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
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Highlights of the Auction



- 1. Athens 1906. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 50mm, by J.C. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch standing on globe. Same design as the 1896 winners medal, only the date changed. While in 1896 only a silver and bronze medal were awarded for the first two places, in 1906 the Committee awarded gold, silver and bronze medals. Lightly toned EF. (\$7,000)
- 2. Athens 1906. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 50mm by J.C. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing, holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch standing on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. Toned EF. (\$6,000)
- 3. Stockholm 1912. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Red Presentation Case. Silver, 33mm, by Erik Lindberg and Bertram MacKennal, struck by Sporrong & Co. Herald proclaiming Olympic Games, bust of Ling on pedestal at r. Rev. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Housed in its red leather presentation case with gold design, lined in silk and red velvet. Spot on right, o.w. EF. Medal abt. EF/EF. (\$6,500)
- 4. Berlin 1916. First Russian Olympiad in Kiev, in Preparation for the Berlin 1916 Olympic Games, 1913. Bronze Third Place Winners Medal. Bronze, 53mm, by Joseph Marshak. Nude discus thrower, view of Kiev in background. Rev. City shield, crossed oak and olive branch below. Russia participated the first time in Olympic Games in Stockholm 1912. The Russian team came in second to last of 18 participating nations. Grand Duke Dmitrii Pavlovich oversaw the Russian Olympic Games in order to train athletes for better results in the next Olympic Games in Berlin 1916. The Sports Ground for the Games was the first permanent stadium in Russia. The "Cartier of Kiev", Joseph Marshak, main competitor of Karl Fabergé, created the winner's medal for the First Russian Olympic Games. See Bubka, Sergey and Bulatova, M.M. "Kiev The First Russian Olympiad 1913", with much information and many photos. EF, spot obv. Very rare. (\$2,000)
- 6. Antwerp 1920. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 60mm, by Dupon. Nude victorious athlete with palm branch and laurel wreath, fame blowing horn. Rev. View of Antwerp. Small loop at top. Lightly toned EF. (\$6,000)





- 7. Antwerp 1920. Victory Sculpture for Sale to the Public. Same sculpture as previous lot but missing the base with legend. Cast bronze, 37cm (14.6") high on 8cm high marble base. Nude athlete holding up his winner's wreath, standing on round marble base inscribed "VICTOIRE" (Victory), and artist's signature M. Grandmoulin. Beautiful statue. EF. (\$5,000)
- 8. Chamonix 1924 First Winter Olympic Games. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 55mm, by Raoul Bénard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. EF. Rare. (\$22,000)
- Chamonix 1924 First Winter Olympic Games. Cased Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. 55mm, by Raoul Benard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. Very rarely seen with case. Case lightly scuffed, medal toned EF. (\$14,000)
- Paris 1924. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 55mm, by A. Rivaud. Legend surrounded by sports equipment. Rev. Winner helping fallen athlete back on his feet. Dark toning, EF. (\$7,000)

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by Famous Norwegian Skier Johan Gröttumsbraaten, Winner in Cross-Country Skiing, Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 50mm, by Arnold Hünerwadel. Female skater with outstretched arms surrounded by icicles. Rev. 5-line French legend between olive branches, Olympic rings above, "Johan Gröttumsbråten" engraved at bottom. Ski legend Gröttumsbråten was the best skier in the 1920's and early 1930's in Cross-country Skiing and Nordic Combined. He won gold in both events in St. Moritz 1928, having already won a silver medal and two bronze medals in Chamonix in 1924. He went on to win gold in Nordic Combined in Lake Placid 1932. Housed in its cardboard presentation case, VF. Medal EF. (\$24,000)



- 13. Lake Placid 1932 Winter. International Olympic Committee Badge. Gilt, black bar with "I.O.C.", 36mm, made by Robbins Company. Elbel W-1. One of only 20 badges. EF. (\$10,000)
- 14. Lake Placid 1932 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winners Medal.

 Bronze, 54mm with scalloped edge, by Julio Kilenyi, struck by
 Robbins Co. Winged goddess of victory in clouds holding laurel
 wreath over Lake Placid site with venues. Rev. Olympic rings over
 Games legend, crossed laurel branches below. EF. (\$15,000)
- 15. Lake Placid 1932 Winter. Participation Medal in its Presentation Box. Bronze, 48x60mm, by Julio Kilenyi. Winged figure of Fame blowing horn, Olympic rings above, winter landscape in background. Rev. Six winter sports depicted on shields around legend in six lines, scenes of curling and dogsledding below. EF. In very rare cardboard presentation box, tape stain on top. Toned EF. (\$7,000)
- Los Angeles 1932. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. Toned EF. (\$6,000)
- 17. **Los Angeles 1932. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by G. Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. Toned EF. **(\$5,000)**

18. Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Curling First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated silver, 5.7x8.7cm (2.2"x3.4"), made by Poellath. Large enamelled color logo in silver wreath attached on gold plaque, award legend in 6 lines engraved below. Curling was the National Demonstration Sport in Garmisch-Partenkirchen. EF. (\$3,000)

- Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Original Oil Painting of the Opening Ceremony. 120x160cm (47.2"x63"), in gilt wooden frame, by Ernst Vollbehr. The painting shows the Olympic Stadium on Opening Day, decorated with Olympic flags, the large official IOC flag on the judge's tower at left, and the flags of the participating nations; in front large red flags with swastikas. People are waiting to get into the stadium. In the foreground at right is the Eibsee-Zugspitze cog-wheel railway. In the background at right is the Eibsee-Zugspitze cog-wheel railway. In the background the impressive alpine mountain range with the Alpspitze, the official emblem of the 4th Winter Games, and the Zugspitze. Behind the stadium are the Riessersee Hills where speed skating and bobsled events took place. The painting is signed in the lower right "Ernst Vollbehr 36". Vollbehr was born on March 25, 1876, in Kiel, Germany. In 1909/10 he was a painter in the German colonies. In 1914 he was drafted as a war painter. During the war he met A. Hitler and became one of his admirers. Hitler personally commissioned him to paint the Garmisch-Partenkirchen Olympic Winter Games. EF. (\$4,000)
- 20. Berlin 1936. The Golden Chain of Office for the Members of the International Olympic Committee. Produced by the Sculptor Walter B. Lemke from the Originals in the Old Museum in Berlin. Cast bronze, approximately 80cm (31.5"). Six small plaques are linked by rings. Right side: Horseman with relay torch, silver coin from Taranto, 300 B.C.; Javelin thrower from bowl, 430 B.C. Discus thrower, silver coin from Cos, 500 B.C. Left side: Wrestlers, silver coin from Aspendos, 400 B.C.; Runner bearing arms, from bowl, 500 B.C.: and Youth with jumping weights, from bowl, 490 B.C. The two lower plaques are linked by enameled Olympic rings, from which is suspended a plaque with the famous head of Zeus stone sculpture. Reverse engraved "XI. OLYMPIADE BERLIN 1936" at top, leaving room for ten more future Olympiads. Official report p. 126/127; Olympic Games News Service No. 33. There were 68 IOC members plus IOC President Baillet-Latour at the time of the Berlin Games. The Chain was only worn at the Berlin Olympic Games. Many questions remain about what happened to these Chains that were stored in Berlin after the Games, for use again at the 1940 Helsinki Games which were cancelled due to the Soviet invasion and bombing of Helsinki in March 1940. Very rare. EF. (\$35,000)



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- 22. St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded to Patrick Guzzo, Canadian Ice Hockey Team Member. Goldplated silver, 60mm, by Huguenin Frères. Hand holding torch in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background. Rev. 4-line French legend between ice crystals. Originally Canada decided not to send a hockey team, but the Air Force ice hockey team members, the "Flyers", who had fought in World War II, went ahead to represent Canada and to become the ultimate heroes in winning gold for Canada. The next Canadian hockey gold medal followed only in Vancouver 2010. Cased top of case detached, medal EF. (\$17,000)
- 23. **St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Silver Winner's Medal.** Silver, 60mm, by Huguenin. Hand holding torch in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background. Rev. 4-line French legend between ice crystals. "Specimen" in tiny letters on back. EF. (\$6,000)
- 24. **St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case.** Bronze, 60mm struck by
 Huguenin Frères in Le Locle, Switzerland. Hand holding torch
 in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background.
 Rev. 4-line French legend between ice crystals. Housed in its
 presentation case. Toned EF. (\$7,500)
- 25. Oslo 1952 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 70mm, by V. Falireus/Knut Yren, struck by Th. Marthinsen C/S. Raised torch with Olympic rings within legend. Rev. Oslo City Hall outlines between snowflakes, 3-line legend below. Rarely seen winner's Medal. Light toning, EF. (\$20,000)
- 26. Cortina 1956 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated silver, 59mm, by C. Affer. Female head facing, crowned by Olympic rings, flame in lower r. Rev. Snowflake over Mount Pomagagnon. Beautiful! EF. (\$8,000)

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- 27. Cortina 1956 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 60mm, by Costantino Affer. Facing female head with flowing hair, Olympic rings on top. Rev. Ice crystal over Mount Pomagagnon. Dark brown and green original toning. (\$4,000)
- 28. **Stockholm 1956 Equestrian Olympic Games. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 49mm, by J. Sjösvärd/V. Falireus. Rider on horseback l., image after the frieze of the Parthenon. Rev. Torch and Olympic rings, the same design as the Oslo 1952 winner's medal. One of only 12 bronze winner's medals. Very rare. Toned EF. **(\$16,000)**

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- Melbourne 1956. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Bronze, 50mm, by Guiseppe Cassioli, struck by Luke Ltd., Melbourne. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Housed in its presentation plastic case in perfect condition very rare. Medal toned EF. (\$6,500)
- 30. Squaw Valley 1960 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winners Medal Awarded for Skiing. Bronze, 55mm, made by the Herff Jones Co. Joint heads left of male and female athletes. Rev. Large Olympic rings encircled by legend, name of winning event, "Ski" below. Toned EF. (\$8,000)
- 31. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey. Silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Innsbruck Alpine Mountain range, "Eishockey" below. Rev. Large Innsbruck logo encircled by "IX Olympic Winter Games" (translated). With loop and red-white-red ribbon in Austrian colors. Medal toned EF. (\$12,000)



- 32. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Slalom. Bronze, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Innsbruck mountain range, "Innsbruck 1964 Torlauf" legend. Rev. Large logo encircled by "IX Olympic Winter Games" (translated"). With ribbon in Austrian colors. Toned EF. (\$9,000)
- 33. **Tokyo 1964.** The Badge of the Imperial Family. Gold colored, 50x67mm. The Rising Sun of the national flag is surrounded on three sides by the five Olympic colors, Olympic rings dividing "TOKYO-1964". A blank gold bar represents the Imperial Family's badge. With long white moiree ribbon. Elbel S-2. Housed in its case. Badge EF. (\$90,000)
- 34. Tokyo 1964. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Football. Silver, 63mm, designed by Toshikaka Koshiba, struck at the Japanese Mint in Tokyo. Victory seated holding laurel wreath and palm branch, Rome stadium in background at right. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. Design on both sides in high relief. With bow at top and ribbon in Olympic colors. EF. (\$10,000)

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35. Grenoble 1968 Winter. Silver Winner's Medal for Artistic Skating. Silver, 60mm, by Roger Excoffon. Logo within French legend. Rev. Depiction of a skater, "Patinage Artistique" below. With ribbon in Olympic colors. Housed in black leather case, gold logo on top. The medal was presented to J.-P. Guhel, responsible for the Ice Events in Grenoble. Together with his Participation Diploma, a winner's diploma (no name), the National Order of Merit by the French President, and a photo of the Grenoble logo. Participation diploma, with brown spots, housed in green tube. All others EF. (1 medal, 3 Diplomas and photo). (\$10,000)

- 36. Mexico 1968. Athletics Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for 4x100m Track and Field to the Team from Kenya. Silver, 60mm, by Cassioli. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium in Rome. Rev. Victorious athlete carried by jubilant teammates. Silver plaque with Athletics pictogram (Rev. 3-line legend of sport) at top suspended from green ribbon. EF. (\$8,000)
- 37. **Mexico 1968. Basketball Silver Second Place Winner's Medal.** Silver, 60mm. Victory seated above Rome Colosseum Stadium. Rev. Winner being carried by jubilant teammates. With basketball logo attached at top. *The basketball team from Yugoslavia won silver.* Toned EF. **(\$5,500)**



- 38. Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ski Jump and Housed in its Case. Goldplated silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. "Skisprung" (Ski Jump) over Bergisel ski jump, Olympic flame at r. Rev. Official logo and legend. With ribbon in Austrian colors. Housed in red leather presentation case with gold-stamped logo on top. EF. (\$17,000)
- 39. Moscow 1980. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Judo. Silver, 60mm, by Ilya Postol. Victory seated above stadium, in high relief. Rev. Olympic flame over stadium, Moscow logo at top right. Edge inscribed with winning event. Looped. Toned EF. (\$6,000)

40. Sarajevo 1984 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal for 30km Men's Cross Country. Goldplated silver, 65x71mm. Stylized athlete's head r. with laurel wreath, 2-line award legend below. Rev. Sarajevo emblem within Croation legend. David Wallechinski: Soviet Skier Nikolai Zimyatov struggled through blizzard conditions to win his fourth Olympic gold medal. With long orange ribbon and card. Housed in blue leather case lined in blue velvet and silk. EF. (\$16,000)



43. Calgary 1988 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Alpine Skiing Men, Slalom, Won by Germany. Silver, 69mm, made by Jostens, Toronto. Joint Indian heads left, headdress consisting of winter sports equipment: skis, bobsled, luge, hockey stick etc. Rev. Calgary logo surrounded by Games legend in French and English. With long ribbon, housed in blue velvet presentation case, gray velvet inside. EF, lt. toning obv. (\$17,000)

44. **Seoul 1988. Handball Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded to the Korean Handball Team.** Silver, 60mm, by Korea Security Printing and Minting Corporation. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Dove of Peace flying left carrying laurel branch, Seoul logo above. Edge engraved "Handball Men". With loop at top. *The final against the gold medal winning Soviet team ended 32-25 on October 1.* EF. **(\$6,000)**



- 45. Albertville 1992 Winter. Silver Winner's Medal Housed in its Case and Box Awarded for Biathlon. Silver and Lalique crystal, 92mm, 9mm thick. The crystal shows large Olympic rings over Alpine mountains, set in a silver border which is engraved with logo and olive branch, Albertville 92 legend at bottom. No sport was engraved on the Albertville 1992 medals although an IOC direction asked for it. With silver ribbon, Olympic color stripes in center. The medals were entirely handmade by Lalique in 35 different processes. Buyer will receive the name of the winner. Housed in gray leatherette case lined in gray velvet, logo on top. The only winner's medal not made from metal. Toned Unc. (\$18,000)
- 46. Barcelona 1992. Bronze Third Place Paralympic Winner's Medal. Bronze 68mm, by Xavier Corberó. Logo. Rev. "Paralimpics/Barcelona '92" over Braille legend. The Games were the 9th Paralympic Games with 560 events in 15 sports. With ribbon in Olympic colors. Abt EF. (\$4,500)
- 47. Lillehammer 1994 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Figure Skating. Silver border and Norwegian granite sparagmite stone, 80mm (3.2"), by Ingierd Hanevold. Olympic rings and stylized ice crystal, frame attached to sparagmite stone. Rev. Figure skater besides ice crystals and logo, event engraved on stone inscribed "Figure Skating". EF. (\$16,000)
- 48. Atlanta 1996. Paralympic Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated, 82mm (3.2"). Paralympic Atlanta 1996 logo and legend. Rev. Braille legend over Paralympic logo. Looped, with blue ribbon. In green cardboard presentation box lined with green velvet. EF. (\$3,500)



49. **Sydney 2000. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Judo.** Silver, 68mm (2.7"). Female seated above Rome Stadium holding laurel wreath and palm branch. Rev. Cauldron and Sydney torch, Olympic rings above. Awarded for Women's Lightweight Judo, 57kg. With blue inscribed ribbon. EF. (\$9,500)



- 50. Beijing 2008. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Football. Silver, 70mm, with circle of inlaid green jade on reverse. Winged goddess of Victory above Panathenian Stadium in Athens. Rev. Logo in center surrounded by jade, event engraved at top and bottom. The Nigerian team won second place in soccer in Beijing. Ornate loop, with red and orange ribbon with "Beijing 2008" and Olympic rings. Housed in red lacquer box and large silver silk case. EF. (\$9.500)
- 51. Sochi 2014 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Bronze, 10cm (3.9") thick, made by Adamas Co. The medal includes four inset polycarbonate crystals showing the Sochi 2014 "Patchwork Quilt", a mosaic of national designs from the various cultures and ethnicities. The obverse is inscribed with the logo "Sochi. Ru 2014" and Olympic rings, the reverse shows large Olympic rings. The edge is inscribed "XXIII Olympic Winter Games" in Russian, French and English. Complete with blue ribbon, and housed in its large presentation case, and cardboard box. With maker's certificate of authenticity. Unc. (\$18,000)
- 52. **Rio de Janeiro 2016. Gold First Place Winner's Medal.**Goldplated silver, 8.5cm (3.3"), weight about 500 grams (17.6 ounces), obverse by Elena Votsi and Kostas Kazakos. Winged Nike, Goddess of Victory, over the Panathinaiko Stadium in Athens, the Acropolis in background. Rev. The Rio 2016 Olympic logo. With multicolor ribbon. Unc. **(\$19,000)**

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- 53. Tokyo 2020/2021. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Men's Freestyle Wrestling 97kg. Bronze, 85mm (3.5"), 8mm thick, designed by Junichi Kawanishi. Winged Nike, Goddess of Victory, over the Panathinaiko Stadium in Athens. Rev. The Tokyo 2020 logo. Edge inscribed with the event. "About 80 tons of mobile phones and small electronic devices were donated in Japan" to make the medals. EF. (\$20,000)
- 54. Tokyo 2020/21. Silver Medal Second Place Winner's Diploma Awarded to Dabin Lee, Korea, for Women's 67+kg Taekwondo. Color rings and logo, 42x29.5cm (16.5"x11.6"). Silver color design on right. Facsimile signatures of IOC President Bach and OC President Hashimoto. With envelope, EF. (\$350)

TORCHES OF THE OLYMPIC GAMES

55. **Berlin 1936 Official Torch.** Steel, 27cm high (10.5"), made by Krupp Factory, designed by Carl Diem. Route of torch run from Olympia to Berlin on shaft, legend on top. *Carried during the first Olympic torch relay from Olympia, Greece to Berlin, a distance of 3,300 km in 12 days.* EF. **(\$5,000)**

- London 1948 Official Torch. Aluminum alloy, 47cm (18.5").
 Cut-out Olympic rings over "XIVth Olympiad 1948. Olympia to London With Thanks to the Bearer" inscription. EF. (\$8,000)
- 57. **Melbourne 1956 Official Torch.** Aluminum alloy, 47cm (18.5"). Cut-out Olympic rings dividing legend "Melbourne XVI OLYMPIAD 1956". 110 torch runners carried the flame from Darwin to Melbourne after Qantas Airline brought the flame from Athens. Rare. Lt. wear on holder, torch EF. (\$30,000)
- 58. **Rome 1960 Official Torch.** Bronzed aluminum, 39.5cm (15.5"), designed by Professor Maiure and his team from the National Museum of Archeology in Naples. The design is based on drawings of torches on ancient Etruscan ceramics. Lightly toned EF. (\$7,000)
- 59. **Tokyo 1964 Official Torch.** The bowl is made of blackened aluminum alloy, 16.8cm (6.6") wide. The cylinder is clad with stainless steel, length 64.8cm (25.5"). Bowl is inscribed "XVII Olympiad Tokyo 1964" and Olympic rings. The bottom of the cylinder features the Tokyo official logo. Unused, EF. (\$12,000)





- 60. **Mexico City 1968 Official Black Torch.** Black painted aluminum, part of shaft made of wood, 52.8cm (20.9"). Silver colored doves around top. *The black torch was used in the torch relay from Olympia to Athens, Greece.* EF. **(\$1,600)**
- Mexico City 1968 Cast White Metal and Black Leatherette Torch. 44.5cm (17.5"). "Mexico" and logo around top. EF. (\$2,000)
- 62. Mexico City 1968 Silver Torch with Black Painted Wooden Handle. Aluminum, 57.5cm (22.6"). Dove logo around top. Rubbing on silver part, black paint partially missing. VF. (\$1,600)
- 63. Mexico City 1968 Silver Torch with Small Wood Handle. 52.5cm (20.7"). Dove logo around top, "Mexico" around bottom. EF. (\$2,000)

- 69. **Moscow 1980 Official Torch.** Aluminum alloy, gray and gold, Moscow logo and legend in red, 56cm (22.5"), designed by Boris Tuchin. Runners carried the torch during the 30-day torch relay from Olympia, Greece through Bulgaria and Romania to Moscow, a distance of 4976 km. EF. (\$2,000)

- 87. **Beijing 2008 Official Torch.** Red and anodized aluminum, 72cm (18.4"). Curved form in the shape of a paper scroll, with lucky clouds graphic expressing harmony. *The torch relay started in Olympia, Greece, on March 24, traveled to over 100 cities on five continents and all of China, a distance of 137,000km.* Upper part EF, lower red part VF. (\$2,600)
- 88. Vancouver 2010 Winter Olympic Flame Safety Lamp It Kept the Flame Safely Overnight During the Torch Relay. Brass, silver colored metal and glass, 22.5cm (8.9") high. Large Vancouver logo on front with hook at top. EF. (\$4,000)
- 89. Vancouver 2010 Winter Official Torch. Stainless steel, aluminum and sheet molding compound, 94.5cm (37.1"), made by Bombardier. The lines of the torch reflect the lines made by snow and ice winter sports. It shows the engraved motto "With Glowing Hearts / Des plus brilliants exploits" and the logo. The torch relay ended after its 45000km journey through Canada with the lighting of the Olympic flame cauldron at the opening ceremony on February 12, 2010. There were athletes who didn't know that the events they participated in were Olympic Games events. Few items relate directly to the Games. For this reason, we are also offering some memorabilia from the World's Fair which celebrated the Centennial of the Louisiana Purchase from Napoleon in 1803.

Bronze Third Place Winner's Diploma Awarded to Johan Grøttumsbråten, Norway, for Nordic Skiing 50 Kilometers. Brown and green design, 74x54cm (29.1"x21.3"), designed by Plumereau, printed by Imprimerie Debar, Reims-Paris. Skier overlooking skating rink in Chamonix, Alps in background, panel with award legend at right: "Awarded to M.J. Grøttumsbråten/3rd Prize Ski Grand Fond 50km" (translated from French). Signed by French Olympic Committee President Clary and IOC President Pierre de Coubertin. Green border of pine cones. M.J. Grøttumsbråten was one of the most successful Olympic skiers. He also won 3rd place in Nordic Combined, and 2nd place in 15 Kilometers (Classical).
