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## Very rare Official Torch of the 1960 Squaw Valley Olympic Winter Games

Squaw Valley 1960 Winter. Official Torch Nr. 24. Aluminum, 1. 48.5cm (19.1"), designed by John Hench, a veteran Disney artist. The top part resembles the London 1948, the Cortina d'Ampezzo 1956 and the Melbourne 1956 torches with three cut-out Olympic rings above a circular legend, here "VIII OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES". Below is another section with the Squaw Valley official logo between two laurel branches, and the legend "OLYMPIA TO SQUAW VALLEY". Part of the wick is still inside the top. Walt Disney was Chairman of the Pageantry Committee whose duties included the organization of the Torch Relay. This torch with number 24 was presented by Walt Disney to Tom Leetch whom he had assigned to the Torch Relay and the Pageantry. Walt Disney thanked Tom Leetch after the Games for his successful cooperation, and presented him with this torch mounted on a wooden base (26x31cm (10.2"x12.2") so that he could display it at his home. Furthermore, included in this lot are a Citation on a wooden plaque, 26x31cm (10.2"x12.2"), awarded to Tom Leetch for his contribution to the ceremony and overall pageantry, by the Organizing Committee President Prentis Cobb Hale, and the Chairman of the Pageantry Committee, Walt Disney. Plus a 4-page Thank You from the OC President Hale for a job well done, with 2 pages of appreciation letters by Brundage, Nixon, Bingham, Ditlev-Simonsen and other illustrious

worldwide dignitaries. Disney had planned to have the flame lit in Olympia, Greece for the first time for a Winter Olympic Games (Oslo 1952 was lit in Morgedal, Norway, and Cortina d'Ampezzo 1956 was lit in Rome), as was the tradition for the Summer Olympic Games since Berlin 1936. And the torch would announce this fact by the wording "OLYMPIA TO SQUAW VALLEY" - but the Committee in Olympia deemed the time too short to stage this ceremony after they were notified. It was too late to change the design of the torch! It was quickly decided to light the flame again in Morgedal, Norway, as for the Oslo 1952 torch relay, at the house of Sondre Norheim, the "father of skiing". From Morgedal the flame was transported by car to Oslo and Copenhagen, and from there by plane to Los Angeles. Over 600 high school students carried the flame, one mile each student, in 19 days from Los Angeles to San Francisco and Sacramento, the capital of California, on to Squaw Valley. On opening day on February 18, the flame was taken by helicopter to Little Papoose Peak from where Andrea Mead Lawrence, winner of 2 gold medals in Oslo 1952 in slalom and giant slalom, skied down with the flaming torch to hand it to Kenneth Henry, speed skating gold medal winner in Oslo 1952. He skated around the rink of the Blyth Memorial Arena before lighting the cauldron on the Tower of the Nations platform where it burnt till the closing on February 28. 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- 2. Athens 1896. First Olympic Games First Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. *First place winners of the 43 events received a silver medal, second place winners a bronze medal. No gold medals were awarded in the first Olympic Games.* A very beautiful and historically important medal. Very rare. Housed in its round red leather case lined in blue velvet, lightly scuffed. Medal toned EF. (\$80,000)
- 3. Athens 1896. (Program) Opening Ceremony of the First Olympic Games, Monday, April 6, 1896 at 15.00h, and Athletic Sports, Starting at 15.30h (3:30 pm) at the Olympic Stadium. 7 pages, 16x23cm (6.3"x9.1"), in Greek and French. The program of the Olympic Games opens at 3 pm, following by 100M at 3:30 pm which were won by Thomas Burke, Boston Athletic Association, USA. Fritz Hofmann, Germany, placed second. Triple Jump at 3:40 pm were won by James Connolly, Suffolk Athletic Club, USA, followed by 800 Meters at 4:15 pm won by Edwin Flack, Australia. Finally Discus at 4:25 pm was won by Robert Garrett, Princeton, USA. Lt. browning, lt. center crease, EF. (\$900)
- 4. St. Louis 1904. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Won by Robert Stangland, USA, in Track & Field Hop, Step, and Jump (Triple Jump) on September 1st, 1904. Bronze, 39mm, made by Dieges & Clust, New York. Victorious athlete standing; radiant Acropolis and ancient Greek athletes in background, "OLYMPIAD 1904". Rev. Victory holding laurel wreath over engraved "Running/ Hop, Step & Jump", sm. bust of Zeus at I. EF. Complete with ribbon, yellow center stripe, blue-white-red stripes either side, suspended from bronze bar inscribed "1904/UNIVERSAL/OLYMPIC GAMES/ST. LOUIS EXPOSITION". Medal housed in original maroon leather case with gold lettering, partial leather loss from removed tape below. Medal toned EF. Extremely rare medal from the St. Louis Olympic Track & Field Athletics Week. (\$40,000)



5. St. Louis 1904. Gold First Place Winner's Medal in the Olympic Gymnastic Rope Climbing Event, October 28, 1904. Solid gold, 45mm, 31 grams, by Dieges & Clust. Female on wheel extending wreath, Amateur Athletic Union of the U.S. legend. Rev. "ROPE CLIMBING"/ "CHAMPION" at top, sports equipment around lower half. Suspended from gold bar, 50x17mm, inscribed "1904 Universal Exposition Olympic Games 1904" in 4 lines, and redwhite-blue ribbon which is Itly. soiled. The Olympic event was won by George Eyser, USA, who had a wooden leg. He won 6 Olympic athletic medals including 3 gold on October 28. Rope Climbing was an Olympic event in 1896, 1904, 1906, 1924, and 1932. EF. Very rare. (\$20,000)



- 6. St. Louis 1904. Participation Medal. Bronze, 40x40mm, made by Dieges & Clust, New York. Nude athlete striding r., laurel branch in hand. Rev. Legend in eleven lines, shields of St. Louis, France and U.S.A. between ivy leaves, "E.C. Brown" engraved on bottom edge. Everett C. Brown (1863-1937) was a member of the American Olympic Committee, and he had been a member of the Chicago Olympic Planning Committee (the 1904 Games were first awarded to Chicago). He also was a Timer in St. Louis. As a member of the Executive Committee of the AOC he was in charge of American teams for London 1908, Stockholm 1912, Antwerp 1920, and Paris 1924. He was also President of the National AA Union in 1910. With loop and ring. Toned on reverse, EF. (\$12,000)
- Athens 1906. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Box. Bronze, 50mm, by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. Housed in round red box lined in velvet. Toned EF. (\$4,500)
- London 1908. Doctor's Badge. Silvered, dark blue enamel, 57mm, designed by Bertram MacKennal, made by Vaughton, Birmingham. Helmeted head left of Britannia facing laurel branch surrounded by legend. Elbel S-12. Rare. EF. (\$4,500)
- Stockholm 1912. Pair of Silver Second Place Winners Medals. Both silver, 33mm, by Erik Lindberg and Bertram MacKennal, struck by Sporrong & Co. Herald proclaiming Olympic Games, bust of Ling, Father of Swedish Gymnastics, on pedestal at r. Rev. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Both toned EF. (2 pcs.) (\$7,500)

- Chamonix 1924 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 55mm, by Raoul Bénard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. EF. Rare. (\$28,000)
- 12. **Paris 1924. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by A. Rivaud. Winner helping fallen athlete back on his feet symbolizing sportsmanship. Rev. Various sport equipment, legend on panel below. EF. **(\$4,000)**

- 15. St. Moritz 1928 winter. Gold First Flace winner's Medial won by Famous Norwegian Skier Johan Gröttumsbraaten, Winner in Cross-Country Skiing, Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 50mm, by Arnold Hünerwadel. Female skater with outstretched arms surrounded by icicles. Rev. 5-line French legend between olive branches, Olympic rings above, "Johan Grøttumsbråten" engraved at bottom. *Ski legend Grøttumsbråten was the best skier in the 1920's and early 1930's in Cross-country Skiing and Nordic Combined. He won gold in both events in St. Moritz 1928, having already won a silver medal and two bronze medals in Chamonix in 1924. He went on to win gold in Nordic Combined in Lake Placid 1932.* Housed in its cardboard presentation case, paper loss at top, o.w. EF. Medal EF. (\$26,000)
- 14. St. Moritz 1928 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Diploma Awarded to M.J. Grøttumsbråten, for Cross Country Skiing, 18km, on February 17, 1928. Brown and gold, 40x34.5cm (15.8"x13.6"). Laurel branch over legend, Olympic rings below. Signed in ink by Swiss NOC President W. Hirschy and IOC President Baillet-Latour. His gold medal is offered in the previous lot 13. Grøttumsbråten was the most celebrated and successful skier in the first half of the 20th century. EF. (\$3,000)
- 15. Lake Placid 1932 Winter. Participation Medal Housed in its Rare Presentation Box. Bronze, 48x60mm, by Julio Kilenyi. Winged figure of Fame blowing horn, Olympic rings above, winter landscape in background. Rev. Six winter sports depicted on shields around legend in six lines, scenes of curling and dogsledding below. EF. In very rare cardboard presentation box, top loose, tape stain on top. Medal toned EF. (\$9,000)

- Los Angeles 1932. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. Toned EF. (\$5,000)
- Berlin 1936. The Golden Chain of Office for the Members 17. of the International Olympic Committee. Produced by the Sculptor Walter B. Lemke from the Originals in the Old Museum in Berlin. Cast bronze, approximately 80cm (31.5"). Six small plaques are linked by rings. Right side: Horseman with relay torch, silver coin from Taranto, 300 B.C.; Javelin thrower from bowl, 430 B.C. Discus thrower, silver coin from Cos, 500 B.C. Left side: Wrestlers, silver coin from Aspendos, 400 B.C.; Runner bearing arms, from bowl, 500 B.C.: and Youth with jumping weights, from bowl, 490 B.C. The two lower plaques are linked by enameled Olympic rings, from which is suspended a plaque with the famous head of Zeus stone sculpture. Reverse engraved "XI. OLYMPIADE BERLIN 1936" at top, leaving room for ten more future Olympiads. Official report p. 126/127; Olympic Games News Service No. 33. There were 68 IOC members plus IOC President Baillet-Latour at the time of the Berlin Games. The chain was only worn at the Berlin Olympic Games. Many questions remain unanswered about what happened to these chains that were stored in Berlin after the Games, for use again at the 1940 Helsinki Games which were cancelled due to the Soviet invasion and bombing of Helsinki in March 1940. - 18. St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Set of Three Gold, Silver and Bronze Winners Medals Housed in their Presentation Cases. Goldplated silver, silver and bronze, 60mm, struck by Huguenin Frères in Le Locle, Switzerland. Hand holding torch in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background. Rev. 4-line French legend between ice crystals. Gold medal with engraved legend on reverse: "K. Gassmann/Vice President Du COS/Et Chef De Mission". Rare set previously owned by K. Gassmann who was the Vice President of the Swiss Olympic Committee, also the Chef de Mission in St. Moritz. All EF. (3 pcs.) (\$35,000)
- St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Ice Hockey Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded to Patrick Guzzo from the Canadian Team.
   60mm, by Huguenin Frères. Hand holding torch in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background. Rev. 4-line French

legend between ice crystals. Originally Canada decided not to send a hockey team, but the Air Force ice hockey team members, the "Flyers", who had fought in World War II, went ahead to represent Canada and to become the ultimate heroes. Canada did not win gold in ice hockey again until in Vancouver 2010. Case Fine, top detached. Medal EF. (\$18,000)

20. St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winners Medal Awarded for Military Ski Patrol, a Demonstration Event, to the Team from Sweden. Bronze, 50mm, by Huguenin Frères. Ski patrol ascending mountain. Rev. Olympic rings over event encircled by "Olympic Winter Games 1948 St. Moritz" in French. *Military Ski Patrols were part of every Winter Olympiad since Chamonix 1924. 8 teams participated with 4 men each. Official report p. 71.* One of only 12 awarded medals. Rare. Toned EF. (\$4,500)



- London 1948. Gold Participation Medal. Goldplated bronze, 50mm, by J. Pinches/B. MacKennal. City view of London over legend in three lines, Olympic rings below. Rev. Quadriga with triumphant winner dashing left. Presented to high dignitaries. Very rare. EF. (\$2,600)
- 22. Cortina 1956 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated silver, 59mm, by C. Affer. Female head facing, crowned by Olympic rings, flame in lower r. Rev. Snowflake over Mount Pomagagnon. Beautiful! EF. (\$8,000)
- Melbourne 1956. IOC President's Badge. White enamel around goldplated center, 30x52mm. Color Olympic rings over flame on Australia on gold background in center, with white "President" bar. With white ribbon inscribed "International Olympic Committee" and short ribbon in Olympic colors. Elbel S-1. EF. Of utmost rarity. (\$50,000)
- 24. **54th IOC Session in Tokyo Badge, 1958.** Blue enamel, 39x45mm. Olympic rings dividing "IOC" and "1958 Tokyo Session", Mount Fuji at top. With white-pink-white ribbon. Very rare. EF. **(\$9,500)**



- 25. Tokyo 1964 Second Paralympic Games. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silvered, 50mm. Two birds, Mount Fuji in background, "The Tokyo Games for the Physically Handicapped" around the edge. Rev. Japanese legend. Hanger on back to display it in velvet-lined case. After the first Paralympic Games in Rome 1960, Tokyo held the second Games, officially also still known as the 13th International Stoke Mandeville Games. - 38. Albertville 1992 Winter. Official Torch Housed in its Case. Steel, 42cm (16.5"), up to 8cm (3.2") wide, designed by famous French designer Philippe Starck. The torch, when turned over, has the shape of a flame. The flame was lit in Olympia on November 27, 1991, when the relay through Greece started. It left Greece on December 8 on the Concorde to visit about 70 countries and islands worldwide, to arrive in Paris on December 14. 5,500 torchbearers carried the flame 5,536 km (3,440 miles) around France to Albertville where the cauldron was lit at the opening ceremony on February 8, 1992, by Michel Platini and Francoise-Cyrille Grange, a Savoyard girl. One of only 130 torches. Numbered. EF. Rare. (\$65,000)
- Barcelona 1992. Silver Paralympic Games Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 66mm, by Xavier Corbero. Logo. Rev. "Paralympics/Barcelona "92" over Braille legend. With ribbon in Olympic colors. EF. (\$4,000)
- 40. Atlanta 1996. Painting by Michel Delacroix: Atlanta 1896 - 1996. In 1994, for the Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta, Georgia, the IOC and the United States Olympic Committee named famous painter Michel Delacroix as the Official Artist for the 1996 Olympic Games and commissioned him to celebrate the 1996 Games in an oil painting titled ATLANTA 1896 - 1996. Delacroix's stunning work was used to create an Official Poster for the 1996 Games and to mark the 100th anniversary of the modern Olympic Games. This master piece reflects a combination of a century past and the present. In the center of the painting, we see the Olympic banner. The painting is a significant historical piece commemorating the event. It was displayed in several venues throughout the games. Delacroix is famous the world over for his masterful preservation of the naif style and he has had over 370 shows of his works worldwide. He was born in Paris in 1933 and continues to live in Paris today. The painting features a modern Atlanta in the twilight of the day in the upper portion of



the painting, including some Olympic venues in the center, then gracefully depicting the Atlanta of yesteryear depicting locomotives and horse drawn carriages of days gone by in the lower portions of work. The details of life, the spires of churches, businesses and architecture of both centuries are masterfully blended. Many scenes within the scene draw you in.

**The Centennial Olympic Games – Described by the Consignor.** This large work is oil on board. The painting itself measures 56x74.5cm (22"x29"). The original frame measures 74.5x92.5cm (29"x36.5"). The painting has been well cared for and is in excellent condition. The provenance is from the Atlanta Olympic Committee to William Tritt (Suburban Galleries) in Atlanta and then to the current owner in 1997 with documentation. This is one treasure to be passed from generation to generation and to always be enjoyed. EF. **(\$24,000)**

View of Opera House and Harbor Bridge surrounded by Paralympic venues. Rev. Logos of Sydney Paralympic OC and International Paralympic Committee. Unawarded. 
