

- 22. Grenoble 1968 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to a Member of the Soviet Team Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, by Roger Excoffon. Logo within French legend. Rev. Depiction of an ice hockey player, "Hockey Sur Glace" below. The Soviet team had won gold in Cortina 1956, the first time the Soviet Union participated in Winter Olympic Games. Between 1964 and 1992 the team placed first with winning gold, losing it only in Lake Placid 1980 to the "Miracle on Ice" American Team. With ribbon in Olympic colors. Housed in black leather case with gold logo on top, lined in blue velvet and silk. EF. (\$14,000)
- 23. **Sapporo 1972 Winter. Official Torch Used in the Torch Relay.** Bowl cast blackened aluminum alloy, 13x21cm (5.1"x8.3"), with stainless steel flame tube, total 56cm (22") long, designed by

Munemichi Yanagi, made by Nippon Kokki Co. The bowl and the tube display the Sapporo Olympic emblem. Lt. wear to bowl, tube discolored from flame, VF-EF. Rare. (**\$35,000**)

- 24. **Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Official Torch.** Steel, 74.6cm (29.4"), designed by Vereinigte Metallwerke Rantshofen. The design integrates a ski jump, with two sets of Olympic rings. Lt. handling, VF. (**\$20,000**)
- 25. Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Biathlon and Housed in Red Leather Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. "BIATHLON" over Bergisel ski jump, Olympic flame at r. Rev. Official logo and legend. With ribbon in Austrian colors. Housed in red leather presentation case with gold-stamped logo on top. EF. (\$15,000)



- 26. Lake Placid 1980 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to a Member of the Soviet Team, the American Team Winning Gold in the "Miracle on Ice". Silver, 80mm, by Tiffany & Co., designed by Medallic Art. Hand holding flaming torch, Whiteface Mountain in background. Rev. Logo over legend, large conifer branch at r. "Ice Hockey" engraved at left. With light blue ribbon, white stripes on sides. The Soviet Union had won gold in Ice Hockey in Cortina 1956, bronze in Squaw Valley 1960 (see lot 20), and then continuously in Innsbruck 1964 (lot 21), Grenoble 1968 (lot 22), Sapporo 1972 and Innsbruck 1976, until the "Miracle on Ice" when the U.S. team won gold. The Soviet team again was victorious in Sarajevo 1984, Calgary 1988 and Albertville 1992. Housed in its Presentation Case. EF. (**\$20.000**)
- 27. **Moscow 1980. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Equestrian Sports.** Goldplated silver, 60mm by Ilya Postal. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Olympic flame over stadium. Edge inscribed with event in Cyrillic. With loop at top. Small gold test on edge, o.w. EF. (**\$7,500**)
- 28. The Olympic Order in Silver, Presented to International Ice Hockey Federation President Günther Sabetzki (1975 – 1994) in 1985. Silver, 22.5x32.8cm (8.9"x12.9"), designed by Otl Aicher. Five rings in the center are flanked by olive leaves leading into a chain. Since 1975, the Olympic Order represents the highest award of the IOC. The order is displayed on the bottom part of the presentation case, but the top is missing. It has the award text from President Samaranch in the center: "Mr. Günther Sabetzki, in recognition of your outstanding merit in the cause of world sport and your faithfulness to the Olympic ideal, I award you the Olympic Order". EF (\$10,000)

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- 29. Albertville 1992 Winter. Official Torch. Steel, 42cm (16.5"), up to 8cm (3.2") wide, designed by famous French designer Philippe Starck. The torch, when turned over, has the shape of a flame. The flame was lit in Olympia on November 27, 1991, when the relay through Greece started. It left Greece on December 8 on the Concorde to visit about 70 countries and islands worldwide, to arrive in Paris on December 14. 5,500 torchbearers carried the flame 5,536 km (3,440 miles) around France to Albertville where the cauldron was lit at the opening ceremony on February 8, 1992, by Michel Platini and Francoise-Cyrille Grange, a Savoyard girl. One of only 130 torches. Numbered, rare, and very difficult to find. EF. (\$65,000)
- 30. Albertville 1992 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Biathlon and Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated sterling silver and Lalique crystal glass, 92mm, 9mm thick. The crystal shows large Olympic rings over Alpine mountains, set in a gold border which is engraved with the logo and olive branch, Albertville 92 legend at bottom. No sport was engraved on the 1992 winners medals although an IOC direction asked for it. With silver ribbon, Olympic color stripes in center. *The medals were entirely handmade by Lalique in 35 different processes. Biathlon for Women was offered the first time in Albertville. The buyer will receive the name of the 4-time Olympic winner.* Housed in grey leatherette case lined in grey velvet, logo on top. Medal EF. A beautiful and rare medal. (\$35,000)
- 31. Albertville 1992 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Biathlon and is Housed in its Presentation Case. Silver and Lalique crystal glass, 92mm, 9mm thick. The crystal shows large Olympic rings over Alpine mountains, set in a silver border which is engraved with logo and olive branch, Albertville 92 legend at bottom. No sport was engraved on the Albertville 1992 medals although an IOC direction asked for it. With silver ribbon, Olympic color stripes in center. *The medals were entirely handmade in 35 different processes. The buyer will receive the name of the 4-time Olympic winner. Biathlon for Women was offered the first time in Albertville*. Housed in gray leatherette case lined in gray velvet, logo on top, Medal EF. A beautiful and rare medal. (\$26,000)
- 32. Official IOC Member Medal with Gold Thread Chain. Goldplated, multicolor enamel, 50mm, made by Pujol, Barcelona. "Citius Altius Fortius" motto over Olympic rings in olive wreath encircled by IOC legend. Worn by IOC members for all official meetings from the late 1960's to the early 1990's. Housed in red leather case, lined in red velvet and silk. EF. (\$1,200)
- 33. Lillehammer 1994 Winter. Official Torch. Birchwood handle, 153cm (60") long, designed by A. Marandon and P.J. Kahrs. The upper part is cast aluminum with 5 wicks for lighting the torch with paraffin. The torch is unused. EF. (\$45,000)



34. Lillehammer 1994 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Biathlon 4x7.5-Kilometer Relay Women. Sterling silver and Norwegian granite sparagmite stone, 80mm, 78mm, by Ingierd Hanevold. Olympic rings and stylized ice crystal frame attached to sparagmite stone. Rev. Biathlon pictogram over ice crystals and logo, "Biathlon" engraved in stone on upper left, winning event and logo engraved on silver in lower right. *Buyer will receive name of 4x Olympic medal winner*. With blue and purple ribbon, housed in round blackened wood box with clear plastic top. EF. Rare. (**\$28,000**)

- 35. Salt Lake City 2002 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Luge. Bronze, 78mm, irregular shape, made by O. C. Tanner. Athlete holding up torch walking out of flames, Olympic rings below. Rev. Nike holding leaf, luge event in background. With purple-blue ribbon, in fitted large wooden case, bronze Olympic rings affixed on top. With leather pouch with stamped 2002 logo. EF. Beautiful design. (\$20,000)
- 36. Torino 2006 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Men's Four-Man Bobsled. Goldplated sterling silver, 10.7cm (4.2"), designed by Dario Quatrini. Torino logo. Rev. Large bobsled and winning event engraved "Men's Four-Man". Edge inscribed "XX Olympic Winter Games" in Italian, French and English. The empty space in the center represents the Italian plaza. *The size of the medal makes it even larger than the Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 winner's medal.* With multicolored ribbon. Housed on wood-like curved bottom with clear capital plastic cover. EF. (\$20,000)
