

- 3. St. Louis 1904. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Soccer to the Galt Football Club from Ontario, Canada. Solid gold, 17.4 grams, 30mm with scalloped edge, made by Mermod & Jaccard, Jewelry Co., St. Louis. Raised soccer ball surrounded by "Association Foot Ball Championship". With loop and ring suspended from gold bar inscribed "1904/Universal Exposition/ Olympic Games/St. Louis". The Galt Team defeated the St. Louis Christian Brothers College Team 7-0 on November 16, and the following day the St. Louis St. Rose Parrish Team 4-10. *Soccer was called Association Football at the time.* A rarely seen gold medal of the 1904 Olympic Games. EF. (**\$95,000**)
- 4. London 1908. Linesman Badge. Silvered, 57mm, partially enamelled in blue. Tudor rose with head of Britannia left. Elbel S-14. Very rare. EF. (\$9,000)
- 5. Stockholm 1912. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Red Presentation Case. Silver, 33mm, by Erik Lindberg and Bertram MacKennal, struck by Sporrong & Co. Herald proclaiming Olympic Games, bust of Ling on pedestal at r. Rev. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Housed in its red leather presentation case with gold design, lined in silk and red velvet. Spot on right, o.w. EF. Medal abt. EF/EF. (\$7,000)

- Stockholm 1912. International Olympic Committee Badge. Goldplated silver, 39x45mm, made by Sporrong, Stockholm. Bust of ancient Greek athlete facing within oak wreath, over three Swedish crowns and inscribed "Olympic Games Stockholm 1912". Elbel S-2. EF. A beautiful and very rare badge. (\$6,500)
- Berlin, 6th Olympic Games, 1916 (Cancelled). Gold Winner's Medal in the German Olympic Trials Presented by the German Committee for Olympic Games. Goldplated, 50mm. Military bust r. of Emperor Wilhelm II. Rev. "To the Winner in the Olympic Trials" (translated) over olive sprig surrounded by German Olympic Committee legend. Very rare. EF. (\$1,000)
- 8. Antwerp 1920. Gold Medal Winning Cycling Trophy. Darkened white metal, 39.5cm (15.6") high, signed by artist. Flying winged female (Nike?) upholding Olympic rings (first time shown at Olympic Games), and race of cyclists; raised lions heads on either side. Olive and oak branch at top, two scrolled handles at sides. Mounted on marble base. Very rare. EF. (\$10,000)
- 9. Antwerp 1920. "Victory" Gold Medal Winner's Trophy. Cast bronze and marble, 36.5cm (14.4"), tall, by M. Grandmoulin. Victorious nude athlete holding up his laurel wreath standing on base, inscribed "Victoire!", signature of artist and date "1920". Mounted on circular marble column and square bronze base with plaque inscribed "VII OLYMPIADE ANVERS 1920". Presented only to first place winners in individual events. EF. (\$9,500)



- Won by Norwegian Johan Grøttumsbråten, in 18 km Cross Country Skiing. Silver, 50mm by Raoul Bénard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. He was the best skier in the 1920's and early 1930's in Nordic Combined and Cross-Country. He won gold in both events in St. Moritz 1928, having already won this silver medal and two bronze medals in Chamonix in 1924. He went on to win gold in Nordic Combined in Lake Placid 1932. Housed in its red presentation case, inside top Fine, medal EF. Very rare medal from one of the most celebrated Olympic skiers. (\$26,000)
- Chamonix 1924 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal 11. Housed in its Presentation Case. 55mm, by Raoul Benard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. Rarely seen with its presentation case. Presentation case light scuffing around edges, medal EF. (\$16,000)
- 12. Paris 1924. Soccer Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded to Sweden. Bronze, 55mm, by A. Rivaud. Legend surrounded by sports equipment. Rev. Winner helping fallen athlete back on his feet. Plus photo of winner later in life. The Swedish soccer team placed Third in Paris. Name of medal recipient is known. Both EF, medal dark toning. (\$7,000)
- 13. St. Moritz 1928 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 50mm, by Arnold Hünerwadel. Female skater with outstretched arms surrounded by ice crystals. Rev. Olympic rings above 5-line French legend, olive branches on sides. Only 25 bronze medals were awarded. Toned EF. (\$9,000)







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- Amsterdam 1928. Secretary of the International Athletics 14. Sports Federation Badge. Silvered, 31x37mm. "1928 - Officiel" divided by Olympic rings, with orange ribbon inscribed "Fédération Internationale". Elbel S-5. One of only 20 badges. Ribbon EF, badge toned EF. (\$2,600)
- 15. Amsterdam 1928. Wrestling Jury Badge. Silvered, 31x37mm. "Officiel", "1928" and color rings above. With yellow cockade, 55mm, VF. Elbel S-8. Badge EF. (\$2,600)



- 16. **Berlin 1936. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Toned EF. **(\$6,000)**
- 17. Sapporo 1940 Winter (Cancelled). Organizing Committee Badge. Silvered, white and blue enamel, 34mm, with violet rosette, 60mm. Mount Fuji with color Olympic rings over "1940" encircled by "Sapporo Vth Olympic Winter Games" legend. EF. Extremely rare. (\$12,000)
- St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 60mm, by Huguenin. Hand holding torch in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background. Rev. 4-line French legend between ice crystals. Toned EF. (\$8,500)
- Oslo 1952 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 70mm, by V. Falireus/Knut Yren, struck by Th. Marthinsen C/S. Raised torch with Olympic rings within legend. Rev. Oslo City Hall outlines between snowflakes, 3-line legend below. Lightly toned EF. (\$26,000)
- 20. Helsinki 1952. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Blue Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 50mm, by Giuseppe Cassioli. Victory seated above Colosseum stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Housed in its blue case, lined in blue velvet and white silk, EF. Goldplating partially worn on obverse, showing toned silver, reverse EF. Scarce with case. (\$8,500)



- 21. Stockholm 1956. International Olympic Committee Badge. Orange and blue, lower part gold, 28x53mm. With two ribbons in Olympic colors. Horseman to the left, Olympic rings and Stockholm Games legend below. Elbel EQ-1. Only 18 IOC members were present in Stockholm – the buyer will receive the name of the IOC member. Very rare. EF. (\$8,000)
- 22. Melbourne 1956. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Bronze, 50mm, by Guiseppe Cassioli, struck by Luke Ltd., Melbourne. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Housed in its presentation plastic case in perfect condition - very rare. Medal toned EF. (\$6,500)
- 23. Rome 1960. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Water Polo to the Hungarian Team. Bronze, within bronze olive wreath, 68mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium in Rome. Rev. Victorious athlete carried by jubilant teammates, "PALLANUOTO" (water polo) on wreath panel below. With complete chain of 20 bronze olive leaves and olives. Scarce with complete chain. Toned EF. (\$9,500)
- 24. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to the Swedish Team. Silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Alpine mountain range, "Eishockey" below. Rev. Large logo encircled by legend. With loop and red-white-red ribbon in Austrian colors. Medal toned EF. (\$12,000)
