125. **Third Place Bronze Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by Raoul Benard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. An extremely rare winner's medal from the First Olympic Winter Games. The participation medal had the same design. Toned EF. (**\$15,000**)

- Chamonix 1924 Winter Games Held as Part of the VIII Olympiad Paris 1924. Two pages, 8x12cm (3.2"x4.7"). Identity card No. 370 with Gröttumsbraaten's signature and photo, and Norwegian's NOC President signature, on back. The Chamonix first Winter Olympic Games were considered part of the Summer Games in Paris. Only in 1926 in Lissabon was Chamonix declared the First Winter Olympic Games. Johan Gröttumsbraaten was one of the most successful Olympic skiers ever. In Chamonix he won silver in 15 Kilometers Skiing, and bronze in Nordic Combined and 50km Skiing. In St. Moritz 1928 (see lot 12) and Lake Placid 1932 he won gold in Nordic Combined. Brown spots, crease in upper left corner, VF/VF-EF. (\$600)

Included are also a list of the Swiss NOC and Executive Committee Members of the 1928 Winter Games as well as the Invitation to NOC's to participate. Browning, EF. Rare. (\$300)
- 140. Daily Program No. 8, February 18, 1928. 7 pages, 13.3x20.5cm (5.2"x8.1"), in German, French and English. Bobsleigh, hockey, Ladies figure skating (with Sonja Henie, Norway), and ski jumping chart of participating nations. Color covers, vertical fold, VF-EF. Very scarce. (\$260)

The report tells the story how St. Moritz was selected, daily report with complete results, opening ceremony speeches, congratulatory telegrams after the Games, closing ceremony photo, also ski jump and stadium photos etc. Light browning, a few discoloration spots, abt. EF. One of the rarest official reports! (\$5,000)

- 142. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. *This design by Cassioli was selected in a competition by the IOC, and it stayed the winner's medals design through Mexico City 1968.* Discolored, VF. (**\$2,600**)
- 143. Proposed Winner's Medal for the Amsterdam 1928 Olympic Games. Bronze, 82mm, by C.J. van der Hoef. Olympic flame on top of stadium column that held the Olympic flame during the Games, "Olympic Games Amsterdam 1928" (translated) below. Rev. Palm branch dividing "To the Winner Of" (translated from Dutch) with space for the winning event. The medal was entered in the Art Exposition and awarded the second place silver medal (official report p. 916). Toned EF. (\$500)
- 144. Participation Medal. Bronze, 55mm, by J.C. Wienecke. Nude male and female athlete on podium holding torch over Olympic flame. Rev. Nike over Marathon Tower, shield of Amsterdam between two hemispheres. Toned EF. (\$260)

145. **Rowing at the Olympic Games Wall Plate.** Embossed brass, 28x28.5 (11.x11.1"). Four-man rowing boat, ships and bridge in back, "Olympic Games 1928" in Dutch on raised border, crossed olive and oak branch on lower half. Brown color, rare event on brass plates. Two small hairline cracks, abt. EF. (**\$120**)
