1997. Goldplated bronze, 84mm (by André Ricard). Shape of a polished disk, Olympic rings in center emitting five rays of light in high relief, "CITIUS ALTIUS FORTIUS" around the edge. Rev. Bust 1. of Coubertin surrounded by "Medaille Pierre de Coubertin". The award is presented to people in the field of education who promoted the Olympic Movement. The first recipient in 1997 at the 106th IOC Session was President Samaranch. It is awarded yearly at IOC Sessions. With 18mm goldplated miniature pin with ribbon. Housed in green velvet case, gold rings on top. EF. (\$850)

NAGANO, 18th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 1998

299. Official Torch. Aluminum, partially gilt, 55cm (21.7") long. Designed after ancient Japanese torches called Taimatsu. It shows the Nagano emblem and sports pictograms, and a brightly colored orange cord wrapped around the lower part forms the grip. Fueled with clean burning propane, it burnt for about 20 minutes. *The torch relay in Japan took place from January 6 until February 7, when the Olympic fire was lit during the opening ceremony.* Choice EF, in original cardboard box. (\$6,000)

SYDNEY, 27th OLYMPIC GAMES, 2000

300. **Official Torch.** Three layers consisting of polished stainless steel, anodized aluminum and coated aluminum, 77cm (30.5"), designed by Blue Sky Design, Sydney, manufactured by G.A. & L. Harrington. The three layers represent earth, fire and water. Silver part at top ltly. blackened from being carried in torch relay, o.w. EF. (**\$4,000**)

- Participation Medal. Silvered, 50mm. Sydney Olympic logo. Rev.
 3-line legend over Olympic rings. EF, in original box. (\$300)
- 302. **"Manchester 2000" Olympic Bid Medal for IOC Members.** Oval silver, 42x54mm, cast by Royal Mint. Cauldron with flame over rings. Rev. Last torchbearer of the London 1948 Olympic Games. With 4-page brochure with photo of the torchbearer. 100 made and presented only to IOC members. Cased. EF. (\$200)

SALT LAKE CITY, 19th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2002

303. Official Torch. Silver colored metal and glass, 83.8cm (33") long. Shaped like a fiery icicle in motion, the polished silver colored bottom bears the motto "Light the fire within"; center metal and glass top section in "frozen flame" texture with logo on metal part. EF. (\$3,000)

TORINO, 20th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2006

- Cased Silver Participation Medal. Silvered bronze, 39mm. Logo. Rev. Olympic rings over motto. With circular cardboard, within clear round plastic case. EF. (\$180)
- Cased Bronze Participation Medal. Bronze, 39mm. Rev. Olympic rings over motto. With circular cardboard, within clear round plastic case. EF. (\$180)
- 306. **Pair of Mascots Neve and Glitz.** Red/white and blue/light blue plush, each 15cm (5.9") tall. With their official cardboard packaging. EF. (**\$150**)
- 307. Logo Poster. Multicolor, 48.5x68cm (19.1"x26.8"), printed by Bolaffi. Design in Olympic colors, official logo over motto on lower left. EF. (\$100)
- 308. **Official Report. 3 Volumes in Slipcover and Case.** In Italian, English and French. Report EF. Scarce. (**\$1,200**)

LONDON, 30th OLYMPIC GAMES, 2012

309. Official Torch. Gold-colored aluminum alloy, 80cm (31.5"), designed by Edward Barber and Jay Osgerby, made by The Premier Group, Coventry. Triangular form made out of an inner and outer sheet with 8000 holes representing the 8000 torch bearers in Great Britain. EF. (\$5,000)



- 310. Torch Relay Safety Lamp for Keeping the Olympic Flame From Olympia. Brass with glass window, 23cm (9.1") high, made by Protective Lamp & Lighting Co. Ltd. The front has an oval plaque with the London 2012 logo, "Olympic Torch Relay" below. On the back is the maker's name. *The lamps guarded the original flame from Olympia throughout the torch relay, especially at night, and was ready to relight the flame if it was needed during the day.* EF. Very rare. (\$9,000)
- Participation Medal. Cupro-nickel, 39mm. London 2012 logo. Rev. Olympic rings. Housed in black cardboard holder with London 2012 logo. Unc. (\$300)

SOCHI, 22nd OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2014

312. Chelyabinsk 2013 Meteorite Medal of Which Ten Medals were Presented to Sochi Gold Medal Winners on February 15, 2014. Made of brass, nickel, silver and gold, partial black enamel, 50mm, 7mm thick, 93.4 grams. An actual piece of the meteorite is embedded in the center of the obverse, between the sky and a view of Chelyabinsk, Siberia where the meteorite exploded over the city on February 15, 2013. Rev. Red and yellow enameled city shield over date of crash. 40 additional medals were also presented to high dignitaries. This medal is one of these medals. With certificate, housed in a blue velvet case. A historical rarity! (\$5,000)
