

We also accept bids by email, phone, mail and fax (by fax: please follow up by phone or email to confirm that bids were received). All bids by email will be acknowledged. E-mail bids which have not been acknowledged have not been received. Phone bids must be confirmed in writing upon request. The estimates listed in the catalog are starting prices. Bids will be increased per the increment table on our auction platform. If you enter a maximum bid (your highest), the bidding will be incremented as needed to win the lot, up to your maximum bid. Bids must be for an entire lot. Auctioneer reserves the right to extend bidding.

Bids under estimate will not be accepted. Bids must be for an entire lot. Bids will be accepted by lot number only. Each lot constitutes a separate sale.

## Highlights of the Auction



- 1. Athens 1896. Cased First Place Silver Winner's Medal Awarded in the First Olympic Games of the Modern Times. Silver, 50mm, by Jules Clement Chaplain, "Argent" on edge, struck by the Paris Mint. Laureated head facing of Zeus holding winged statue of Nike, Goddess of Victory, in his right hand, "OLYMPIA" written on the left. Rev. View of the Acropolis with the Parthenon on top, between Greek legend "International Olympic Games in Athens, 1896". Housed in its round leather case lined in velvet. First place winners received a silver medal, and second place winners a bronze medal. No gold medals were awarded in the first Olympic Games. A very rare, beautiful and historically important medal. Toned EF. (\$75,000)
- 3. Athens 1906. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 50mm, by Jules Clement Chaplain, struck at the Paris Mint. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch standing on globe. Rev. View of the Acropolis with the Parthenon on top, between Greek legend "International Olympic Games in Athens, 1896". Same design as the 1896 winners medal, only the date changed. While in 1896 only a silver and bronze medal were awarded for the first two places, in 1906 the Committee awarded gold, silver and bronze medals. Lightly toned EF. (\$6,000)
- 4. London 1908. First Place Winner's Medal Awarded for the 8 Metre Yacht Race Won by Great Britain, and Housed in its Presentation Case. Silver (only silver was presented for first place team members), 33mm, by Bertram Mackennal. Two seated females crowning victorious athlete. Rev. St. George slaying the dragon, representing Great Britain, Victory at left holding palm branch. Edge inscribed "Winner 8 Metre Yacht Race". Housed in red leather case inscribed in gold on top in 4 lines, EF, medal toned EF. (\$7,500)

- 5. Stockholm 1912. Silver Second Place Winners Medal Housed in its Red Presentation Case. Silver, 33mm, by Erik Lindberg and Bertram MacKennal, struck by Sporrong & Co. Herald proclaiming Olympic Games, bust of Ling on pedestal at r. Rev. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Housed in its red leather presentation case, gold design of official badge on top, lined in red velvet and silk. Lt. wear on right of box top. Medal abt. EF/ EF. (\$6,000)
- 6. Stockholm 1912. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Bronze, 33mm, by Erik Lindberg and Bertram MacKennal, struck by Sporrong & Co. Herald proclaiming Olympic Games, bust of Ling on pedestal at r. Rev. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Housed in green leatherette case with gold inscription. Case and medal EF. (\$5,000)
- 7. **Antwerp 1920. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal.** Silver, 60mm by Josue Dupon. Victorious athlete holding palm branch and laurel wreath, Fame behind on left blowing horn, "VII Olympiade" legend. Rev. Brabo fountain with Antwerp city shield and view of port, City of Antwerp in background. Small loop on top, toned EF. **(\$5,500)**
- 8. Chamonix 1924 Winter. Third Place Winner's Bronze Medal Housed in its Original Case. Bronze, 55mm, by Raoul Benard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. An extremely rare winner's medal from the First Olympic Winter Games. Toned EF. (\$8,000)
- Paris 1924. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 55mm, by André Rivaud. Winner helping fallen athlete back on his feet. Rev. Legend surrounded by sports equipment for summer and winter Games plus a harp for the Arts Competition. Toned EF. (\$6,000)



- 10. Garmisch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Curling First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated silver, 5.7x8.7cm (2.2"x3.4"), made by Poellath. Large enamelled color logo showing Kreuzeck mountain with Olympic rings surrounded by silver wreath attached on large gold plaque, award legend in 6 lines engraved below. Very rare gold award. EF. (\$3,500)
- 11. **Berlin 1936. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by Giuseppe Cassioli. Victory seated above Rome Colosseum stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Toned unevenly, o.w. EF. (\$5,000)
- 12. Berlin 1936. The Golden Chain of Office for the Members of the International Olympic Committee. Produced by the Sculptor Walter B. Lemke from the Originals in the Old Museum in Berlin. Cast bronze, approximately 80cm (31.5"). Six small plaques are linked by rings. Right side: Horseman with

relay torch, silver coin from Taranto, 300 B.C.; Javelin thrower copied from bowl, 430 B.C.; Discus thrower, silver coin from Cos, 500 B.C. Left side: Wrestlers, silver coin from Aspendos, 400 B.C.; Runner bearing arms, from bowl, 500 B.C.: and Youth with jumping weights, from bowl, 490 B.C. The two lower plaques are linked by enameled Olympic rings, from which is suspended a plaque with the famous head of Zeus stone sculpture. Reverse engraved "XI. OLYMPIADE BERLIN 1936" at top, leaving room for ten more future Olympiads. Official report p. 126/127; Olympic Games News Service No. 33. There were 68 IOC members plus IOC President Baillet-Latour at the time of the Berlin Games. The Chain was only worn at the Berlin Olympic Games. Many questions remain about what happened to these Chains that were stored in Berlin after the Games, for use again at the 1940 Helsinki Games. They disappeared in 1945. EF. (\$24,000)



- Cortina d'Ampezzo Winter 1956. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 60mm, by Costantino Affer. Facing female head with flowing hair, Olympic rings above. Rev. Ice crystal over Mount Pomagagnon. Dark brown and green original toning. (\$4,000)
- 14. **Stockholm 1956 Equestrian Olympic Games. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 49mm, by J. Sjösvärd/V. Falireus. Rider on horseback l., image made after the frieze of the Parthenon. Rev. Torch and Olympic rings, the same design as the Oslo 1952 winner's medal. One of only 12 bronze winner's medals. Very rare. Toned EF. **(\$15,000)**
- 15. **Melbourne 1956. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case.** Bronze, 50mm, by Guiseppe Cassioli, struck by Luke Ltd., Melbourne. Victory seated above Colosseum Stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Housed in its presentation plastic case in perfect condition very rare. Medal toned EF. **(\$6,000)**
- 16. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Ice Hockey. Silver, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Innsbruck Alpine Mountain range, "Eishockey" below. Rev. Large Innsbruck logo encircled by "IX Olympic Winter Games" (translated). With loop and red-white-red ribbon in Austrian colors. Medal toned EF. (\$11,000)




- 17. Innsbruck 1964 Winter. Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Slalom. Bronze, 70mm, by M. Coufal. Innsbruck mountain range, "Innsbruck 1964 Torlauf" legend. Rev. Large logo encircled by "IX Olympic Winter Games" (translated"). With ribbon in Austrian colors. Toned EF. (\$9,000)
- 18. **Munich 1972. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 66mm, by G. Marcks. Victory seated above Colosseum stadium. Rev. Castor and Pollux, patrons of competitive sport and friendship. Small hole in top edge, for the chain. First time since 1928 that the Organizing Committee could design the reverse. EF. (\$2,600)
- 19. Montreal 1976. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Silver, 60mm, obverse by Giuseppe Cassioli, struck by the Royal Canadian Mint in Ottawa. Seated Victory holding palm branch and laurel wreath, Rome's Colosseum Stadium at right, 4-line Montreal text at upper right. Rev. Small

- Montreal logo at top of open laurel wreath. With silver chain, housed in its wooden case and black leather cover with silver Montreal logo. EF. (\$26,000)
- 20. Moscow 1980. Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Judo. Silver, 60mm, by Ilya Postol. Victory seated above stadium, in high relief, Rome Colosseum stadium in background. Rev. Cauldron with Olympic flame over stadium, Moscow Games emblem at upper right. Edge engraved in Cyrillic with winning event. Original loop at top, toned EF. (\$6,000)
- 21. Calgary 1988. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 69mm, made by Jostens, Toronto. Joint Indian heads left, headdress consisting of winter sports equipment: skis, bobsled, luge, hockey stick etc. Rev. Calgary logo surrounded by Games legend in French and English. With long ribbon, housed in blue velvet presentation case, gray velvet inside. EF. (\$12,000)



- 22. **Seoul 1988. Handball Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded to the Korean Team.** Silver, 60mm, by Korea Security Printing and Minting Corporation. Victory seated above stadium holding palm branch and winner's wreath, "XXIV Olympiad Seoul 1988" on right. Rev. Dove of Peace flying left carrying laurel branch, Seoul logo above. Edge engraved "Handball Men". *The final against the gold medal winning Soviet team ended 32-25 on October 1.* With loop at top. EF. **(\$6,500)**
- 23. Albertville 1992 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Biathlon. Silver and Lalique crystal, 92mm, 9mm thick. The crystal shows large Olympic rings over Alpine mountains, set in a silver border which is engraved with logo and olive branch, Albertville 92 legend at bottom. No sport was
- engraved on the Albertville 1992 medals although an IOC direction asked for it. With silver ribbon, Olympic color stripes in center. *The medals were entirely handmade by Lalique in 35 different processes. Buyer will receive the name of the winner.* Housed in gray leatherette case lined in gray velvet, logo on top, a few spots on box. Medal Unc. **(\$18,000)**
- 24. Lillehammer 1994 Winter. Double Men's Luge Bronze Winners Medal Awarded to Germany. Bronze and Norwegian granite sparagmite stone, 80mm (3.2"), by Ingierd Hanevold. Olympic rings and stylized ice crystal frame attached to sparagmite stone. Rev. Luge besides ice crystals and logo, event engraved on stone, winning "Luge Double Men" inscribed. EF. (\$9,000)



- 25. Sochi 2014 Winter. Gold Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Goldplated silver, 10cm (3.9") thick, made by Adamas Co. The medal includes four inset polycarbonate crystals showing the Sochi 2014 "Patchwork Quilt", a mosaic of national designs from the various cultures and ethnicities. The obverse is inscribed with the logo "Sochi. Ru 2014" and Olympic rings, the reverse shows large Olympic rings. The edge is inscribed "XXIII Olympic Winter Games" in Russian, French and English. Complete with blue ribbon, and housed in its large presentation case, and cardboard box. With maker's certificate of authenticity. Inside of case VF. Medal EF. (\$26,000)

Winged Nike, Goddess of Victory, over the Panathinaikos Stadium in Athens, the Acropolis in background. Rev. The Rio 2016 Olympic logo. With green and multicolor ribbon. Unawarded. VF-EF. (\$20,000)

29. Tokyo 2020. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal and Pin Awarded for Judo, Housed in its Dark Blue Presentation Case. 85mm (3.4"), 8mm thick, weight 550 grams, designed by Junichi Kawanishi. Winged Nike, Goddess of Victory, over the Panathinaikos Stadium in Athens, Acropolis in background on left. Rev. The Tokyo 2020 emblem set against a polished stone background, surrounded by curved linen. "Judo" event engraved on edge. Pin 12mm. With multicolor ribbon inscribed "Tokyo 2020". Housed in its round wooden presentation case with magnetic lid. Case light wear, medal and pin EF. (\$30,000)

## Torches of the Summer Olympic Games



30. Paris 2024. Bronze Winner's Medal and Pin Housed in its Luxurious Blue Leatherette Case. Bronze, 85mm (3.4"), designed by Chaumet and struck at the Paris Mint. Sunburst design, six-sided medal attached on center of obverse, from 18 grams of material from the Eifel Tower saved during renovation work over the years. Rev. Winged Nike, Goddess of Victory, over the Panathinaikos Stadium in Athens, Acropolis and Eiffel Tower in background. Winner's Pin attached below. Housed in its 3-part blue leatherette case. EF. (\$30,000)

#### TORCHES OF THE SUMMER OLYMPIC GAMES

- 31. **Berlin 1936. Official Torch.** Steel, 27cm high (10.5"), made by Krupp Factory, designed by Carl Diem. Route of torch run from Olympia to Berlin on shaft, legend on top. *Carried during the first Olympic torch relay from Olympia, Greece to Berlin, a distance of 3,307 km in 12 days.* EF. **(\$4,500)**
- 32. **London 1948. Official Torch.** Aluminum alloy, 47cm (18.5"). Cut-out Olympic rings over "XIVth Olympiad 1948. Olympia to London With Thanks to the Bearer" inscription. Light yellowish toning, EF. **(\$6,000)**

- 33. **Melbourne 1956. Official Torch.** Aluminum alloy, 47cm (18.5"). Cut-out Olympic rings dividing legend "Melbourne XVI OLYMPIAD 1956". 110 torch runners carried the flame from Darwin to Melbourne after Qantas Airline brought the flame from Athens. Scarce. EF. (\$20,000)
- Rome 1960, Official Torch. Bronzed aluminum, 39.5cm (15.5"), designed by Professor Maiure and his team from the National Museum of Archeology in Naples. The design is based on drawings of torches on ancient Etruscan ceramics. Toned EF. (\$5,000)
- 35. **Tokyo 1964. Official Torch.** The bowl is made of blackened aluminum alloy, 16.8cm (6.6") wide. The cylinder is clad with stainless steel, length 64.8cm (25.5"). Bowl is inscribed "XVII Olympiad Tokyo 1964" and Olympic rings. The bottom of the cylinder features the Tokyo official logo. Light wear on bowl, the cylinder has several bumps. VF. (\$6,500)
- 36. **Mexico City 1968. Official Black Torch.** Black painted aluminum, part of shaft made of wood, 52.8cm (20.9"). Silver colored doves around top. *The black torch was used in the torch relay from Olympia to Athens, Greece.* Light scratches on black part, VF+. (\$1,400)



- 37. **Official Silver Torch of the Mexico 1968 Olympic Games.** Silver color, part of shaft made of wood, 53cm (21") high. Circle of doves around top. *Used in the torch relay in Mexico.* EF. (\$1,800)
- 38. **Munich 1972. Official Torch.** Steel, 73cm (28.8"), made by Krupp. The fire was lit in Olympia, Greece on July 28 and carried 5,532km in 29 days to Munich by 5976 runners. EF. (\$1,800)
- 39. Official Torch of the Montreal 1976 Olympic Games. Aluminum, 66cm (30") tall, designed by George Huel and Michael Dall. Red, with Montreal logo, top painted black. The flame was carried from Olympia, Greece to Athens from where it was transferred by satellite to Ottawa; 245 runners carried it to Montreal. The red part has scratches at the bottom. VF-EF. (\$2,000)

- Seoul 1988. Official Torch. Brass, 50cm (20"), with tan leather handle, designed by Lee Woo-Sing. Bowl depicts dragons, Seoul Olympic logo enameled in color below. Toned EF. (\$3,000)
- 43. **Barcelona 1992. Official Torch.** Chrome-plated aluminum, 65cm (23.6"), designed by André Rich. "XXV Olympiad Barcelona 1992" legend and goldplated Barcelona emblem. Leather part at bottom Fine, as usual, otherwise EF. (\$2,400)
- 44. 1996 Centennial Torch of the First Olympic Games. Silvered aluminum and wood, 55cm (21.7"). Names of all 23 Olympic cities from 1896 to 1996 inscribed on torch. The Hellenic Olympic Committee celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the 1896 Olympic Games in the Panathenean Stadium in Athens on April 6, 1996. Part of this celebration was the re-enactment of the 1896 Games. Olympic medalists and representatives of all cities who had hosted the Olympic Games since 1896 took part in the torch run within the stadium. Afterwards, they took the torches back to their Olympic cities for a ceremony. Burn unit at top, torch VF-EF. (\$2,000)





- 45. **Atlanta 1996. Official Torch.** Aluminum and Georgia pecan wood, 80cm (31.5"), designed by Peter Mastrogiannis. 22 reeds represent the cities where Olympic Games had been held since 1896. The pecan wooden handle represents the connection of the flame between heaven and earth. The flame was lit in Olympia. It reached Los Angeles on April 27 and ended 84 days later in Atlanta, carried by 10,000 relay runners, horses, bicycles, trains, ships, and hydroplanes. EF. (\$2,400)

- 48. **Beijing 2008. Official Torch.** Red and anodized aluminum, 72cm (18.4"). Curved form in the shape of a paper scroll, with lucky clouds graphic expressing harmony. The torch relay started in Olympia, Greece, on March 24, traveled to over 100 cities on five continents and all of China, a distance of 137,000km. EF. (\$3,500)
- 49. London 2012. Official Torch. Gold-colored aluminum alloy, 80cm (31.5"), designed by Edward Barber and Jay Osgerby, made by The Premier Group, Coventry. Triangular form made out of an inner and outer sheet with 8000 holes representing the 8000 torch bearers in Great Britain. EF. (\$4,500)
- 50. **Rio de Janeiro 2016. Official Torch.** Recycled aluminum and resin, 69 cm (27") high. The colorful layers reflect the Ground (like the Copacabana Promenade), the Sea (blue ocean ripples), the Mountains (green natural beauty surrounding Rio), and the Sky at the top with the yellow sun (the flame). A beautiful torch reflecting the beautiful location of Rio. Used in the torch relay, light discoloration inside the top, torch EF. **(\$2,400)**
- 51. **Tokyo 2020/21. Official Torch.** Cherry blossom pink colored aluminum, 71cm (28") long, designed by Tokujin Yoshioka Inc. The design on the top is in the form of a 5-petal cherry blossom that each holds a flame that comes together as one flame in the center. It has been made from a single sheet of aluminum, 30% of it made from recycled aluminum from temporary prefabricated housing construction after the 2011 earthquake, as a symbol of peace. The torch relay had originally been planned to last over 121 days but worldwide Covid-19 ended these plans. A beautiful torch, rarely seen, whose color might change over time from cherry blossom pink to gold. Housed in its pink container. EF. (\$7,500)
- 52. Paris 2024. Official Torch. It is made of steel, 70cm (27.6") tall, and weighs around 1.5kg (1,500 grams/3.3 pounds), one of 2,000 torches manufactured by Arcelor Mittal in France. The torch was designed by Mathieu Lehanneur who drew inspiration from the 3 themes of the Paris Games: Equality, Water and Peacefulness. The torch relay started in Olympia on April 16, and ended on July 26, after the opening ceremony of the Paris Games on the Seine, with the lighting of the cauldron, a balloon, in the Tuileries. 
