TERMS OF SALE (Please read carefully before bidding.)

The auction will be conducted in accordance with the terms set forth below. Bidding in the sale constitutes acceptance of all terms stated herein.

(1) BIDDING. The auction will be online at our website www.ioneil.com. It will close at 8 pm Pacific Standard Time on Saturday October 19, 2019. Bidding will continue after 8 pm for lots with active bidding until 10 minutes pass without a new bid. We also accept bids by email, phone, mail and fax (by fax: please follow up by phone or email to confirm that bids were received). All bids by email will be acknowledged. E-mail bids which have not been acknowledged have not been received. Phone bids must be confirmed in writing upon request. The estimates listed in the catalog are starting prices. Bids will be increased per the increment table on our website. If you enter a maximum bid (your highest), the bidding will be incremented as needed to win the lot, up to your maximum bid. Bids must be for an entire lot. Auctioneer reserves the right to extend bidding.

Value estimates are for guidance only. Bids under estimate will not be accepted. Bids must be for an entire lot. Bids will be accepted by lot number only. Each lot constitutes a separate sale.

New customers unknown to us and wanting to participate in the online auction must register at the website at least 1 day before the auction.

(2) MODIFICATION. The catalog is incorporated in and deemed a part of these Terms of Sale. Auctioneer has the absolute right to modify the terms of sale at any time. Bidding after notification of modification constitutes acceptance of modification. Auctioneer has the absolute right to conduct the auction as auctioneer may decide, including the right to decline bids for any reason and from any person, to decline challenges to bids or bidding increments and to make the final determination of all disputes by any method auctioneer deems appropriate. No bidder shall have a claim or recourse against auctioneer for loss or damage due to modification, auctioneer mistake, departure from stated terms of sale, method of dispute resolution or result thereof.

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(4) PRICE. **Payment in full is due upon receipt of invoice.** A 17.5% Buyer's Fee will be added to the successful bid price of each lot. Handling, shipping, sales tax for California residents, insurance, and all other costs associated with shipping will be added to the invoice. A handling charge per lot may be added to bulky lots (books, large plates, sculptures, etc.) California sales tax will be added to the invoice of California residents unless a valid resale number is on file with the auctioneer; however, buyer is solely responsible for and agrees to pay all sales or other applicable tax due by virtue of the sale and shall indemnify and hold auctioneer harmless therefore, including penalties or interest assessed, regardless of whether or not taxes were included on the invoice or correctly calculated by the auctioneer.

(5) **PAYMENT.** Payment must be in U.S. funds payable by check drawn on a U.S. bank or by wire transfer to auctioneer's account, by credit card (Visa, MasterCard, American Express and Discover) or Paypal. Wiring instructions should be requested from auctioneer before funds are wired. A 3.5% convenience charge (4% for overseas purchases) will be added to credit card or Paypal purchases except where prohibited by law. Bidders may be asked for satisfactory credit references or a deposit of funds prior to bidding.

(6) **DEFAULT.** If buyer fails to make payment in full within 30 days of the invoice date or to timely comply with any other term of sale, then, in addition to all other remedies available at law or in equity, auctioneer may, at auctioneer's option: (a) charge 1.5% monthly interest on unpaid amounts; (b) if payment is not received in a timely manner, auctioneer may resell the lot(s) and recover from buyer the difference between the proceeds and buyer's indebtedness in excess of the proceeds, which indebtedness shall include the successful bid price, Buyer's Fee and all other expenses incurred by auctioneer from the date of sale until resale on accounts of such lot(s), including attorney fees, transportation, handling, storage, insurance, collection and resale costs. Proceeds collected in excess of buyer's indebtedness shall belong to auctioneer; (c) pursue collection efforts and/or recover from buyer all costs incurred by auctioneer as a result of buyer's default from date of default, including attorney fees, transportation, handling, storage and insurance costs; and (d) sue for damages. Amounts charged hereunder are immediately due and payable. Buyer waives all requirements of notice, advertisement, bidding rights, rights to proceeds and all other rights with respect to the sale of a lot purchased by buyer except as prohibited by law. Auctioneer's rights and remedies stated in this section and elsewhere in this agreement are cumulative and the exercise of one shall not operate to the exclusion of another.

(7) SHIPMENT. It is buyer's responsibility to contact auctioneer to make shipping arrangements. Failure to timely make shipping arrangements or to accept delivery constitutes default. Lots will be delivered to buyer's address on file with auctioneer, unless otherwise requested, after payment in full and funds have cleared. Lots will be packaged, insured and shipped as auctioneer deems appropriate unless otherwise requested; however, auctioneer may charge additional handling, shipping and insurance fees or decline to package and/or ship any item. Buyer is responsible for packaging and/or shipping any purchased lot(s) at auctioneer's request within 30 days of the request. Risk of loss and title pass at delivery of lot to place of shipment, if shipped by auctioneer, and at time of payment in full at place of pick-up, if shipped by buyer. **Custom duties for an overseas buyer are buyer's sole responsibility.** Overseas buyers must supply fully detailed shipping instructions prior to shipment. Lots will be shipped overseas at buyer's risk only. Buyer waives all claims against auctioneer for loss or damage as a result of delayed shipment or failure to ship any item. Auctioneer's breach in the delivery of any item shall not give buyer the right to refuse or receive any other shipment.

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
(10) **RETURNS.** Auctioneer shall not be liable for any item returned without auctioneer's prior written approval. Items must be returned in their original container and in the same condition as sold to buyer in the manner and at the time specified by auctioneer in writing. Late remittance, removal from the original container or return in a condition other than as sold to buyer constitutes just cause for revocation of all return rights, based on warranty or otherwise, and buyer shall no further rights or remedies under this agreement, at law or in equity. Refunds will not be made until items have been received and inspected to auctioneer's satisfaction. Refunds are conditioned upon buyer's execution prior to payment of any documents requested by auctioneer to effect the intent of this paragraph.

(11) Bidder's Release. The term bidder as used in this release refers to bidders and buyers alike. Except as expressly provided herein, bidding in the sale constitutes an unconditional release by bidder of auctioneer and auctioneer's affiliates, subsidiaries, successors, members, managers, employees and agents and their heirs, legal representatives and assigns (collectively, "auctioneer's affiliates"), from all claims, demands, suits, actions, obligations, liabilities, losses and damages of any kind or nature whatsoever, including but not limited to special, incidental, consequential, indirect or similar damages (collectively "claims"), arising out of or relating to, directly or indirectly, the auction, these terms of sale or modification thereof, the bidding process, denial of bid, title, condition, guality or description of any lot or auctioneer's affiliates' negligence, gross negligence, mistake, misrepresentation, breach of contract, breach of warranty or any other act or omission whether sounding in contract, tort, in equity or otherwise. Bidder agrees and intends this release to be extended to and be effective as to **ALL CLAIMS** without reservation, whether arising now or in the future and regardless of whether bidder later obtains knowledge which would have materially affected bidder's decision to give this release and bidder knowingly and voluntarily waives all rights and remedies which may otherwise be conferred on bidder by law.

(12) CLAIMS. Claims for reasons other than lack of authenticity may, in some instances, be considered by auctioneer, at auctioneer's sole discretion. Any such claim must be submitted to auctioneer in writing within 5 days after delivery of the item, which is the basis of the claim to buyer, but in no event more than 60 days past the close of the auction. Auctioneer may, at auctioneer's option, offer a remedy to buyer but in no event shall buyer have any entitlement or right to any remedy from auctioneer unless stated in a writing signed by auctioneer and buyer.

(13) GOVERNING Law; MISCELLANEOUS. Actions to enforce or interpret or relating to these Terms of Sale shall be construed in accordance with California law, without regard to conflicts of law rules. Exclusive venue shall lie in Newport Beach, California. These Terms of Sale and all rights hereunder may not be assigned, transferred, or relied upon by third parties. The term "buyer" means the original buyer of goods from auctioneer, not any subsequent owner or person who may acquire an interest therein. If any term of this agreement or application thereof shall be deemed unenforceable, the remainder of this agreement and the application of such term to persons or circumstances other than those to which the term is unenforceable shall remain enforceable to the fullest extent. - 2. Attens 1890. Bronze Second Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. First place winners of the 43 events received a silver medal, second place winners a bronze medal. No gold medals were awarded in the first Olympic Games. Toned EF, in original red velvet-lined presentation case. Very rare. (\$50,000)
- 3. **Paris 1900. Olympic Gold Plaque Presented at the Paris 1900 Olympic Games.** Goldplated bronze, 41x59mm, by F. Vernon. Fame scattering laurel branches over exposition. Rev. Victorious athlete on podium inscribed "Exercises Physiques et Sports", the official name for the 1900 Olympic Games. Unc. (**\$1,500**)
- 4. **St. Louis 1904. Participation Medal.** Bronze, 40x40mm, made by Dieges & Clust, New York. Nude athlete striding r., laurel branch in hand. Rev. Legend in eleven lines, shields of St. Louis, France and U.S.A. between ivy leaves. Holed at top, toned EF. Rare. (**\$15,000**)
- 5. Athens 1906. Cased Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated silver, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. Similar to 1896 winner's medal - only the date on the reverse was changed to 1906. Housed in round presentation case. Nick on obv., sm. spots, rev., abt. EF. (\$7,500)
- 6. Athens 1906. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. *Similar to 1896 winner's medal* only the date on the reverse was changed to 1906. EF. (\$6,500)

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OLYMPIC GAMES WINNER. MIDDLE WRESTLING, (G, AS G) LONDON, 1908.

7. London 1908. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Middle Wrestling to Stanley Bacon, and Housed in its Presentation Case. Gold hallmarked 15 Karat, 33mm, 27.95 grams, by Bertram MacKennal, struck by Vaughton & Son, Birmingham. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Rev. St. George slaying the dragon. Edge inscribed "Winner middle wrestling (c as c) s.v. bacon" Stanley Bacon competed in 1908, 1912 and 1920 Olympic Games, and he was a wrestling judge in Amsterdam 1928. The lot comes with a photographic postcard of Bacon at the age of 16; Bacon in uniform; and a congratulatory note on winning the London gold medal, EF. Case and medal are in rarely seen perfect condition, Unc. (4 pcs.) (\$24,000)



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- 8. Second Russian Olympic Games in Riga, 1914. Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated 22x30mm. Russian bear pulling biga to left, stadium in background. Erased legend on reverse. With loop and ring. Very rare. VF-EF. (\$600)
- Second Russian Olympic Games in Riga, 1914. Second Place Winner's Medal. Silvered, 21x27mm. Russian bear pulling biga to left, stadium in background, "III. II. P." engraved on top. (\$450)
- 10. **Chamonix 1924 Winter. Third Place Bronze Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by Raoul Benard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. An extremely rare winner's medal from the First Olympic Winter Games. The participation medal had the same design. Dark toning, EF. (**\$16,000**)

- 11. St. Moritz 1928 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Bronze, 50mm by Arnold Hünerwadel. Female skater with outstretched arms surrounded by icicles. Rev. 5-line French legend between olive branches, Olympic rings above. One of only 25 bronze winners medals. Housed in its cardboard presentation box in mint condition and very rare such. Medal toned EF. (\$12,000)
- 12. Amsterdam 1928. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. *This design was selected in a competition by the IOC, and it stayed the winner's medals design through Mexico City* 1968. Toned EF. (\$6,000)
- Amsterdam 1928. Boxing Judge's Badge. Silvered, partially enameled, 31x37mm. With light red rosette. Elbel S-8. Rare. EF. (\$3,500)

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- 14. Lake Placid 1932 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 54mm, with scalloped edge, by Julio Kilenyi, struck by Robbins Co. Winged goddess of victory in clouds holding laurel wreath over Lake Placid site with venues. Rev. Olympic rings over Games legend, crossed laurel branches below. EF. Very rare. (\$24,000)
- 15. Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, "990" hallmark, 10cm (3.9"), 329 grams (about 11 oz), by Richard Klein, struck by Deschler, Munich. Victory holding laurel wreath riding in triga to left, bobsled, ski, hockey stick and skate below. Rev. Large Olympic rings surrounded by "IV Olympic Winter Games 1936" (translated from German). Largest size Olympic winner's medal until Torino 2006, and one of only 37 medals. Housed in green leatherette case with silver rings on detached top, lined in velvet, lower case incomplete, Fine. Medal EF. (\$30,000)
- Berlin 1936. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Toned EF. (\$7,000)
- 17. Oslo 1952 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Won by a Member of the German Bobsled Team. Goldplated silver 70mm, by V. Falireus/Knut Yren, struck by Th. Marthinsen C/S. Raised torch with Olympic rings within legend. Rev. Oslo City Hall outlines between snowflakes, 3-line legend below. *The German bobsled team comprised very heavy athletes; this gave them an advantage on the track, and they won both the Two-Man and Four-Man Event. The International Federation passed a rule prior to the Oslo Olympics limiting the weight of the athletes valid from 1956 on.* The buyer will receive the name of the athlete who participated in both events. EF. (\$45,000)

18. Stockholm 1956 Equestrian Olympic Games. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 49mm, by J. Sjösvärd/V. Falireus. Rider on horseback l., logo of the Stockholm Games after the frieze of the Parthenon. Rev. Torch and Olympic rings. *Due to the long quarantine required for horses coming into Australia, the Equestrian Games had to be moved, and they were awarded to Stockholm in Sweden. Only three events were held during these Equestrian Games, single and team. This is one of only 12 silver winner's medals.* EF. Very rare. (\$28,000)

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- 19. Melbourne 1956. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal and Diploma Awarded for Gymnastics, Pommelled Horse, to V. Tchoukarine, Soviet Union. Medal Bronze, 50mm, by Guiseppe Cassioli, struck by Luke Ltd., Melbourne. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Housed in its presentation plastic case, no chips and very rare such. Medal toned EF. Plus Winner's Diploma, 58.4x44.5cm (23"x17.5"). Inscribed in center with third place award legend. Center crease, o.w. EF. (2 pcs.) (\$7,500)
- 20. Squaw Valley 1960 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winners Medal Awarded to a Member of the Soviet Ice Hockey Team. Bronze, 55mm, made by the Herff Jones Co. Joint heads left of male and female athletes. Rev. Large Olympic rings encircled by legend, name of winning event, "Hockey Sur Glace" (Ice Hockey) below. The Soviet team had won gold in Cortina 1956, the first time the Soviet Union participated in Winter Olympic Games. Between 1964 and 1992 the team placed first with winning gold, losing it only in Lake Placid 1980 to the "Miracle on Ice" American Team. One of their 1980 silver medals is offered in lot 26. The Squaw Valley 1960 medal is their only bronze medal. EF. (\$12,000)







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21. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to a Member of the Soviet Team. Goldplated silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Alpine mountain, "Eishockey" below. Rev. Logo encircled by legend. The Soviet team had won gold in Cortina 1956, the first time the Soviet Union participated in Winter Olympic Games. Between 1964 and 1992 the team placed first with winning gold, losing it only in Lake Placid 1980 to the "Miracle on Ice" American Team. With replacement ribbon. EF. (\$12,000)

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- 22. Grenoble 1968 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to a Member of the Soviet Team Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, by Roger Excoffon. Logo within French legend. Rev. Depiction of an ice hockey player, "Hockey Sur Glace" below. The Soviet team had won gold in Cortina 1956, the first time the Soviet Union participated in Winter Olympic Games. Between 1964 and 1992 the team placed first with winning gold, losing it only in Lake Placid 1980 to the "Miracle on Ice" American Team. With ribbon in Olympic colors. Housed in black leather case with gold logo on top, lined in blue velvet and silk. EF. (\$14,000)
- 23. **Sapporo 1972 Winter. Official Torch Used in the Torch Relay.** Bowl cast blackened aluminum alloy, 13x21cm (5.1"x8.3"), with stainless steel flame tube, total 56cm (22") long, designed by

Munemichi Yanagi, made by Nippon Kokki Co. The bowl and the tube display the Sapporo Olympic emblem. Lt. wear to bowl, tube discolored from flame, VF-EF. Rare. (**\$35,000**)

- 24. **Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Official Torch.** Steel, 74.6cm (29.4"), designed by Vereinigte Metallwerke Rantshofen. The design integrates a ski jump, with two sets of Olympic rings. Lt. handling, VF. (**\$20,000**)
- 25. Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Biathlon and Housed in Red Leather Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. "BIATHLON" over Bergisel ski jump, Olympic flame at r. Rev. Official logo and legend. With ribbon in Austrian colors. Housed in red leather presentation case with gold-stamped logo on top. EF. (\$15,000)



- 26. Lake Placid 1980 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to a Member of the Soviet Team, the American Team Winning Gold in the "Miracle on Ice". Silver, 80mm, by Tiffany & Co., designed by Medallic Art. Hand holding flaming torch, Whiteface Mountain in background. Rev. Logo over legend, large conifer branch at r. "Ice Hockey" engraved at left. With light blue ribbon, white stripes on sides. The Soviet Union had won gold in Ice Hockey in Cortina 1956, bronze in Squaw Valley 1960 (see lot 20), and then continuously in Innsbruck 1964 (lot 21), Grenoble 1968 (lot 22), Sapporo 1972 and Innsbruck 1976, until the "Miracle on Ice" when the U.S. team won gold. The Soviet team again was victorious in Sarajevo 1984, Calgary 1988 and Albertville 1992. Housed in its Presentation Case. EF. (**\$20,000**)
- 27. **Moscow 1980. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Equestrian Sports.** Goldplated silver, 60mm by Ilya Postal. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Olympic flame over stadium. Edge inscribed with event in Cyrillic. With loop at top. Small gold test on edge, o.w. EF. (**\$7,500**)
- 28. The Olympic Order in Silver, Presented to International Ice Hockey Federation President Günther Sabetzki (1975 – 1994) in 1985. Silver, 22.5x32.8cm (8.9"x12.9"), designed by Otl Aicher. Five rings in the center are flanked by olive leaves leading into a chain. Since 1975, the Olympic Order represents the highest award of the IOC. The order is displayed on the bottom part of the presentation case, but the top is missing. It has the award text from President Samaranch in the center: "Mr. Günther Sabetzki, in recognition of your outstanding merit in the cause of world sport and your faithfulness to the Olympic ideal, I award you the Olympic Order". EF (\$10,000)

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- 29. Albertville 1992 Winter. Official Torch. Steel, 42cm (16.5"), up to 8cm (3.2") wide, designed by famous French designer Philippe Starck. The torch, when turned over, has the shape of a flame. The flame was lit in Olympia on November 27, 1991, when the relay through Greece started. It left Greece on December 8 on the Concorde to visit about 70 countries and islands worldwide, to arrive in Paris on December 14. 5,500 torchbearers carried the flame 5,536 km (3,440 miles) around France to Albertville where the cauldron was lit at the opening ceremony on February 8, 1992, by Michel Platini and Francoise-Cyrille Grange, a Savoyard girl. One of only 130 torches. Numbered, rare, and very difficult to find. EF. (\$65,000)
- 30. Albertville 1992 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Biathlon and Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated sterling silver and Lalique crystal glass, 92mm, 9mm thick. The crystal shows large Olympic rings over Alpine mountains, set in a gold border which is engraved with the logo and olive branch, Albertville 92 legend at bottom. No sport was engraved on the 1992 winners medals although an IOC direction asked for it. With silver ribbon, Olympic color stripes in center. *The medals were entirely handmade by Lalique in 35 different processes. Biathlon for Women was offered the first time in Albertville. The buyer will receive the name of the 4-time Olympic winner.* Housed in grey leatherette case lined in grey velvet, logo on top. Medal EF. A beautiful and rare medal. (\$35,000)








- King, Executive Director of the 1960 Squaw Valley Olympic Winter Games. The material mainly covers events from October 7, 1957 (his appointment) through March 1960. He resigned in November 1959. The information is in the form of letters, reports, telegrams, news clippings and photographs. The most important two ring binders of historic interest relate to the China/Beijing and Taiwan/Formosa conflict of who would be a member of the IOC and participate in Olympic Games. Letters between the IOC and Squaw Valley, the USOC and from the two Chinese areas illustrate the grave conflict. The Chinese Olympic Committee in Beijing did not participate because of this conflict until the Los Angeles 1984 Olympic Games. The third ring binder includes the Congratulatory and Resignation Letters Robert King wrote and received. The fourth ring binder relates to the Television rights of ABC and CBS with media contract discussions. 




