



2. **Athens 1896. Bronze Second Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. *First place winners of the 43 events received a silver medal, second place winners a bronze medal. No gold medals were awarded in the first Olympic Games.* Toned EF, in original red velvet-lined presentation case. Very rare. **(\$50,000)**
3. **Paris 1900. Olympic Gold Plaque Presented at the Paris 1900 Olympic Games.** Goldplated bronze, 41x59mm, by F. Vernon. Fame scattering laurel branches over exposition. Rev. Victorious athlete on podium inscribed "Exercices Physiques et Sports", the official name for the 1900 Olympic Games. Unc. **(\$1,500)**
4. **St. Louis 1904. Participation Medal.** Bronze, 40x40mm, made by Dieges & Clust, New York. Nude athlete striding r., laurel branch in hand. Rev. Legend in eleven lines, shields of St. Louis, France and U.S.A. between ivy leaves. Holed at top, toned EF. Rare. **(\$15,000)**
5. **Athens 1906. Cased Gold First Place Winner's Medal.** Goldplated silver, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. *Similar to 1896 winner's medal - only the date on the reverse was changed to 1906.* Housed in round presentation case. Nick on obv., sm. spots, rev., abt. EF. **(\$7,500)**
6. **Athens 1906. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal.** Silver, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. *Similar to 1896 winner's medal - only the date on the reverse was changed to 1906.* EF. **(\$6,500)**

7. **London 1908. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Middle Wrestling to Stanley Bacon, and Housed in its Presentation Case.** Gold hallmarked 15 Karat, 33mm, 27.95 grams, by Bertram MacKenna, struck by Vaughton & Son, Birmingham. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Rev. St. George slaying the dragon. Edge inscribed "Winner middle wrestling (c as c) s.v. bacon" Stanley Bacon competed in 1908, 1912 and 1920 Olympic Games, and he was a wrestling judge in Amsterdam 1928. The lot comes with a photographic postcard of Bacon at the age of 16; Bacon in uniform; and a congratulatory note on winning the London gold medal, EF. Case and medal are in rarely seen perfect condition, Unc. (4 pcs.) **(\$24,000)**

8. **Second Russian Olympic Games in Riga, 1914. Gold First Place Winner's Medal.** Goldplated 22x30mm. Russian bear pulling biga to left, stadium in background. Erased legend on reverse. With loop and ring. Very rare. VF-EF. (\$600)
9. **Second Russian Olympic Games in Riga, 1914. Second Place Winner's Medal.** Silvered, 21x27mm. Russian bear pulling biga to left, stadium in background, "III. II. P." engraved on top. (\$450)
10. **Chamonix 1924 Winter. Third Place Bronze Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by Raoul Benard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. An extremely rare winner's medal from the First Olympic Winter Games. The participation medal had the same design. Dark toning, EF. (\$16,000)

11. **St. Moritz 1928 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case.** Bronze, 50mm by Arnold Hünérwadel. Female skater with outstretched arms surrounded by icicles. Rev. 5-line French legend between olive branches, Olympic rings above. One of only 25 bronze winners medals. Housed in its cardboard presentation box in mint condition and very rare such. Medal toned EF. (\$12,000)
12. **Amsterdam 1928. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. *This design was selected in a competition by the IOC, and it stayed the winner's medals design through Mexico City 1968.* Toned EF. (\$6,000)
13. **Amsterdam 1928. Boxing Judge's Badge.** Silvered, partially enameled, 31x37mm. With light red rosette. Elbel S-8. Rare. EF. (\$3,500)

14. **Lake Placid 1932 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 54mm, with scalloped edge, by Julio Kilenyi, struck by Robbins Co. Winged goddess of victory in clouds holding laurel wreath over Lake Placid site with venues. Rev. Olympic rings over Games legend, crossed laurel branches below. EF. Very rare. (\$24,000)
15. **Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal.** Silver, "990" hallmark, 10cm (3.9"), 329 grams (about 11 oz), by Richard Klein, struck by Deschler, Munich. Victory holding laurel wreath riding in triga to left, bobsled, ski, hockey stick and skate below. Rev. Large Olympic rings surrounded by "IV Olympic Winter Games 1936" (translated from German). Largest size Olympic winner's medal until Torino 2006, and one of only 37 medals. Housed in green leatherette case with silver rings on detached top, lined in velvet, lower case incomplete, Fine. Medal EF. (\$30,000)

16. **Berlin 1936. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Toned EF. (\$7,000)
17. **Oslo 1952 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Won by a Member of the German Bobsled Team.** Goldplated silver 70mm, by V. Falireus/Knut Yren, struck by Th. Marthinsen C/S. Raised torch with Olympic rings within legend. Rev. Oslo City Hall outlines between snowflakes, 3-line legend below. *The German bobsled team comprised very heavy athletes; this gave them an advantage on the track, and they won both the Two-Man and Four-Man Event. The International Federation passed a rule prior to the Oslo Olympics limiting the weight of the athletes valid from 1956 on. The buyer will receive the name of the athlete who participated in both events.* EF. (\$45,000)

18. **Stockholm 1956 Equestrian Olympic Games. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal.** Silver, 49mm, by J. Sjösvärd/V. Falireus. Rider on horseback l., logo of the Stockholm Games after the frieze of the Parthenon. Rev. Torch and Olympic rings. *Due to the long quarantine required for horses coming into Australia, the Equestrian Games had to be moved, and they were awarded to Stockholm in Sweden. Only three events were held during these Equestrian Games, single and team. This is one of only 12 silver winner's medals.* EF. Very rare. (\$28,000)

19. **Melbourne 1956. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal and Diploma Awarded for Gymnastics, Pommel Horse, to V. Tchoukarine, Soviet Union.** Medal Bronze, 50mm, by Giuseppe Cassioli, struck by Luke Ltd., Melbourne. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Housed in its presentation plastic case, no chips and very rare such. Medal toned EF. Plus **Winner's Diploma**, 58.4x44.5cm (23"x17.5"). Inscribed in center with third place award legend. Center crease, o.w. EF. (2 pcs.) (\$7,500)

20. **Squaw Valley 1960 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded to a Member of the Soviet Ice Hockey Team.** Bronze, 55mm, made by the Herff Jones Co. Joint heads left of male and female athletes. Rev. Large Olympic rings encircled by legend, name of winning event, "Hockey Sur Glace" (Ice Hockey) below. *The Soviet team had won gold in Cortina 1956, the first time the Soviet Union participated in Winter Olympic Games. Between 1964 and 1992 the team placed first with winning gold, losing it only in Lake Placid 1980 to the "Miracle on Ice" American Team. One of their 1980 silver medals is offered in lot 26. The Squaw Valley 1960 medal is their only bronze medal.* EF. (\$12,000)

21. **Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to a Member of the Soviet Team.** Goldplated silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Alpine mountain, "Eishockey" below. Rev. Logo encircled by legend. *The Soviet team had won gold in Cortina 1956, the first time the Soviet Union participated in Winter Olympic Games. Between 1964 and 1992 the team placed first with winning gold, losing it only in Lake Placid 1980 to the "Miracle on Ice" American Team.* With replacement ribbon. EF. (\$12,000)
