TERMS OF SALE

(Please read carefully before bidding.)

The auction will be conducted in accordance with the terms set forth below. Bidding in the sale constitutes acceptance of all terms stated herein.

(1) BIDDING. The auction will be online at our website www.ioneil.com on our auction platform auctions.ioneil.com. It will close at 8 pm Pacific Standard Time on Saturday April 9, 2022. Bidding will continue after 8 pm for lots with active bidding until 10 minutes pass without a new bid. The lots still open after 8pm move to the front of the auction. We also accept bids by email, phone, mail and fax (by fax: please follow up by phone or email to confirm that bids were received). All bids by email will be acknowledged. E-mail bids which have not been acknowledged have not been received. Phone bids must be confirmed in writing upon request. The estimates listed in the catalog are starting prices. Bids will be increased per the increment table on our website. If you enter a maximum bid (your highest), the bidding will be incremented as needed to win the lot, up to your maximum bid. Bids must be for an entire lot. Auctioneer reserves the right to extend bidding.

Value estimates are for guidance only. Bids under estimate will not be accepted. Bids must be for an entire lot. Bids will be accepted by lot number only. Each lot constitutes a separate sale.

New customers unknown to us and wanting to participate in the online auction must register at the website at least 1 day before the auction.

(2) MODIFICATION. The catalog is incorporated in and deemed a part of these Terms of Sale. Auctioneer has the absolute right to modify the terms of sale at any time. Bidding after notification of modification constitutes acceptance of modification. Auctioneer has the absolute right to conduct the auction as auctioneer may decide, including the right to decline bids for any reason and from any person, to decline challenges to bids or bidding increments and to make the final determination of all disputes by any method auctioneer deems appropriate. No bidder shall have a claim or recourse against auctioneer for loss or damage due to modification, auctioneer mistake, departure from stated terms of sale, method of dispute resolution or result thereof.

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(4) PRICE. **Payment in full is due upon receipt of invoice.** A 20% Buyer's Fee will be added to the successful bid price of each lot. Handling, shipping, sales tax for California residents, insurance, and all other costs associated with shipping will be added to the invoice. A handling charge per lot may be added to bulky lots (books, large plates, sculptures, etc.) California sales tax will be added to the invoice of California residents unless a valid resale number is on file with the auctioneer; however, buyer is solely responsible for and agrees to pay all sales or other applicable tax due by virtue of the sale and shall indemnify and hold auctioneer harmless therefore, including penalties or interest assessed, regardless of whether or not taxes were included on the invoice or correctly calculated by the auctioneer.

Highlights of the Auction



 London 1948. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded to Harrison Dillard for 100 Meters on July 31, 1948. Goldplated silver, 51mm, by Giuseppe Cassioli, struck by John Pinches Ltd., London. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium holding laurel wreath and palm branch. Rev. Victorious athlete carried by jubilant teammates. Harrison Dillard won gold in 1948 in 100m and in the 4x100m Relay. In 1952 Helsinki he won gold in his specialty, 100m Hurdles, and again in the 4x100m Relay. Housed in its presentation case, EF. Medal mottled toning, EF. (\$120,000)

Terri Dillard About her Father

"World's Fastest Man" – "World's Fastest Hurdler" winning gold in the 1948 Olympics 100 meter sprint race after not qualifying for his specialty race, the 100 meter hurdles. This feat has been nicknamed "Pulling a Dillard". So far Harrison Dillard is the only man to accomplish this feat and the only man to win gold in both the 100 meter sprints and the 110 meter hurdles. Holding both titles of "World's Fastest Man" and "World's Fastest Sprinter". Dillard was inspired by his hometown hero, Jesse Owens, and like him, he won 4 gold medals.

The 100 meter race that Harrison Dillard won gold in 1948 is the first ever photo finish in Olympic history. And the first time that Omega, the official timekeeper of the Olympics, used their photo finish technique to determine the outcome of an Olympic event. It is believed that Harrison Dillard was the first African American athlete to grace the cover of a major U.S. news magazine – Newsweek.

Born in Cleveland Ohio he faced numerous hurdles. Harrison Dillard was frail and sickly when he was a baby as he suffered from a disease called Rickets. While most children walked by 12 months, Harrison could not even stand up until he was 16 months old. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II in the all black 92nd Infantry Division in Italy. After he returned from World War II, he tried out for the London 1948 Olympic Games. And the rest is history.

 Athens 1896. First Olympic Games First Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. First place winners of the 43 events received a silver medal, second place winners a bronze medal. No gold medals were awarded in the first Olympic Games. A very beautiful and historically important medal. Very rare. Light toning, EF. (\$80,000)



- 3. St. Louis 1904. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Soccer to the Galt Football Club from Ontario, Canada. Solid gold, 17.4 grams, 30mm with scalloped edge, made by Mermod & Jaccard, Jewelry Co., St. Louis. Raised soccer ball surrounded by "Association Foot Ball Championship". With loop and ring suspended from gold bar inscribed "1904/Universal Exposition/ Olympic Games/St. Louis". The Galt Team defeated the St. Louis Christian Brothers College Team 7-0 on November 16, and the following day the St. Louis St. Rose Parrish Team 4-10. *Soccer was called Association Football at the time.* A rarely seen gold medal of the 1904 Olympic Games. EF. (**\$95,000**)
- 4. London 1908. Linesman Badge. Silvered, 57mm, partially enamelled in blue. Tudor rose with head of Britannia left. Elbel S-14. Very rare. EF. (\$9,000)
- 5. Stockholm 1912. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Red Presentation Case. Silver, 33mm, by Erik Lindberg and Bertram MacKennal, struck by Sporrong & Co. Herald proclaiming Olympic Games, bust of Ling on pedestal at r. Rev. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Housed in its red leather presentation case with gold design, lined in silk and red velvet. Spot on right, o.w. EF. Medal abt. EF/EF. (\$7,000)

- Stockholm 1912. International Olympic Committee Badge. Goldplated silver, 39x45mm, made by Sporrong, Stockholm. Bust of ancient Greek athlete facing within oak wreath, over three Swedish crowns and inscribed "Olympic Games Stockholm 1912". Elbel S-2. EF. A beautiful and very rare badge. (\$6,500)
- Berlin, 6th Olympic Games, 1916 (Cancelled). Gold Winner's Medal in the German Olympic Trials Presented by the German Committee for Olympic Games. Goldplated, 50mm. Military bust r. of Emperor Wilhelm II. Rev. "To the Winner in the Olympic Trials" (translated) over olive sprig surrounded by German Olympic Committee legend. Very rare. EF. (\$1,000)
- 8. Antwerp 1920. Gold Medal Winning Cycling Trophy. Darkened white metal, 39.5cm (15.6") high, signed by artist. Flying winged female (Nike?) upholding Olympic rings (first time shown at Olympic Games), and race of cyclists; raised lions heads on either side. Olive and oak branch at top, two scrolled handles at sides. Mounted on marble base. Very rare. EF. (\$10,000)
- 9. Antwerp 1920. "Victory" Gold Medal Winner's Trophy. Cast bronze and marble, 36.5cm (14.4"), tall, by M. Grandmoulin. Victorious nude athlete holding up his laurel wreath standing on base, inscribed "Victoire!", signature of artist and date "1920". Mounted on circular marble column and square bronze base with plaque inscribed "VII OLYMPIADE ANVERS 1920". Presented only to first place winners in individual events. EF. (\$9,500)



- Won by Norwegian Johan Grøttumsbråten, in 18 km Cross Country Skiing. Silver, 50mm by Raoul Bénard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. He was the best skier in the 1920's and early 1930's in Nordic Combined and Cross-Country. He won gold in both events in St. Moritz 1928, having already won this silver medal and two bronze medals in Chamonix in 1924. He went on to win gold in Nordic Combined in Lake Placid 1932. Housed in its red presentation case, inside top Fine, medal EF. Very rare medal from one of the most celebrated Olympic skiers. (\$26,000)
- Chamonix 1924 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal 11. Housed in its Presentation Case. 55mm, by Raoul Benard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. Rarely seen with its presentation case. Presentation case light scuffing around edges, medal EF. (\$16,000)
- 12. Paris 1924. Soccer Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded to Sweden. Bronze, 55mm, by A. Rivaud. Legend surrounded by sports equipment. Rev. Winner helping fallen athlete back on his feet. Plus photo of winner later in life. The Swedish soccer team placed Third in Paris. Name of medal recipient is known. Both EF, medal dark toning. (\$7,000)
- 13. St. Moritz 1928 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 50mm, by Arnold Hünerwadel. Female skater with outstretched arms surrounded by ice crystals. Rev. Olympic rings above 5-line French legend, olive branches on sides. Only 25 bronze medals were awarded. Toned EF. (\$9,000)

- Amsterdam 1928. Secretary of the International Athletics 14. Sports Federation Badge. Silvered, 31x37mm. "1928 - Officiel" divided by Olympic rings, with orange ribbon inscribed "Fédération Internationale". Elbel S-5. One of only 20 badges. Ribbon EF, badge toned EF. (\$2,600)
- 15. Amsterdam 1928. Wrestling Jury Badge. Silvered, 31x37mm. "Officiel", "1928" and color rings above. With yellow cockade, 55mm, VF. Elbel S-8. Badge EF. (\$2,600)



- 16. **Berlin 1936. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Toned EF. **(\$6,000)**
- 17. Sapporo 1940 Winter (Cancelled). Organizing Committee Badge. Silvered, white and blue enamel, 34mm, with violet rosette, 60mm. Mount Fuji with color Olympic rings over "1940" encircled by "Sapporo Vth Olympic Winter Games" legend. EF. Extremely rare. (\$12,000)
- St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 60mm, by Huguenin. Hand holding torch in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background. Rev. 4-line French legend between ice crystals. Toned EF. (\$8,500)
- Oslo 1952 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 70mm, by V. Falireus/Knut Yren, struck by Th. Marthinsen C/S. Raised torch with Olympic rings within legend. Rev. Oslo City Hall outlines between snowflakes, 3-line legend below. Lightly toned EF. (\$26,000)
- 20. Helsinki 1952. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Blue Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 50mm, by Giuseppe Cassioli. Victory seated above Colosseum stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Housed in its blue case, lined in blue velvet and white silk, EF. Goldplating partially worn on obverse, showing toned silver, reverse EF. Scarce with case. (\$8,500)



- 21. Stockholm 1956. International Olympic Committee Badge. Orange and blue, lower part gold, 28x53mm. With two ribbons in Olympic colors. Horseman to the left, Olympic rings and Stockholm Games legend below. Elbel EQ-1. Only 18 IOC members were present in Stockholm – the buyer will receive the name of the IOC member. Very rare. EF. (\$8,000)
- 22. Melbourne 1956. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Bronze, 50mm, by Guiseppe Cassioli, struck by Luke Ltd., Melbourne. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Housed in its presentation plastic case in perfect condition - very rare. Medal toned EF. (\$6,500)
- 23. Rome 1960. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Water Polo to the Hungarian Team. Bronze, within bronze olive wreath, 68mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium in Rome. Rev. Victorious athlete carried by jubilant teammates, "PALLANUOTO" (water polo) on wreath panel below. With complete chain of 20 bronze olive leaves and olives. Scarce with complete chain. Toned EF. (\$9,500)
- 24. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to the Swedish Team. Silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Alpine mountain range, "Eishockey" below. Rev. Large logo encircled by legend. With loop and red-white-red ribbon in Austrian colors. Medal toned EF. (\$12,000)



- 25. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to the Czech Team. Bronze, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Alpine Mountain, "Eishockey" below. Rev. Large logo surrounded by legend. With red-white replacement ribbon, housed in red presentation case, gold logo on top. Lt. scuffing. Medal EF. (\$9,500)
- 26. Tokyo 1964. Paralympic Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated, 50mm. Two birds, Mount Fuji in background, "The Tokyo Games for the Physically Handicapped" around the edge. Hanger on back to display it in velvet-lined case. After the first Paralympic Games in Rome 1960, Tokyo held the second Games, officially also still known as the 13th International Stoke Mandeville Games. The Summer Paralympic Games were only held again in Seoul 1988 after the IOC approved the term in 1984. Housed in wooden box with gold logo on top. Rare. EF. (\$5,000)
- 27. Sapporo 1972 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Speed Skating. Goldplated silver, 57x61mm, by Kazumi Yagi and Ikko Tanaka. Ski slalom trails and skating stadium. Rev. Japanese sun and logo between Japanese and English legend. "Speed Skating" pictogram attached above, reverse inscribed "Speed Skating". With blue ribbon, Olympic color stripes on sides. Housed in its blue velvet presentation case. EF. (\$32,500)
- 28. **Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Official Torch.** Steel, 74.6cm (29.4"), designed by Vereinigte Metallwerke Rantshofen. The design integrates a ski jump, with two sets of Olympic rings, gold color band with legend. EF. **(\$22,000)**

- 29. Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Speed Skating and Housed in Red Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. "Eisschnellauf" (Speed Skating) over Bergisel ski jump, Olympic flame at r. Rev. Official logo and legend. With ribbon in Austrian colors. Housed in red leather presentation case with gold-stamped logo on top. EF. (\$17,000)
- Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Slalom. Bronze, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Alpine Mountain, event below. Rev. Large logo. With ribbon. Toned EF. (\$9,000)
- 31. Montreal 1976. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Swimming and Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 60mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium in Rome. Rev. Ancient Greek winner's laurel wreath, logo at top. With chain, housed in wooden case with black leather slipcover. EF. (\$18,000)

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- 32. Lake Placid 1980 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Speedskating 1.500m Women on February 14 to East Germany. Bronze, 80mm (3.2"), made by Tiffany & Co., designed by Medallic Art. Hand holding flaming torch, Whiteface Mountain in background. Rev. Logo over legend, large conifer branch at right, "Speedskating/1.500m Women" and name engraved at left. Housed in its Tiffany blue leatherette case lined in blue velvet and silk, plus Tiffany cardboard box. EF. (\$10,000)
- 33. Calgary 1988 Winter. Official Torch with Pouch and Display Stand. 60cm (23.6"). Maplewood handle with pictograms of 10 Olympic winter sports, steel torch bowl at top resembling the Calgary Tower, with Calgary Olympic legend in English and French. The flame was flown from Athens, Greece, to St. John, Newfoundland. In 88 days, it was carried about 18,000 km across Canada by 6,520 torchbearers sharing torches. Only about 100 torches were made. Together with stand to display the torch, and its black pouch with gold logo. EF. (\$28,000)
- 34. Calgary 1988 Winter. Silver Winner's Medal. Silver, 69mm, made by Jostens, Toronto. Joint Indian heads left, headdress consisting of winter sports equipment: skis, bobsled, luge, hockey stick etc. Rev. Calgary logo surrounded by Games legend in French and English. With long ribbon, housed in blue velvet presentation case, gray velvet inside. EF. (\$18,000)

36. The Olympic Order in Silver Presented by President Samaranch to Wolf Lyberg at the 93rd IOC Session in Calgary, February 9 to 12, 1988. Silver, 22.5x32.8cm (8.9"x12.9"), designed by Otl Aicher. Five rings in the center are flanked by olive leaves leading into a chain. Since 1975, the Olympic Order represents the highest award of the IOC. Included with the Order, housed in its red leather and red velvet case (scuffed on top), is the Samaranch signed notification card of the award which will be presented in April in Stockholm; a note from Sports Calgary on Feb. 7 that the IOC Board agreed to award the Olympic Order to S. Lyberg, Secretary General of the Swedish Olympic Committee, Lyberg's Thank you Draft for the acceptance, and the Menu of the Award Dinner at the Grand Hotel in Stockholm. All EF. (\$6,000)

38. Albertville 1992 Winter. Official Torch. Steel, 42cm (16.5"), up to 8cm (3.2") wide, designed by famous French designer Philippe Starck. The torch, when turned over, has the shape of a flame. *The flame was lit in Olympia on November 27, 1991, when the relay through Greece started. It left Greece on December 8 on the Concorde to visit about 70 countries and islands worldwide, to arrive in Paris on December 14. 5,500 torchbearers carried the flame 5,536 km (3,440 miles) around France to*

10 countries and islands worldwide, to arrive in Paris on December 14. 5,500 torchbearers carried the flame 5,536 km (3,440 miles) around France to Albertville where the cauldron was lit at the opening ceremony on February 8, 1992, by Michel Platini and Francoise-Cyrille Grange, a Savoyard girl. - 39. Albertville 1992 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Biathlon. Silver and Lalique crystal, 92mm, 9mm thick. The crystal shows large Olympic rings over Alpine mountains, set in a silver border which is engraved with logo and olive branch, Albertville 92 legend at bottom. No sport was engraved on the Albertville 1992 medals although an IOC direction asked for it. With silver ribbon, Olympic color stripes in center. *The medals were entirely handmade by Lalique in 35 different processes. Buyer will receive the name of the winner*. It shows the engraved motto "With Glowing Hearts / Des plus brilliants exploits" and the logo. *The torch relay ended after its 45000km journey through Canada with the lighting of the Olympic flame cauldron at the opening ceremony on February 12, 2010.* EF, in its protective bag. The design of the torch reminds of the feather of the Firebird, a magical bird in Russian folklore. *The fire was lit* on September 29, 2013 in Olympia; the torch relay started in Russia on October 7, reached the North Pole on October 20, was flown into space by




a Soyuz rocket, reached Europe's highest mountain (Mount Elbrus) and the world's deepest lake (Lake Baikal). It ended at the opening ceremony on February 7, 2014, in Sochi. EF. (\$2,600)

- 482. **Official Paralympic Torch.** Aluminum and polymer, partially blue, 95cm (37.4") high, 14.5cm (5.7") wide, designed by Vladimir Pirozhkov and Andrei Vodyanik. The design of the torch reminds of the feather of the Firebird, a magical bird in Russian folklore. *The torch relay was held from February 26 to March 7, 2014, and passed through all eight Federal Districts of Russia.* EF. **(\$3,000)**
- 483. **Participation Medal.** Steel, 50mm. Sochi logo and patchwork quilt design of the various cultures and ethnicities of the Russian Federations. Rev. Olympic rings and snowflake design. Similar to winner's medal. Housed in square cardboard box lined in blue velvet. "Hot Cool Yours." on side. Unc. (**\$400**)
- 484. Official Mascots Porcelain Plate. Multicolor, 19cm (7.5"). Alpine house with Olympic Games and Paralympic Games mascots, logos on top. With hanger, stand and box. (\$90)

RIO de JANEIRO, 31st OLYMPIC GAMES, 2016

486. **Official Torch.** Recycled aluminum and resin, 69 cm (27") high. The colorful layers reflect the Ground (like the Copacabana Promenade), the Sea (blue ocean ripples), the Mountains (green natural beauty surrounding Rio), and the Sky at the top with the yellow sun (the flame). Used in the torch relay, light discoloration inside the top, torch EF. In original tube. A beautiful torch reflecting the beautiful location of Rio. (**\$3,500**)



PYEONGCHANG, 23rd OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2018

- 488. **Official Torch.** White, 70cm (27.6") long, the length matching the altitude of 700 Meter of PyeongChang. The five parts at top are simulating a flame, being also based on the Korean name of PyeongChang. This symbol is shown also over the lower part in gold. *The flame was lit in Olympia, Greece, on October 24, 2017. After an 8-day relay in Greece the torch relay in Korea started on November 9. It ended at the Opening Ceremony on February 9, 2018 with the lighting of the cauldron.* Used in the torch relay. In carrying case, EF. Torch lightly discolored at top, o.w. EF. (**\$3,500**)

- 492. **Munich 2018 Bid Book.** Three volumes, 21x29.5cm (8.3"x11.6"), and a disk. EF. (**\$120**)
- 493. Minsk, Second European Games, 2019. Bronze Winner's Medal. Tombac, 9.5cm (3.7"), 540 grams. Belarus magical flower logo over flower design. Rev.
