384. **Tenth Pan American Games in Indianapolis USA, 1987. U.S. Team Pin Set.** 29 multicolor pins, housed in frame with plaque, 37.5x30cm (14.8"x11.8"). EF. (\$80)

**CALGARY, 15th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 1988**

385. **Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to a Soviet Player.** Goldplated silver, 69mm made by Jostens, Toronto. Joint Indian heads left, headdress consisting of winter sports equipment: skis, bobsled, luge, hockey stick etc. Rev. Calgary logo surrounded by Games legend in French and English. With long multicolor ribbon. Edge inscribed with event in English and French. EF. (\$20,000)
386. **Official Torch with Pouch and Display Stand.** 60cm (23.6"). Maplewood handle with pictograms of 10 Olympic winter sports, steel torch bowl at top resembling the Calgary Tower, with Calgary Olympic legend in English and French. *The flame was flown from Athens, Greece, to St. John, Newfoundland. In 88 days, it was carried about 18,000 km across Canada by 6,520 torchbearers sharing torches. Only about 100 torches were made.* With pouch and stand. EF. (\$24,000)
387. **93rd IOC Session in Calgary, 1988. Group of Six Badges.** Goldplated, 30x45mm each. With white, yellow, yellow-black, green-white and orange ribbons. All EF. (6 pcs.) (\$325)
388. **Official Olympic Beer Stein of the 1988 Winter Games in Calgary.** Multicolor ceramic, 19.5cm (7.7") high, made by Gerz for Anheuser-Busch. Colorful scenes of all winter sports in Calgary, flags of participating nations around top, Calgary logo on pewter lid. Numbered, in original box. EF. (\$100)
389. **Second Place Cross-Country Skiing Ladies 20km Winner's Diploma Awarded to Anfissa Reztsova, Soviet Union.** 38x38cm (14.9"x14.9"). With 3 facsimile signatures. Light creases, abt. EF. (\$300)

390. **Official Torch.** Brass, 50cm (20"), with tan leather handle, designed by Lee Woo-Sing. Bowl depicts dragons, Seoul Olympic logo enameled in color below. EF. (\$5,000)
391. **Badminton Bronze Third Place Demonstration Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 60mm, designed and minted at Korea Security Printing and Mining Corporation. Badminton playing Hodori over "XXIV Olympiad / Seoul 1988". Rev. Large logo above legend, "Badminton" on edge. With four-color ribbon, housed in official blue velvet case. *Badminton was a Demonstration Sport.* EF. (\$3,000)

392. **Paralympic Participation Medal.** Bronze, 65x65mm. South Gate mountains in back, Paralympic logo above. Rev. Paralympic mascots at top, stadium between legend. EF, spots on reverse. **(\$300)**
393. **94th IOC Session in Seoul, 1988. Group of 4 Badges.** Gilt, 30x45mm. Badges are IOC, IOC Guest, Press, and Media. All EF. (4 pcs.) **(\$400)**
394. **Hodori and Wife Hosuni Olympic Mascot Figurines.** Colored wood, on wooden 10.5cm (4.1") base, 9cm (3.5") high. Seldom seen with his mascot wife. In pictorial box, EF. **(\$80)**
395. **Nice Pair of Souvenirs: Main Stadium Clock.** 16.5cm (6.5") high. The hands run around the soccer stadium ready for a soccer game. With white, white-purple and purple ribbons for IOC, IOC Guest and Host Organizing Committee. **Plus 112th IOC Session in Moscow, 2001.** Host Organizing Committee Badge and Secretariat Badge. Goldplated, rings in color. All EF. (5 pcs.) **(\$325)**

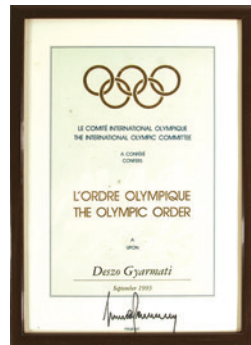

- BARCELONA, 25th OLYMPIC GAMES, 1992**
403. **Official Torch.** Chrome-plated aluminum, 65cm (23.6”), designed by André Rich. “XXV Olympiad Barcelona 1992” legend and goldplated Barcelona emblem. Heavy rubbing on leather part, as usual, o.w. EF. **(\$4,750)**
404. **Silver Winner’s Medal.** Silver, 75mm, 173.3 grams, by Xavier Gorbero. Victory seated on superimposed, 56mm medal. Rev. Barcelona logo of jumping athlete over Olympic rings. Unevenly toned EF. **(\$2,400)**
405. **Group of Four Participants Pins Presented by the IOC: Barcelona 1992, Atlanta 1996, Sydney 2000 and Beijing 2008.** All gilt, 14x19mm. Numbered, in their white plastic pouches. All EF. (4 pcs.) **(\$180)**
406. **99th IOC Session in Barcelona 1992. Group of 13 IOC Session Badges.** Multicolor, 30x65mm. With ribbons, all in different colors. All EF. (13 pcs.) **(\$650)**

407. **The Olympic Order in Bronze with the Diploma Awarded to Dezso Gyarmati from Hungary in September 1993.** Order 22.5x5x32.8cm (8.9”x12.9”), designed by Otl Aicher. Five rings in the center are flanked by olive leaves leading into a chain. Housed in a green leather case lined in velvet and silk. Plus Award Diploma in frame, 22.5x31cm (8.9”x12.2”). Signed in ink by President Samaranch. *D. Gyarmati was a water polo player at the Melbourne 1956 Olympic Games when the Soviet Union invaded Hungary on November 4. The Hungarian and Russian water polo teams got in a fight on December 6 during a match (“Blood in the swimming pool”) – many of the Hungarian players did not return home after the Olympic Games ended. Gyarmati won gold in 1952, 1956 and 1964; silver in 1948 and bronze in 1960. A coach for many years, and his team won gold in Montreal 1976.* Order and Diploma EF. (2 pcs.) **(\$4,000)**

408. **Paralympic First Place Gold Medal Diploma Awarded for Cross-Country 10km Men.** 21x29.7cm (8.3”x11.7”). Signed by IPC President Steadward and LPOC President Heiberg. One of 3 gold medals won by the same participant. EF. **(\$300)**
409. **Fourth Place Winner’s Diploma Awarded for Ice Hockey.** 12x30cm (4.7”x11.8”). Embossed hockey player in center. EF. **(\$150)**
410. **Participation Diploma with Folder.** Multicolor, 21.5x30.5cm (8.5”x12”). With 4-page cover, lt. foxing. Diploma EF. **(\$100)**

411. **104th IOC Session in Budapest, 1995. Group of 16 Session Badges.** Gilt, rings in color, 35x65mm. With ribbons and cords. Attractive badges. All EF. (16 pcs.) (\$1,000)
412. **Group of 5 IOC Session Badges: Budapest, 104th Session, 1995, Press and Hostesses; Seoul, 109th Session, 1999, IOC Staff (2); and Athens, 116th Session, 2004, Service Badge.** All EF. (5 pcs.) (\$300)

**ATLANTA, 26th OLYMPIC GAMES, 1996**

413. **Official Centennial of the Olympic Games Celebration Torch.** Silvered aluminum and wood, 55cm (21.7"). Names of all 23 Olympic cities from 1896 to 1996 inscribed on torch. *The Hellenic Olympic Committee celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the 1896 Olympic Games in the Panathenean Stadium in Athens on April 6, 1996. Part of this celebration was the re-enactment of the 1896 Games. Olympic medalists and representatives of all cities who had hosted the Olympic Games since 1896 took part in the torch run within the stadium. Afterwards, they took the torches back to their Olympic cities for a ceremony.* EF. (\$3,500)
414. **Official Torch.** Aluminum and Georgia pecan wood, 80cm (31.5"), designed by Peter Mastrogiannis. 22 reeds represent the cities where Olympic Games had been held since 1896. Gathered by 2 goldplated brass bands, the top band displays the Atlanta torch logo and the quilt of leaves design, the bottom band lists all Olympic cities since 1896. The wooden pecan handle represents the connection of the flame between heaven and earth. *The flame was lit in Olympia. It reached Los Angeles on April 27 and ended 84 days later in Atlanta, carried by 10,000 relay runners, horses, bicycles, trains, ships, and hydroplanes.* EF. (\$2,600)
415. **Small Size Rome 1960 Silver Torch Presented to Italian Gold Medal Winners in Atlanta 1996 by the Italian NOC.** Cast silver, hallmarked "800", 27.5cm (10.8"), by Paolillo Co., Rome. Numbered. EF, in wooden, velvet-lined presentation case, with dedication plaque. Rare. EF. (\$2,600)
416. **105th IOC Session in Atlanta, 1996. Group of 4 Session Badges.** Each goldplated, white and green enamel, 50x72mm. **IOC Guest** with white-blue white ribbon; **Press** with yellow ribbon; **Photography Press** with yellow-black-yellow ribbon; and **Television** with orange ribbon. All EF. (4 pcs.) (\$200)



417. **Carl Lewis Autographed Starting Number; July 29 Athletics Ticket when he won Long Jump Gold, and the Day 12 July 30 Sports Illustrated Daily Magazine of July 29.** Lewis own number was 2374 in his gold medal jump, the fourth time gold medal since Los Angeles 1984. All EF. (3 pcs.) (\$150)
418. **Michael Johnson Autographed Starting Number, and Day 15 August 2 Sports Illustrated Daily Magazine.** Michael Johnson's own number was 2370 in his gold medal winning 200m, cutting his own world record to 19:32. He was the only male sprinter at the time to win gold in 200m and 400m at the same Olympics. Both EF. (2 pcs.) (\$120)
