



- 26. **Cortina 1956 Winter. Chef de Mission Badge.** Goldplated, multicolor enamel, 36x45mm. "CAPO MISSIONE" on blue enamel, affixed logo below. One of only 28 badges. Elbel W-6. Housed in original cardboard box. EF. Very rare. (**\$1,200**)
- 27. Stockholm Equestrian Olympic Games 1956. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 49mm, by J. Sjösvärd/V. Falireus. Rider on horseback l., image after the frieze of the Parthenon. Rev. Torch and Olympic rings, the same design as the Oslo 1952 winner's medal. Only three events were held during these Equestrian Games, single and team. This is one of 12 bronze winner's medals. One of the rarest winner's medals. Toned EF. (\$20,000)

- 28. Melbourne 1956. Very Rare Framed Set of Three Winners Medals, Four Badges and a Participation Medal. Housed in a wooden frame, 75x32cm (29.5"x12.6"), made by the "Official Olympic Medallists K. G. Luke Ltd., Melbourne & Sydney". Gold, Silver and Bronze "Prize Medallion" Winner's Medals, 50mm each, all EF, silver medal spotty. Plus Four Badges named "IOC, Sports Events Official, Competitor and Publicity", with their inscribed ribbons. And two sides of the Participation Medal, 63mm, "Awarded to everyone participating in the conduct of the Games." Very rare set made for Presentation. EF. (\$12,000)
- 29. Rome 1960. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Gymnastics. Goldplated silver, within bronze olive wreath, 68mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above Colosseum stadium in Rome. Rev. Victorious athlete carried by jubilant teammates, "Ginnastica" on panel below. *Gymnastic team members received the winner's medal without chain.* Lt. wear on highpoints, EF. (\$15,000)

2. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Cross Country Nordic Skiing Relay. Goldplated silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Alpine Mountains, "Ski-Staffellauf" below. Rev. Large logo encircled by "IX Olympic Winter Games" (translated from German). With red-white-red ribbon in Austrian colors. EF. (\$20,000)

33. Tokyo 1964. Organizing Committee Badge with Olympic Colors. Goldplated, 50x67mm. Olympic colors around top and sides, with blue bar "O.O.C". With white ribbon, two gold stripes in center (ltly. faded). Elbel S-15. Very rare. EF. (**\$8,500**)



34. Grenoble 1968 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Giant Slalom Skiing. Bronze, 60mm, by Roger Excoffon, struck at the Paris Mint. Logo within French legend. Rev. Depiction of giant slalom, "Slalom Geant" below. Housed in black leather presentation case, gold embossed logo on top, lined in white velvet and silk. EF. (\$10,000)

35. Sapporo 1972 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to a Member of the Czech Team. Bronze, 57x61mm, by Kazumi Yagi and Ikko Tanaka. Ski slalom trails and skating stadium. Rev. Japanese sun and logo between Japanese and English legend. Ice hockey pictogram attached at top, reverse inscribed "Ice Hockey". With multicolor ribbon. Housed in blue velvet case which includes the bronze winner's pin, 20x20mm. EF. (\$15,000)

- 37. Montreal 1976. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Handball and Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 60mm, by G. Cassioli (obv.) Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium in Rome. Rev. Ancient Greek winner's laurel wreath, logo at top. With chain, housed in wooden case with black leather slipcover, spotty. Medal EF. (\$12,000)

38. Lake Placid 1980 Winter. Sports Emmy Award Presented to Jack Cronin, ABC, for Outstanding Individual Achievement in Electronic Camera. Gold color, 38.5cm (15.2") tall, base about 18cm (7.1") wide. The goddess of television, her wings in the form of lightning, upholds the satellite of the world in the highest award of broadcasting. Standing on top of globe encircled by "The National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences". A 6-line engraved award legend on a black band below, awarded for "Electronic Camera", "1980 Winter Olympic Games, Lake Placid New York, February 12-24, 1980". Awarded for the coverage of the Lake Placid Games, especially the "Miracle on Ice". Partially small spots, VF-EF. (\$4,000)
