

- 458. **Official Torch.** Aluminum and polymer, partially red, 95cm (37.4") high, 14.5cm (5.7") wide, designed by Vladimir Pirozhkov and Andrei Vodyanik. The design of the torch reminds of the feather of the Firebird, a magical bird in Russian folklore. The fire was lit on September 29, 2013 in Olympia; the torch relay started in Russia on October 7, reached the North Pole on October 20, was flown into space by a Soyuz rocket, reached Europe's highest mountain (Mount Elbrus) and the world's deepest lake (Lake Baikal). It ended at the opening ceremony on February 7, 2014, in Sochi. EF. (\$2,600)
- 459. **Official Paralympic Torch.** Aluminum and polymer, partially blue, 95cm (37.4") high, 14.5cm (5.7") wide, designed by Vladimir Pirozhkov and Andrei Vodyanik. The design of the torch reminds of the feather of the Firebird, a magical bird in Russian folklore. The torch relay was held from February 26 to March 7, 2014, and passed through all eight Federal Districts of Russia. EF. (\$3,000)
- 460. Colorful Wool Jacket Worn by the U.S. Olympic Team During the Opening Ceremony. Made by Polo Ralph Lauren, large size. Large "USA" on back. EF. (\$200)
- 461. Second Olympic Youth Games in Nanjing, 2014. Official Torch Known as "Gate of Happiness". 75cm (30"), made by Vatti Corp. The top part resembles a city gate, the stripe pattern on the handle resembles the waves of Changjiang River. EF. (\$1,000)
- 462. Magic Johnson Autographed Basketball Certified by Beckett. Spalding Indoor/Outdoor NBA Tack-Soft Basketball. Signed in gold by Magic Johnson, undated. With certificate of authenticity by Beckett. EF. (\$750)

463. Kobe Bryant Official NBA Basketball Personally Signed with a Silver Pen on an Official NBA All-Surface Ball with Protective Carton. Included is a certificate of authenticity. Ball about EF, bright signature. (\$750)

- 464. **Official Torch.** Recycled aluminum and resin, 69 cm (27") high. The colorful layers reflect the Ground (like the Copacabana Promenade), the Sea (blue ocean ripples), the Mountains (green natural beauty surrounding Rio), and the Sky at the top with the yellow sun (the flame). Used in the torch relay, light discoloration inside the top, torch EF. In original tube. A beautiful torch reflecting the beautiful location of Rio. **(\$3,500)**
- 465. Trio of Gold, Silver and Bronze Winner's Pins Presented by the IOC. 12x14mm each. All are numbered and in clear plastic. All Unc. (3 pcs.) (\$400)
- 466. **Rio Gold Medal Ceremony Presentation Sculpture.** Multicolor, base 11.8x9.5cm (4.7"x3.7"), 9cm (3.5") high. Logo affixed on **green** base with Rio 2016 logo, inscribed on side "XXXI Olimpiada Rio 2016". *All medal winners received this sculpture with their medals.* EF. **(\$200)**

Participant Pin Presented by the IOC. Gilt, 14x14mm. Cased, and includes a 10-page booklet from IOC President Bach. EF. (\$100)


TOKYO, 32nd OLYMPIC GAMES, 2020 (2021)

- 472. **Official Torch.** Cherry blossom pink colored aluminum, 71cm (28") long, designed by Tokujin Yoshioka Inc. The design on the top is in the form of a 5-petal cherry blossom that each holds a flame that comes together as one flame in the center. It has been made from a single sheet of aluminum, 30% of it made from recycled aluminum from temporary prefabricated housing construction after the 2011 earthquake, as a symbol of peace. The torch relay had originally been planned to last over 121 days but worldwide Covid-19 ended these plans. A beautiful torch, rarely seen, whose color might change over time from cherry blossom pink to gold. Housed in its pink container. EF. (\$12,000)
- 473. **Participant's Pin Presented by the IOC.** Goldplated, 14x19mm. Housed in its original box. Unc. **(\$120)**
- 474. Tokyo 2020 Olympic Gold Medal Winner's Case with Gold IOC Winner's Pin. Wooden case with logo, 12x5.5cm (4.7"x2.2"), raised 2020 logo on top. Inside is the 2020 IOC Gold Medal Winner's Pin, 12x15mm, and a storage bag, also IOC President Bach's congratulatory note. Housed in cardboard box with embossed logo on top. EF. (\$800)
- 467 Pair of Opening and Closing Ceremony Programs for the Olympic Games (2) and the Paralympic Games (2). Color covers, illustrated, in Portuguese, English and French. Plus Paralympic Media Guides for the Opening and Closing Ceremonies, in English and Portuguese. All EF. (6 pcs.) (\$150)

PYEONGCHANG, 23rd OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2018

468. **Official Torch.** White, 70cm (27.6") long, the length matching the altitude of 700 Meter of PyeongChang. The five parts at top are simulating a flame, being also based on the Korean name of PyeongChang. This symbol is shown also over the lower part in gold. The flame was lit in Olympia, Greece, on October 24, 2017. After an 8-day relay in Greece the torch relay in Korea started on November 9. It ended at the Opening Ceremony on February 9, 2018 with the lighting of the cauldron. Used in the torch relay. In carrying case, EF. Torch lightly discolored at top, o.w. EF. (\$3,000)

- 476. Silver Medal Second Place Winner's Diploma Awarded to Dabin Lee, Korea, for Women's 67+kg Taekwondo. Color rings and logo, 42x29.5cm (16.5"x11.6"). Silver color design on right. Facsimile signatures of IOC President Bach and OC President Hashimoto. With envelope, EF. (\$450)
- 477. Bronze Medal Third Place Winner's Diploma Awarded to Kyo Don In, Korea, for Men's 80+kg Taekwondo. 42x29.5cm (16.5"x11.6"). Bronze color design on right. Facsimile signatures of IOC President Bach and OC President Hashimoto. With envelope, EF. (\$300)
- 478. Bronze Medal Third Place Winner's Diploma Awarded for Boxing, Men's Featherweight, 52-57 kg. 42x29.5cm (16.5"x11.6"), copper color design on right. Olympic rings above



award legend, facsimile signatures of IOC President Bach and OC President Hashimoto. Center fold, creases, VF. (\$180)

- 479. Identity Card and 2 Session Passes of a Bronze Boxing Medal Winner. Laminated, 11x17cm (4.3"x6.7"). Plus Session Passes for 7/28 and 8/1. EF. (3 pcs.) (\$120)
- 480. Participation Certificate of Junghwan Kim, Men's Saber Gold Medalist. 20.7x28cm (8.2"x11"). First fencer to win a medal in 3 consecutive Olympic Games: Gold 2012 and Bronze 2016, World Champion in 2018. EF. (\$150)

BEJING, 24th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2022

- 481. Commemorative Medal. Bronze, 75mm (3"). Logo of the 24th Olympic Winter Games. Rev. The snowflake cauldron and the Olympic motto, "Together for a Shared Future". Numbered on edge. Housed in case and slipcover, with numbered certificate. Since no participation medals were made (same as in Tokyo 2020/2021), this medal takes its place. EF. (\$200)
- 482. **Set of 6 Team Pins from Peru.** Silvered, all multicolor, each limited to 150 pcs. All EF. (6 pcs.) (\$200)
- 483. Sixth Place Winner's Diploma Awarded to You Young, Korea, for Women's Figure Skating, Singles. Color rings and logo, 38x38cm (15"x15"). In background are snowflakes falling on snowy mountain side. Facsimile signatures of IOC President Bach and OC President Cai Qi. In illustrated tube, EF. (\$150)
