2. Athens 1896. Cased First Place Silver Winner's Medal Awarded in the First Olympic Games of the Modern Times. Silver, 50 mm , by Jules Clement Chaplain, "Argent" on edge, struck by the Paris Mint. Laureated head facing of Zeus holding winged statue of Nike, Goddess of Victory, in his right hand, "OLYMPIA" written on the left. Rev. View of the Acropolis with the Parthenon on top, between Greek legend "International Olympic Games in Athens, 1896". Housed in its round leather case lined in velvet. First place winners received a silver medal, and second place winners a bronze medal. No gold medals were awarded in the first Olympic Games. A very rare, beautiful and historically important medal. Toned EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 8 0 , 0 0 0 )}$
3. St. Louis 1904. Association Football (Soccer) Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Leather Presentation Case. Silver, 30 mm , scalloped edge, by Mermod \& Jaccard, St. Louis. Raised soccer ball in center surrounded by "ASSOCIATION FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP" and 2 fleur-de-lis. Suspended from mural crown bar, $37 \times 11 \mathrm{~mm}$, inscribed "1904/UNIVERSAL


EXPOSITION/OLYMPIC GAMES/ST. LOUIS" Soccer finals were held on November 23; Canada's Galt Football Club defeated the American Christian Brothers College 3-2. Leather case light wear. Medal toned EF. Extremely rare soccer winner's medal. $\mathbf{( \$ 1 5 , 0 0 0 )}$
4. Athens 1906. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Box. Goldplated silver, 50 mm , by Jules Clement Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch standing on globe, "OLYMPIA" written on the left. Rev. View of Acropolis with Parthenon between Olympic legend. Same design as the 1896 winners medal, only the date changed. While in 1896 only a silver and bronze medal were awarded for the first two places, in 1906 the Committee awarded gold, silver and bronze medals. Housed in red cardboard case, VF. Medal EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 9}, \mathbf{0 0 0})$
5. Athens 1906. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 50 mm , by Jules Clement Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of the Acropolis with Parthenon between Olympic legend. The Greek Committee decided to use the 1896 medal design again only with the date changed to 1906. Lightly toned EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 7 , 0 0 0 )}$

6. Athens 1906. Bronze Third Place Winners Medal Housed in its Case. Bronze, 50 mm , by Jules Clement Chaplain, struck at the Paris Mint. Laureated head of Zeus facing, holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch standing on the globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend: "International Olympic Games in Athens, 1906" (translated). Red case VF+, medal toned EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 6 , 0 0 0 )}$
7. London 1908. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Association Football (Soccer). Gold, hallmarked "15 (Karat) 625", Birmingham, 34 mm , 28 grams, by Bertram McKennal, struck by Vaughton \& Sons, Birmingham. Two females crowning victorious athlete, "Olympic Games - London 1908" below. Rev. Female with palm branch leading horse with St. George, slaying the dragon. "WINNER ASSOCIATION FOOTBALL" engraved on edge. The British team won first place in the finals against Denmark (2:0) on October 24, 1908. The medals were presented on the same day in the stadium by J. Bell, Lord Mayor of London. Housed in red leather case with goldstamped legend, lt. scuffing, a few sm. stains, inside lined with red velvet and silk. Medal EF. Very rare in gold. (\$20,000)
8. Stockholm 1912. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Track and Field, Housed in its Leather Case. Goldplated silver, 33 mm , by E. Lindberg and B. MacKennal. Medieval herald announcing the Games, statue of Ling, the Father of Swedish Gymnastics, in back. Rev. Nude winner being crowned by two seated females. Housed in brown leather presentation case, logo and award legend in gold on top. EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 9 , 5 0 0 )}$
9. Stockholm 1912. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 33 mm , by Erik Lindberg and Bertram MacKennal, struck by Sporrong \& Co. Herald proclaiming Olympic Games, bust of Ling, father of Swedish Gymnastics, on pedestal at r. Rev. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Lt. rubbing on high points, EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 6 , 5 0 0})$
10. Antwerp 1920. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded to Pua Kela Keoloha of the U.S. Team in the $\mathbf{4 x 2 0 0}$ Meter Freestyle Swimming Relay. Goldplated silver, 60 mm , by Joshua Dupon. Nude victorious athlete with palm branch and laurel wreath, fame blowing horn, "VII OLYMPIADE" below. Rev. Brabo fountain with Antwerp shield, in background the Cathedral of Our Lady and ships in the port at left. The edge inscribed: "Pua Kealoha, 2nd Position, 800 Meter Relay, American Team, Antwerp Aug. 29-1920". Antwerp was his only Olympic participation. Duke Paoa Kahanamoku placed team second in Stockholm 1912 and team first in Antwerp 1920. Paris 1924 and Amsterdam 1928 saw Johnny Weissmuller in team gold. Housed in its red leather presentation case made by Antwerp jeweler Hooseman, top inscribed "Ier Prix/VIIe Olympiade/Anvers 1920", VF. Medal toned EF. (\$12,000)

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11. Antwerp 1920. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 60 mm , by Josue Dupon. Victorious athlete holding palm branch and laurel wreath, Fame behind on left blowing horn. "VII Olympiade" legend. Rev. View of Port, Brabo fountain with Antwerp city shield, City of Antwerp in background. Toned EF. $(\$ 5,500)$
12. Chamonix 1924 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 55 mm , by Raoul Benard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. A rare winner's medal from the First Olympic Winter Games. The participation medal had the same design. Toned EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 1 2 , 0 0 0 )}$
13. Paris 1924. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 55 mm , by A. Rivaud. Winner helping fallen athlete back on his feet. Rev. Legend surrounded by sports equipment for summer and winter Games plus a harp for the Arts Competition. Toned EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 7 , 0 0 0 )}$
14. Paris 1924. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 55 mm , by A. Rivaud. Winner helping fallen athlete back on his feet symbolizing sportsmanship. Rev. Various sport equipment, legend on panel below. Rev. Legend surrounded by sports equipment for summer and winter Games plus a harp for the Arts Competition. Lightly toned EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 5 , 5 0 0 )}$
15. Amsterdam 1928. Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated silver, 55 mm , by Giuseppe Cassioli, made by the Dutch State Mint in Utrecht. Seated Victory holding laurel wreath and palm branch, Colosseum Stadium in Rome at right. Rev. Winner with palm branch being carried on shoulders of his jubilant teammates. Only 110 gold medals were awarded in Amsterdam plus 9 gold medals for the Art Competition. Housed in its round red VF cardboard box inscribed on top in gold "IXe Olympiade/Amsterdam/1928". Medal toned EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 9}, 500)$
16. Lake Placid $\mathbf{1 9 3 2}$ Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 54 mm with scalloped edge, by Julio Kilenyi, struck by Robbins Co. Winged goddess of victory in clouds holding laurel wreath over Lake Placid site with venues. Rev. Olympic rings over Games legend, crossed laurel branches below. EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 1 5 , 0 0 0 )}$

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 to left, bobsled, ski, hockey stick and skate below. Rev. Large Olympic rings surrounded by "IV Olympic Winter Games 1936" (translated from German). A few darker spots, otherwise EF. Very rare. $\mathbf{( \$ 1 6 , 0 0 0 )}$
20. Berlin 1936. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Silver, 55 mm , by Giuseppe Cassioli, struck by B.H. Mayer, Pforzheim. Victory seated above stadium, Colosseum at right. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Housed in its presentation case (Fine), medal toned EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 7 , 5 0 0 )}$

21. St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Gold Winner's Medal Awarded to Dr. F. Kraatz of the Organizing Committee. Goldplated silver, 60 mm , by Huguenin. Hand holding torch in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background, Olympic motto "Citius Altius Fortius" around top. Rev. 4-line French legend between ice crystals. Friedrich Kraatz competed in the 1928 St. Moritz Olympics in Ice Hockey where the Swiss team won a bronze medal. He was President of the LIHG 1947-1948, and President of the International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) from 1951 to 1954. EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 7 , 0 0 0 )}$

22. St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 60 mm , by Huguenin. Hand holding torch in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background, Olympic motto, "Citius Altius Fortius" around top. Rev. Four-line French legend "Vmes Jeux Olympiques d" Hiver St. Moritz 1948" between ice crystals. The St. Moritz Games were the first Olympic Games held after the end of World War II, awarded only in September 1946. 26 nations and 878 athletes participated, and the Soviet Union sent a delegation of 10 to watch the games - they participated for the first time in Oslo 1952. Medal is toned EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 6 , 0 0 0 )}$
23. London 1948. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 50 mm , by Giuseppe Cassioli. Seated Victory holding laurel wreath and palm branch, view of the Rome Colosseum at right. Rev. Winner holding palm branch carried by his jubilant teammates. Housed in its red-brown presentation case lined in red velvet and silk, made by John Pinches Ltd., London. Wear on case, Medal EF. Seldom seen London gold medal. $\mathbf{( \$ 1 0 , 0 0 0 )}$
24. Oslo $\mathbf{1 9 5 2}$ Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Bronze, 70 mm , by V. Falireus/Knut Yren, struck by Th. Marthinsen C/S. Raised torch with Olympic rings within legend. Rev. Oslo City Hall outlines between snowflakes, 3-line legend below. Housed in its brown velvet case, inside lined in velvet and silk. One of only 47 awarded bronze winners medals. Case VF+, medal toned EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 8 , 0 0 0})$
25. Stockholm 1956 Equestrian Olympic Games. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 50 mm , by V. Falireus/John Sjösvård, made by Lagerströms Fabriks AB, Mjöllby. Ancient Greek rider on horseback left, designed after the frieze of the Parthenon in Athens. Rev. Flaming torch in Olympic rings, "OLYMPIA" in background, surrounded by "Jeux Olympiques/Citius Altius Fortius". Due to a 6 month quarantine for horses coming into Australia, a new venue had to be found - Stockholm. Only 3 events were held during the Equestrian Games, single and team - this is one of only 12 gold medals, the rarest of all winners medals. Housed in its Olympic blue leather case lined in white silk with logo, and blue velvet, VF-EF, medal toned EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 2 4 , 0 0 0})$

26. Rome 1960. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Wrestling. Goldplated silver, within bronze olive wreath, 68 mm , by Giuseppe Cassioli, made by Artistice Fiorentini of Florence. Seated Victory holding laurel wreath and palm branch, Rome Colosseum on right, inscribed "Giochi Della/XVII Olimpiade / Roma MCMLX". Rev. Victorious athlete carried by his jubilant teammates, "LOTTA" (Wrestling) on wreath below. With chain of bronze olive leaves to be worn by winners. Very light wear on high points, VF-EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 1 1 , 0 0 0 )}$
27. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Speedskating to Lidija Skoblikova from the Soviet Union. Goldplated sterling silver, $70 \mathrm{~mm}, 166.5$ grams, by Martha Coufal, and struck by the Austrian Mint in Vienna. Mountain range between "Innsbruck 1964" and the speedskating sport "Eisschnellauf". Rev. Large logo encircled by "IX Olympic Winter Games" (translated). Lidija Skoblikova was the first woman in Olympic history to win 4 gold medals in one game: 500M, 1000M, 1500M, and 3000M. In Squaw Valley 1960 she won 1500M. EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 1 0 , 0 0 0 )}$
28. Tokyo 1964. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Fencing. Goldplated silver, 63 mm , by Toshikaka Koshiba after Giuseppe Cassioli, struck at the Japanese Mint in Tokyo. Seated Victory holding laurel wreath and palm branch, Colosseum on right, inscribed "XVIII Olympiad Tokyo 1964 Fencing". Rev. Victorious athlete carried by his jubilant teammates. Housed in its black lacquer box with Tokyo 1964 logo and one gold dot, inside lined in blue velvet and white silk with Japanese legend. Closure partially missing. Box and medal EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 1 1 , 0 0 0 )}$

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29. Tokyo 1964. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Canoeing. Goldplated silver, $63 \mathrm{~mm}, 5 \mathrm{~mm}$ thick, designed by Toshikaka Koshiba after Giuseppe Cassioli (1928). Seated Victory holding palm branch and laurel wreath, Rome's Colosseum stadium at right, award text at top right. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. With ribbon bow and long ribbon displaying the five Olympic colors. Gold medals in Canoeing were only won by Sweden (2), the Soviet Union (2) and East Germany. EF. (\$24,000)

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30. Grenoble 1968 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey to the Soviet Union, Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 60 mm , by Roger Excoffon, struck by the Paris Mint. Logo in center surrounded by "Tenth Olympic Winter Games / Grenoble 1968" (translated from French), five stars around "Grenoble 1968". Rev. Depiction of Ice Hockey, "Hockey Sur Glace" below. For the first time, winner's medals show the sport on the reverse. With ribbon in Olympic colors. Housed in its black case with large gold logo on top, lined in white velvet and silk. Rubbing on top, inside EF. Medal EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 1 5 , 0 0 0 )}$

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31. Mexico City 1968. Silver Volleyball Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded to the Team of Japan. Silver, 60 mm , by Giuseppe Cassioli. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium in Rome. Rev. Victorious athlete carried by jubilant teammates. Silver plaque with Volleyball pictogram at top, suspended from red ribbon, VF. Medal toned EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 8 , 0 0 0})$

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32. Munich 1972. Gold First Place Winner's Medal for Four-Oared Shell with Coxswain, Awarded to Uwe Benter from Germany on September 2, 1972. Goldplated silver, 66 mm , by Gerhard Marcks, struck at the Bavarian Mint in Munich. Seated Victory holding laurel and palm branch, Colosseum Stadium in Rome at right. Rev. Castor and Pollux, the patrons of competitive sport and friendship, Gerhard Marcks monogram below. The edge is engraved at top on both sides with "Rudern Vierer mit Steuermann" in German, and name of winner Uwe Benter. Housed in its white case lined in white felt, Munich logo on top. One of only 364 gold medals with a new design on the back, namely the mythological twins Castor and Pollux. Complete with gold chain. Medal toned EF. Seldom seen gold medal. ( $\mathbf{\$ 1 0 , 0 0 0}$ )

33. Innsbruck 1976 Winter. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Speed Skating to Yougeny Kulikov from the Soviet Union. Goldplated silver, 70 mm , by Martha Coufal. "Eisschnellauf" (Speed Skating) over Bergisel ski jump, Olympic flame at r. Rev. Official logo and legend, with ribbon in Austrian colors. Housed in red leather presentation case with gold-stamped, logo on top. EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 1 2 , 0 0 0 )}$
34. Lake Placid 1980 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winners Medal for Speedskating, 1.500m Women on February 14 Awarded to Sabine Becker from East Germany. Bronze, 80 mm (3.2"), made by Tiffany \& Co., designed by Medallic Art. Hand holding flaming torch, Whiteface Mountain in background. Rev. Logo over legend, large conifer branch at right, "Speedskating/1.500m Women" and name engraved at left. EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 9 , 0 0 0})$
35. Los Angeles 1984. Gold First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Gymnastics Women's Team, Combined Exercises, from Romania. Goldplated silver, 60 mm , by Dugald Stermer. Seated Victory holding laurel and palm branch, Colosseum Stadium in Rome at right. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Edge inscribed with event. The team from Romania won gold, the American team with Mary Lou Retton won silver. Mary Lou had won gold already in All Around. With ribbon. Medal toned around edge, EF. (\$10,000)

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39. Barcelona 1992. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, $75 \mathrm{~mm}, 236$ grams, by Xavier Gorbero. Victory seated, on superimposed 56 mm medal. Rev. Barcelona logo of jumping athlete over Olympic rings. With 5-color striped ribbon. EF. $\mathbf{( \$ 6 , 5 0 0 )}$
 $(\$ 12,000)$ $(\$ 7,000)$ Germany's Faissal Ebnoutalib on September 29. Goldplated silver, 70 mm , by Wojciech Pietranik and Brian Thompson, struck by the Royal Australian Mint. Victory seated holding laurel wreath and palm branch, Colosseum at right, inscribed "XXVII Olympiad Sydney 2000". Rev. Olympic rings above Sydney's Opera House

43. Beijing 2008. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Baseball to the Team from Cuba. Silver, 70 mm , with circle of inlaid jade on reverse, by the Medal Design Group of the China Central Academy of Fine Arts, Elena Votsi. Winged figure of Victory holding palm branch and cloak, above Athens Panathinaikos Olympic Stadium, Acropolis in background, "XXIX Olympiad Beijing 2008". Rev. Beijing 2008 logo in center surrounded by ring of jade, "Baseball" on outer circle. The team from Cuba won second place with Korea winning first. Baseball was voted out of the 2012 Olympic Games in 2005, the first sport since 1936 when Polo was voted out. Polo returned with the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. With red and orange ribbon. Housed in its original red lacquered case with gold "Beijing 2008" logo on top, and then in another outer case. Cases and medal EF. $(\mathbf{\$ 1 0 , 0 0 0 )}$
44. London 2012. Cased Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Men's Artistic Gymnastics, Vault to Denis Ablyazin from Russia. Silver, $85 \mathrm{~mm}, 429$ grams (over 14 oz ), by Elena Votsi and Kostas Kazakos (obverse) and David Watkins (rev.). Winged Nike, Panathinaikos Stadium in Athens behind. Rev. Large London 2012 logo above abstract linear background. Engraved along the bottom edge "Artistic Gymnastics, Men's Vault". "London 2012" and Olympic rings on attached purple ribbon. Denis Ablyazin also won a Team bronze medal in London on Floor, besides his silver medal on vault. In 2016 Rio he again won silver in vault, and bronze in rings, besides silver in team. At the 2020/21 Tokyo Games he won team gold, again silver in vault. Housed in its black winner's case which is in Fine condition on the outside, as most cases are. Rarely seen Winner's Medal has very light wear on highpoints, abt. EF. ( $\mathbf{\$ 3 0 , 0 0 0 )}$

## BEIJING, 24th OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES, 2022

Because of the Corona virus the relay was held only for 3 days with about 1,200 torch runners, in and around Beijing and in Zhangjiakou, Hebei Province. A beautiful torch.
