

- 7. Antwerp 1920. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 60mm, by Josue Dupon. Victorious athlete holding palm branch and laurel wreath, Fame behind on left blowing horn. "VII Olympiade" legend. Rev. View of Port, Brabo fountain with Antwerp city shield, City of Antwerp in background. Toned EF. (\$5,000)
- Chamonix 1924 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 55mm, by Raoul Benard. Victorious athlete holding skates and skis, Alps in background. Rev. French legend in 14 lines. A rare winner's medal from the First Olympic Winter Games. Toned EF. (\$9,000)
- St. Moritz 1928. Gold First Place Winner's Medal. 50mm, by Arnold Hünerwadel. Skater with outstretched arms surrounded by ice crystals. Rev. 5-line French legend between olive branches, rings above. Toned EF. (\$8,000)

- 10. Amsterdam 1928. Gold First Place Winner's Medal. Goldplated silver, 55mm, by Giuseppe Cassioli, struck by the Dutch State Mint in Utrecht. Seated Victory holding laurel wreath and palm branch, Colosseum Stadium in Rome at right background. Rev. Winner with palm branch being carried on shoulders of his jubilant teammates. Only 110 gold medals were awarded in Amsterdam plus 9 gold medals for the Art Competition. Housed in its round red VF cardboard box inscribed on top in gold "IXe Olympiade/Amsterdam/1928". Medal toned EF. (\$8,000)
- 11. Amsterdam 1928. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal. Bronze, 55mm, by Giuseppe Cassioli. Victory holding laurel wreath and palm branch, Colosseum Stadium in Rome at right background. Rev. Winner with palm branch being carried on shoulders of his jubilant teammates. The IOC held a competition in 1924 for a permanent winner's medal design, and this design was shown for the first time in Amsterdam 1928. The design stayed the same through Mexico 1968. Toned EF. (\$6,000)
- 12. **Los Angeles 1932. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.** Bronze, 55mm, by Giuseppe Cassioli, struck by Whitehead & Hoag. Victory with palm branch and laurel wreath seated at left, Coliseum in background at right. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. Toned EF. **(\$6,000)**















13. **St. Moritz 1948 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal.**Bronze, 60mm, by Huguenin. Hand holding torch in raised design, Olympic rings and snowflakes in background, Olympic motto, "Citius Altius Fortius" around top. Rev. Four-line French legend "Vmes Jeux Olympiques d' Hiver St. Moritz 1948" between ice crystals. The St. Moritz Games were the first Olympic Games held after the end of World War II, awarded only in September 1946. 26 nations and 878 athletes participated, and the Soviet Union sent a delegation of 10 to watch the games – they participated for the first time in Oslo 1952. Medal is toned EF. (\$5,000)

- 14. **Tokyo 1964.** Athletics Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 63mm, designed by Toshikaka Koshiba after Giuseppe Cassioli (1928). Seated Victory holding palm branch and laurel wreath, Rome's Colosseum stadium at right, award text at top right. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. The medal was struck by the Japanese Mint as a trial medal, 2mm thick, before deciding on the final strike. Small rim bumps on reverse, o.w. toned EF. (\$4,000)
- 15. Montreal 1976. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Case. Silver, 60mm, obverse by Giuseppe Cassioli, struck by the Royal Canadian Mint in Ottawa. Seated Victory holding palm branch and laurel wreath, Rome's Colosseum Stadium at right, 4-line Montreal text at upper right. Rev. Small Montreal logo at top of open laurel wreath. With silver chain, housed in its wooden case and black leather cover with silver Montreal logo. EF. (\$26,000)
- 16. Calgary 1988. Gold Winner's Medal Presented in Official Display Case. Goldplated, 69mm, made by Jostens. Joint heads 1. of laureated athlete and Native American Indian with feather headdress made of winter sport equipment. Rev. Calgary logo within legend, "SAMPLE" on either side. With ribbon, in wood and glass display case with plaque on top. Base 18.2x8.1cm (7.2"x3.2"), 18cm (7.2") tall. EF. (\$1,500)

- 17. Albertville 1992 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Case. Silver and Lalique crystal, 92mm, 9mm thick. The crystal shows large Olympic rings over Alpine mountains, set in a silver border which is engraved with logo and olive branch, "Albertville 92" legend at bottom. With silver ribbon displaying Olympic color stripes in center. Housed in gray leatherette case lined in gray velvet, logo on top. EF. (\$15,000)
- 18. **Barcelona 1992. Bronze Winner's Medal with Ribbon.** Bronze, 70mm, by Xavier Corbero, struck by Madrid Mint. Victory seated with palm branch, laurel branch on left, legend and Olympic rings on right. Rev. Barcelona 1992 Olympic logo. With ribbon in five Olympic colors. EF. (\$5,000)
- 19. Sydney 2000. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Women's Lightweight Judo, 57kg. Silver, 68mm (2.7"). Female seated above Rome Stadium holding laurel wreath and palm branch. Rev. Cauldron and Sydney torch, Olympic rings above circular award legend. With blue inscribed ribbon. EF. (\$9,000)

20. Athens 2004. Silver Second Place Paralympic Winner's Medal. Silver, 60mm. View of the Acropolis in Athens. Rev. Paralympic logo above Braille legend. With multicolor ribbon. *Many Paralympic winner's medals in 2004 were not inscribed with the name of the winner.* EF. (\$3,000)

Silver, 70mm, with circle of inlaid green jade on reverse, by the Medal Design Group of the China Central Academy of Fine Arts, Elena Votsi. Winged figure of Victory holding palm branch and cloak, Athens Panathinaikos Olympic Stadium below, Acropolis in background, "XXIX Olympiad Beijing 2008" legend. Rev. Beijing 2008 logo in center surrounded by ring of jade, "Baseball" inscribed on outer circle. The team from Cuba won second place, Korea winning first. Baseball was voted out of the 2012 Olympic Games in 2005, the first sport deleted since 1936 when Polo was voted out. Polo returned again with the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. With red and orange ribbon. Housed in its original red lacquered case with gold "Beijing 2008" logo on top. Case and medal EF. (\$8,500)
