

- London 1948. Gold Participation Medal. Goldplated bronze, 50mm, by J. Pinches/B. MacKennal. City view of London over legend in three lines, Olympic rings below. Rev. Quadriga with triumphant winner dashing left. Presented to high dignitaries. Very rare. EF. (\$2,600)
- 22. **Cortina 1956 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal.**Goldplated silver, 59mm, by C. Affer. Female head facing, crowned by Olympic rings, flame in lower r. Rev. Snowflake over Mount Pomagagnon. Beautiful! EF. (\$8,000)
- 23. **Melbourne 1956. IOC President's Badge.** White enamel around goldplated center, 30x52mm. Color Olympic rings over flame on Australia on gold background in center, with white "President" bar. With white ribbon inscribed "International Olympic Committee" and short ribbon in Olympic colors. Elbel S-1. EF. Of utmost rarity. **(\$50,000)**
- 24. **54th IOC Session in Tokyo Badge, 1958.** Blue enamel, 39x45mm. Olympic rings dividing "IOC" and "1958 Tokyo Session", Mount Fuji at top. With white-pink-white ribbon. Very rare. EF. **(\$9,500)**



- 25. Tokyo 1964 Second Paralympic Games. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silvered, 50mm. Two birds, Mount Fuji in background, "The Tokyo Games for the Physically Handicapped" around the edge. Rev. Japanese legend. Hanger on back to display it in velvet-lined case. After the first Paralympic Games in Rome 1960, Tokyo held the second Games, officially also still known as the 13th International Stoke Mandeville Games. The Summer Paralympic Games were only held again in Seoul 1988 after the IOC approved the term in 1984. Housed in wooden box with gold logo on top. Rare. EF. (\$4.500)
- 26. Tokyo 1964 Second Paralympic Games. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 50mm. Two birds, Mount Fuji in background, "The Tokyo Games for the Physically Handicapped" around the edge. Rev. Japanese legend. Hanger on back to display it in velvet-lined case. After the first Paralympic Games in Rome 1960, Tokyo held the second Games, officially also still known as the 13th International Stoke Mandeville Games. The Summer Paralympic Games were only held again in Seoul 1988 after the IOC approved the term in 1984. Housed in wooden box with gold logo on top. Rare. EF. (\$4,000)
- 27. Mexico City 1968. Chac Mol the Jaguar First Olympic Mascot of the Summer Olympic Games. Pink plush, 34cm (13.4"), 19.5cm (7.7") tall. The jaguar has its head turned towards the viewer, lt. green flowers and dots affixed on his body, lt. green ribbon with Mexico 1968 logo around his neck. Extremely rare mascot, only once offered before in 32 years of Auctions. Pictured in the official catalog of Olympic souvenirs. EF. (\$3,000)

- 28. **71st IOC Session in Luxembourg Badge, 1971.** Gilt and color enamelled, 35x44mm. Luxembourg coat of arms between gold crown and Olympic rings. With blue ribbon. EF. Rare. **(\$1,500)**
- 29. Sapporo 1972 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Downhill Skiing to Switzerland. Goldplated silver, 57x61mm, by Kazumi Yagi and Ikko Tanaka. Ski slalom trails and skating stadium. Rev. Japanese sun and logo between Japanese and English legend. Downhill pictogram attached above, reverse inscribed "Down Hill". With blue ribbon, stripes of Olympic colors at sides. With gold Winner's Pin, 20x20mm. Housed in its blue velvet presentation case. EF. (\$32,500)
- 31. Montreal 1976. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Volleyball and Housed in its Presentation Case. Silver, 60mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above Coliseum Stadium in Rome. Rev. Ancient Greek winner's laurel wreath, logo at top. With chain, housed in wooden case with black leather slipcover. Toned EF. (\$10,000)
- 32. Sarajevo 1984 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to the Czech Team, and Housed in its Presentation Case. Silver, 65x71mm. Stylized athlete's head r. with laurel wreath, 2-line award legend below. Rev. Sarajevo emblem within Croation legend. With long orange ribbon. Housed in blue leather case lined in blue velvet and silk. EF. (\$12,000)

- 33. Sarajevo 1984 Winter. Participation Medal Struck in Silver and Housed in its Presentation Case. Silver, 60x66, designed by Nebojsa Mitric. Stylized "Sarajevo 84", small logo below. Very rare in silver, struck for high officials. Housed in its leather case. EF. (\$2,000)
- 34. Los Angeles 1984. Baseball Demonstration Bronze Winner's Medal. Bronze, 60mm. Pitcher. Rev. Stars in Motion logo, crossed laurel branches below. Chinese Taipei Won Third Place, Japan and the USA first and second. With tricolored ribbon, housed in blue velvet case and cardboard box. EF. (\$2,600)

- Los Angeles 1984. Mother Flame Safety Lamp of the 1984 Torch Relay. Heavy brass, goldplated, with glass window, 23.5cm (9.3") tall, made by Koehler Company. "FLAME SAFETY LAMP" on top. Used to safe-keep the Olympic fire during the torch relay from New York to Los Angeles. Some tarnishing, abt. EF. Rare. (\$4,000)
- 36. Calgary 1988 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Alpine Skiing Men, Slalom, Won by Germany. Silver, 69mm, made by Jostens, Toronto. Joint Indian heads left, headdress consisting of winter sports equipment: skis, bobsled, luge, hockey stick etc. Rev. Calgary logo surrounded by Games legend in French and English. With long ribbon, housed in blue velvet presentation case, gray velvet inside. EF, lt. toning obv. (\$20,000)
- 37. Seoul 1988. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for **Badminton.** Goldplated, 60mm, designed and minted at Korea Security Printing and Mining Corporation. Badminton playing mascot Hodori over "XXIV Olympiad / Seoul 1988". Rev. Large logo above legend. With four-color ribbon, housed in official blue velvet case. Badminton was a Demonstration Sport. EF. (\$4,500)


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- Steel, 42cm (16.5"), up to 8cm (3.2") wide, designed by famous French designer Philippe Starck. The torch, when turned over, has the shape of a flame. The flame was lit in Olympia on November 27, 1991, when the relay through Greece started. It left Greece on December 8 on the Concorde to visit about 70 countries and islands worldwide, to arrive in Paris on December 14. 5,500 torchbearers carried the flame 5,536 km (3,440 miles) around France to Albertville where the cauldron was lit at the opening ceremony on February 8, 1992, by Michel Platini and Francoise-Cyrille Grange, a Savoyard girl. One of only 130 torches. Numbered. EF. Rare. (\$65,000)
- Barcelona 1992. Silver Paralympic Games Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 66mm, by Xavier Corbero. Logo. Rev. "Paralympics/Barcelona "92" over Braille legend. With ribbon in Olympic colors. EF. (\$4,000)
- 40. Atlanta 1996. Painting by Michel Delacroix: Atlanta 1896 - 1996. In 1994, for the Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta, Georgia, the IOC and the United States Olympic Committee named famous painter Michel Delacroix as the Official Artist for the 1996 Olympic Games and commissioned him to celebrate the 1996 Games in an oil painting titled ATLANTA 1896 - 1996. Delacroix's stunning work was used to create an Official Poster for the 1996 Games and to mark the 100th anniversary of the modern Olympic Games. This master piece reflects a combination of a century past and the present. In the center of the painting, we see the Olympic banner. The painting is a significant historical piece commemorating the event. It was displayed in several venues throughout the games. Delacroix is famous the world over for his masterful preservation of the naif style and he has had over 370 shows of his works worldwide. He was born in Paris in 1933 and continues to live in Paris today. The painting features a modern Atlanta in the twilight of the day in the upper portion of







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the painting, including some Olympic venues in the center, then gracefully depicting the Atlanta of yesteryear depicting locomotives and horse drawn carriages of days gone by in the lower portions of work. The details of life, the spires of churches, businesses and architecture of both centuries are masterfully blended. Many scenes within the scene draw you in.

The Centennial Olympic Games – Described by the Consignor. This large work is oil on board. The painting itself measures 56x74.5cm (22"x29"). The original frame measures 74.5x92.5cm (29"x36.5"). The painting has been well cared for and is in excellent condition. The provenance is from the Atlanta Olympic Committee to William Tritt (Suburban Galleries) in Atlanta and then to the current owner in 1997 with documentation. This is one treasure to be passed from generation to generation and to always be enjoyed. EF. (\$24,000)

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
